Newton fire engine strikes SUV; 3 injured

COVINGTON, Ga. — Two Newton County firefighters were among those in two vehicles treated at area hospitals Tuesday night after a fire truck struck an SUV and traveled more than 30 yards before overturning on

the side of Georgia Hwy. 36. One firefighter was treated for a head injury after being struck in the head during the 6 p.m. incident, said County Manager Lloyd Kerr.

Kerr said County Fire

A collision involving a Newton County fire engine and an SUV left three people injured, including two firefighters.

Service Chief Mike Conner told him the firefighters were aboard the emergency vehi-

cle and traveling to a fire call when the incident occurred. A Ford Escape SUV was

stopped in the southbound lane of Hwy. 36 and waiting to turn left into East End Road in front of a line of vehicles, the Georgia State Patrol reported.

The fire engine, with its lights and siren activated, moved to pass the line of vehicles in the opposite lane. The SUV then began to turn left on to East End Road and the fire engine was unable to avoid the collision, the report

It stated the front passenger side of the fire engine made

contact with the driver's area of the SUV and "continued from the area of impact for 23 feet and left the roadway on the east shoulder."

The fire engine then went down an embankment and traveled another 84 feet, overturned and came to a final rest on the driver's side of the vehicle facing south, the GSP reported.

Meanwhile, after the collision, the SUV "began rotating counterclockwise"

Banes refutes allegations of P-card misuse

County open to review card policy

• DA talks staff spending records

COVINGTON, Ga. — Since Newton County purchasing card (P-card) records of 50 employees and officials were revealed last week in Part II of a *Covington News* series, several residents and community stakeholders have been airing out concerns and asking lots of questions.

The majority of those questions have been specifically directed toward Chairman Marcello Banes, as his records showed purchases that many viewed as potentially against policy.

In review, the policy originally adopted in 2013 states P-cards are meant to be a "more efficient, cost-effective" way to complete small-dollar transactions, but not "bypass or avoid appropriate purchasing procedures." Policy also states P-cards are "not for personal use," and must be used for buying "supplies that are deemed necessary for the operation of the county," and for "legitimate business purposes only." P-cards may

not be used for "entertainment, alcohol or cash advances."

In wake of claims that Banes had not abided by the P-card policy, the chairman took time to address those allegations and answer a few questions from *The Cov*ington News:

THE NEWS: Could you provide a few examples of what constitutes "legitimate business purposes? Something records showed on several different P-card users' statements was a term "meeting with a constituent" or "lunch with a constituent." Could you explain to readers and other county taxpayers what exactly a "meeting/ lunch with a constituent" is and entails? How are those for "legitimate business purposes" and not simply a lunch?

BANES: As stated in the Enabling Legislation, part of the man for the county government", and "be available to the constituency, citizens

'We don't want to fight, but we have to'

Newton monument advocate speaks out after appellate court rules in favor of county

COVINGTON, Ga. — When judges of the state's appellate court ruled advocates' case for keeping the 115-year-old Confederate monument in the Covington Square lacked legal standing, one local businessman believes the Newton County government's case for bringing the statue down doesn't have "standing" either.

"You hear about 'concrete damages.' Well, if we don't have standing, how do they have the standing to take it down? It's basically a whim," said Bill Nash, who has lived and worked in the Newton County area for several decades. "They want to check a box and say 'that's what we did.'

"Up until just two or three years ago, the city and the county were proud of that statue," he added. "It is a memorial to the residents of Newton County who never came home from the war, and the wives and children that suffered when they never return home ... You can't snap your fingers and say that something is totally, instantly offensive. I'm sorry, it's not ... It didn't bother you before, but now all of the sudden it bothers you?"

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Newton leaders reinstate mask mandate

Face coverings only required to be worn in county buildings, parks

COVINGTON, Ga. Newton commissioners have reimposed an ordinance that requires masks or face coverings in all county government buildings and parks amid a surge in new cases of COVID-19.

The Newton County **Board of Commission**ers on Tuesday, Aug. 3, voted to reimpose the ordinance through Dec. 31, 2021.

The board first approved the ordinance in August 2020 but allowed it to expire in recent months as vaccinations began and





counties



numbers of new cases dropped earlier this year.

However, new cases in Newton County have risen dramatically in recent weeks — from a seven-day average of three new cases on June 29 to 24 new cases on July 31.

At only a 37% vaccination rate — well below the statewide 46% rate — Newton County appears to be squarely in the path of the Delta variant of the disease which reportedly is more contagious and spreads more rapidly than the original form of COVID-19. Most new COVID cases are among the unvaccinat-

ed, officials have said.

quirement."

Kerr said commissioners could rescind their action if the numbers of infected Newton Countians go down before Dec. 31.

The ordinance requires the county's 600 or so employees to wear masks when in the public areas of county-owned facilities where they would interact with the public; as well as other county property controlled by the board of commissioners, such as parks.

It also applies to county-owned facilities inside the cities — such as the county administration building and Historic Courthouse and in unincorporated Newton County.

It requires anyone age 9 and up to wear masks and face coverings when in the public spaces of any county facilities unless it is a polling place or the Judge Horace J. Johnson Jr. Judicial Building that is controlled by the Alcovy Judicial Circuit.

County Attorney Megan Martin said the ordinance is the same as the one approved in 2020 and continues to allow exemptions for those who object on the basis of health, ethical reasons or religious beliefs.

Other exemptions include a person who is practicing social distancing of at least six feet from anyone not in the same household, those riding in personal vehicles; if a medical provider has advised against the use of a face covering due to an underlying medical issue; when consuming food or beverages; for

identification purposes; providing identity to law enforcement, for purchase of alcohol, tobacco, or prescription drugs; and more.

County Chairman Marcello Banes said he believed reimposing the ordinance was "the

right thing to do." District 4 Commissioner J.C. Henderson has pushed for more county government action to educate the public about the need for vaccinations, mask wearing and other safeguards against the

disease, He said he had heard people say they refused to get vaccinated for such reasons as the government using it to 'track them."

"Worry about saving your mother's life, your brother's," Henderson said.

Property tax rate to drop 14% to fund 2022 county government budget

COVINGTON, Ga. — County officials said Newton property owners will see an almost 14% decrease in their tax rate to fund a 2022 county government budget that increased slightly.

Finance Director Brittany White told the Newton County Board of Commissioners Tuesday, Aug. 3, that a property tax rate of 11.145 mills would be needed to help fund the budget - 14% below the 2021 rate of 12.916 mills.

The Newton County Board of Commissioners voted 3-1 with one abstention to approve the budget, which funds the county government other than the school system through June 30,

Commissioners still must approve the property tax rate separately after a series of public hearings.

The proposed rate is also lower than the rollback rate of 11.5 mills. The state mandates that a rollback rate be calculated that would produce the same amount of revenue as the previous year's rate if reassessments had not occurred.

Commissioners generally had indicated previously they wanted to see a property tax rate lower than the current rate to compensate for higher assessments from

rising land values that would increase tax bills.

However, County Manager Lloyd Kerr said Tuesday the tax rate needed to fund the budget was based on the county's tax digest — the total assessed value of all taxable property — which increased by \$424 million this

year to \$3.4 billion. It is the sixth consecutive year the Newton County digest has increased from the previous

The 2022 budget totals \$118.6 million and delays hiring of 32 new positions until January 2022 while giving a 4.5% pay

Former Good Hope mayor dies

Jimmy Guthrie, who served his country and his community, died Tuesday morning after a battle with cancer.

Guthrie served as the mayor of Good Hope in Walton County for two terms and was elected last year for a third. He resigned in January due to health concerns.

The mayors of Loganville, Monroe and Social Circle ordered flags at city facilities lowered to half-staff.

As mayor, Guthrie helped start the Good Hope Poppy Festival and was instrumental in bringing a Walton County Sheriff's Office precinct to the community.

He also was the mayor during some of the biggest changes in the city's recent history: implementation of a four-way stop at the main intersection in town, the introduction of alcohol sales and approval of a Dollar General.

Guthrie oversaw the improvement of local parks and support of cycling programs. Early in his term, he led the way as Good Hope was recertified as a City of Ethics.

He was a veteran of the U.S. Navy who came to the community about 1980.

Mayor Pro Tem David Mullis, who served as interim mayor earlier this year, called Guthrie "a phenomenal force in our community" during a reception the City Council held to recog-

nize him.

Rockdale judge orders masks required at courthouse

Chief Rockdale Superior Court Judge Robert Mumford has amended a court order to mandate masks be worn by everyone entering the courthouse.

A previous order only required people not vaccinated to wear masks.

The updated order calls for people to wear masks at all times while inside the courthouse.

The judge said only witnesses and attorneys would be allowed to remove their masks during a hearing or trial.

Rockdale BOE reduces millage rate for FY22

The Rockdale County Schools Board of Education has opted to reduce the millage rate by 1.883 mills and adopt a rollback millage rate of 22.717, which is, reportedly, the lowest rate in more

than a decade.

In June, the board adopted a budget of approximately \$171 million for fiscal year.

Approximately 70% of the funds were earmarked for instruction and student support.

State Supreme Court goes back to remote oral arguments This month's oral arguments before the Georgia Supreme Court will be held remotely, Chief Justice David Nahmias announced Thursday.

Word that the high court was going back to online proceedings came less than a week after Verda Colvin was sworn in as the newest Supreme Court justice during a live ceremony inside the state Capitol and two months after the court resumed conducting in-person hearings at the nearby Nathan Deal Judicial Center.

Nahmias cited the increase in cases of COVID-19 resulting from the highly contagious delta variant and the resulting revision of public health guidelines.

Nahmias said evidentiary hearings and jury trials elsewhere in Georgia's court system that must be done in person should continue subject to "appropriate health protections."

Former Chief Justice Harold Melton issued a string of statewide judicial emergencies after the coronavirus pandemic first struck Georgia in March of last year.

Although the most recent of those orders expired June 30, the state Supreme Court has extended emergency rules allowing all levels of the court system to continue conducting some proceedings using video conferencing technology.

This month's oral arguments in the Georgia Supreme Court are scheduled to take place Aug. 24, Aug. 25 and Aug. 26. No decision has been made regarding the oral arguments set for mid-September.

University System of Georgia won't mandate masks, shots for coronavirus

The University System of Georgia is stopping short of requiring students returning to classes during the next couple of weeks to wear masks or get vaccinated against COVID-19.

With confirmed cases of the virus, hospitalizations and deaths on the rise in Georgia, the university system issued guidelines this week urging but not mandating masking and

vaccinations.

"The University System of Georgia recognizes COVID-19 vaccines offer safe, effective protection and urges all students, faculty, staff and visitors to get vaccinated either on campus or with a local provider," the guidelines stated.

"Additionally, everyone is encouraged to wear a mask or face covering while inside campus facilities.

The system continues to work closely with the Georgia Department of Public Health to prioritize the health and safety of our campus communities."

With the particularly contagious Delta variant of the virus spreading, about 600 of the nation's 4,000 colleges and universities have ordered students to get fully vaccinated in time for the fall semester, while hundreds also have imposed mask mandates.

The schools have cited new guidelines from the Atlanta-based Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommending that even fully vaccinated Americans mask up indoors.

The University System of Georgia policy is in keeping with Gov. Brian Kemp's position on virus mandates. Like other Republican governors, Kemp has resisted calls to require Georgians to mask up or get vaccinated throughout the course of the pandemic.

Kemp has been getting pressure from both sides of the mandates debate. Some Republicans have urged him to prohibit local school systems from imposing mask mandates.

Other legislators have urged the governor to impose a statewide mask mandate.

y wise father once advised me to never talk politics or religion with people. You will

It is hard not to write about politics and those who practice that arcane art. Humor-impaired wingnuts on both sides of the political spectrum are so much fun and such easy targets.

But, if you think political wingnuts can be righteously-indignant, try the Bible thumpers who will pull out one sentence from one verse of one chapter of one book of the Bible – Old Testament or New Testament, take your pick - to convince us that they are on the side of God and everybody else is going to hell in a wheelbarrow.

My favorite was the guy who justified carrying guns to church by saying Jesus would approve (Luke 22:36), forgetting Matt 5:38-41 and that darned old 6th Commandment – something about "Thou Shalt Not Kill."

log out of our own eye before we worry about the speck in the eyes of others.

There is an ugly spectacle currently taking place in Cobb County between the largest church in the North Georgia Conference of the United Methodist Church, Mt. Bethel, and North Georgia Bishop Sue Haupert-Johnson. The bishop sought to move Mt. Bethel pastor Jody Ray to a new position. Ray refused to go. So what is the prob-

lem? The bishop, a lawyer-turned-theologian, is a liberal who is about as clumsy as an elephant on roller skates and Mt. Bethel is a member of the Wesleyan Covenant Association, a group of conservative Methodist churches planning to split from the UMC next year in part over LGBTQ issues dividing the church. Mt. Bethel's lay leaders have alleged Ray's reassignment is punishment for his and their beliefs.

I don't know what form the arbitration will take, but I wonder if Haupert-Johnson and Ray have thought about sitting down in a room alone and asking themselves: What would Jesus do? I suspect, for starters. he would have the two of them park their egos and read the Sermon on the Mount.

Who knows how this is going to work out but one thing for sure, this kind of internecine squabbling isn't good for organized religion. But then, maybe "organized religion" is an oxymoron. Can I get an amen?.

New school year brings both new, old challenges

any students in the area have already. returned to the classroom for the start of a new

school year. One

thing that is a certainty is that

students today face as much stress as ever. Young people have always had peer pressure, as well as pressure from adults, to do things both wise and unwise. That continues to be true in 2021 just as it was in 1989 when I graduated high school. It's a generational thing and it will

always continue. Bullying remains a big concern today. This is an issue which has always gone on. It goes beyond "kids will be kids." There is no justification for bullying. Some school districts handle and control it better than others. Others like to keep it all hush-hush and pretend

it is not an issue. When I was a student, I was one of the fortunate ones. I only had to deal with a few isolated cases of bullying. When I was in middle school, a high school senior decided he would zero in on me. I let it slide the first couple of times but then it got old.

To me the solution to this problem was simple: I told my father about it. While I did not witness the conversation, I do know that after my father had a heart-to-heart talk (it was a one-sided conversation my father later told me) with the one who was doing the bullying that it never happened again.

School systems today would frown on a parent handling a situation in this manner. In all likelihood the law would be called to

prevent the parent from doing so.

Part of the problems with our young people today is the lack of a strong family foundation. There are many reasons for it but a young student has much less of a chance in this crazy world without that family support.

It is so beneficial to have a supportive father and mother. In some cases, the child is wrong and good parents understand that. In other times the bureaucracy of a school system (whether large or small) can be infuriating.

Who knows what might have transpired from my situation without my father to step in and put an immediate stop to it.

On the other hand, all 100 would have a Facebook page, Twitter account and a long list of contacts they text on a daily, if not hourly, basis. Many spend hours a day watching YouTube videos. Sure some are educational but others are well, you know.

Texting has also led to less socialization. You don't have to actually talk to someone. You can just send them a

text and then look at

their reply. Of course, having

a cell phone is not all bad. I like the fact I have one when I travel. Phones today can help you locate places or certainly call for help if it is needed. For those reasons alone it is probably essential for young people to have them. All students should

be involved in at least one activity at school beyond sitting in a desk in a classroom. Even smaller schools today offer a wide variety of activities. 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County board splits on opposition of tax collection services fee increase for cities

COVINGTON, Ga. County commissioners narrowly voted to tell Tax Commissioner Marcus Jordan they opposed his plan for charging an additional fee to do property tax collections for the five cities in Newton Coun-

The board voted 3-2 on Tuesday, Aug. 3, to object to the additional

Jordan recently sent the city governments intergovernmental agreements that state he wants \$3.50 rather than the \$2.50 charge that past tax commissioners imposed — to serve as their property tax collector.

The agreement indicated the Board of Commissioners was requesting the fees which brought an outcry from city officials, County Manager Lloyd Kerr

"Their impression is the county is attempting to collect an additional dollar from them," Kerr

Kerr and County Attorney Megan Martin said city officials in Oxford and Covington had asked them why the county was asking for the money. The tax commissioner is actually receiving the fees, Martin said.

She told commissioners Kerr asked her to draft the resolution stating the Board of Commissioners' opposition to the extra \$1.

"We're not saying 'yes' or 'no' on what Tax Commissioner Jordan can do," she said.

"He can set fees," Martin said. "This is more of a piece of 'propaganda' that comes from the board saying we don't support charging our cities any

Jordan admitted he could make the agreements with city governments unilaterally because he is one of four county officers the state constitution allows to operate mostly independently from the

"I'd be hard-pressed to break the law for my mother, much less anyone else," Jordan said.

He said a county commission vote to oppose the \$1 fee would give him "cover" if a taxpayer asked him why he was not collecting the extra money

ers and J.C. Henderson voted against it.

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Newton BOE to consider reduction of tentatively approved tax rate

COVINGTON, Ga. The Newton County Board of Education reportedly is considering reducing its property tax rate despite approving a tentative rate that was needed to pass the 2022 budget in June.

Board spokeswoman Sherri Partee said board members have discussed decreasing the tentatively ap-



proved rate of 19.788 mills, which, if left in place, would produce more revenue this year because of an increase in assessed property values countywide compared to last year.

Partee said the board will not set the final millage rate for 2022 until Aug. 24 at 7 p.m. after public hearings scheduled for Aug. 17 at 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., and Aug. 24 at 6 p.m.

The 19.788-mill rate is the same property tax rate for Newton schools as the previous three years. However, the state government by law defines it as a tax increase because a 14%

increase in assessed property values countywide in the net tax digest this year would increase the tax levy on property owners by the same amount compared to last year.

The proposed tax increase for a home with a fair market value of \$200,000 is approximately \$171.99 and the proposed tax increase for non-homestead property with a fair market value of \$175,000 is approximately \$143.57, according to school system calculations.

The tentatively approved rate is 2.051 mills higher than the

rollback rate of 17.737 mills that would produce the same amount of revenue as last year if there were no increase in assessments.

The tentative rate is calculated to fund a \$201.2 million budget for 2022 the board approved June 22 after they used \$12 million in reserves to balance it, according to meeting minutes.

However, the board approved the budget June 22 so it could go into effect on July 1. Because the final county tax digest had not been released on June 22, the board based the budget numbers they approved on a tax digest estimate lower than the recently announced final digest amount — meaning more revenue may be available.

This year's net tax digest is \$3.47 billion, which is a 14.5% increase from \$3.02 billion last year.

The net tax digest is the total of assessed values of all real property in the county after all exemptions are removed. Real property is generally defined as land and buildings.

Properties owned by the government, school systems and churches are among those exempted from property taxes by law.

Newton County's tax digest has increased 60% in five years since the 2016 digest totaled

\$2.16 billion. The public hearings on the property tax rate, also known as the millage rate, and the regular meeting are set for the board room at the Newton County Board of Education Administrative Offices at 2109 Newton Drive in Covington.

SOS sends out notices to 185K 'non-contact' Georgia voters

ATLANTA — The Georgia Secretary of



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185,666 Georgians who haven't had any contact with the state's elections system for at least five years.

Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger described the move Thursday as another step to protect election integrity in Georgia by updating the state's voter lists.

"Accurate voter lists ... ensure ineligible people cannot vote, allow counties to effectively allocate resources so there are no long lines, and help make sure voters get accurate information about casting their ballot," he said.

This week's notices to "no contact" Georgians follows a round of notices Raffensperger's office sent in June to 101,789 potential voters deemed eligible to be purged from the voter lists because they had not contacted Georgia election officials

in any way – either directly or through the state Department of Driver Services – for two general elections.

The notices going out this week will classify those Georgians' voter registrations "inactive" if they do not respond within 30 days.

Federal law prohibits removing voters from the rolls during general election years due to federal mandates before federal elections. The last voter purge

Raffensperger conducted in 2019 removed nearly 300,000 voter files that had been deemed obsolete. That purge sparked a legal challenge from Fair Fight Action, a voting rights advocacy group founded by 2018 Democratic gubernatorial nominee Stacey Abrams.

Following Raffen-

sperger's June announcement, Fair Fight Action launched an online tool, GeorgiaVoterSearch.com, to help voters in danger of being purged from the state's voter lists.

"It is critical that every Georgia voter check their voter registration status to make sure it is active and up to date," said Liza Conrad, voter protection director for Fair Fight Action. "GeorgiaVoterSearch. com will allow Georgia voters to make sure they are not unjustly stripped of their access to the ballot box."

Raffensperger pointed to legislation then-President Bill Clinton signed in 1993 requiring states to regularly maintain their voter lists.

Georgians receiving a notification from Raffensperger's office can return it, postage-free, to avoid being classified as inactive.

Ossoff seeks to codify right to vote in federal law

ATLANTA — The right of Americans to vote in federal elections would be codified in federal law for the first time under legislation introduced this week by U.S. Sen. Jon Ossoff, D-Ga.

The Right to Vote Act is aimed at new laws around the country legislatures in Republican-controlled states have passed or considered since last year's elections, including an Jon elec-**Ossoff** tion-law

Ossoff's bill would empower U.S. citizens to challenge in court any state or local government act that makes it more difficult to vote. Defendants in such cases would have to demonstrate a legitimate governmental interest in enacting such a law and that the new law is the least restrictive alternative available to accomplish that goal, Ossoff said Thursday.

Ossoff said the aftermath of Democrat Joe Biden's victory over incumbent Republican President Donald Trump last November points to the need for establishing a statutory right to vote.

"We see that politicians in Georgia and states across the country are seeking to restrict access to the ballot, targeting Black voters just to gain a partisan advantage in

elections," Ossoff said. Georgia Republicans have defended the law the General Assembly passed last March as restoring public trust in the electoral process by making it harder for those bent on committing voter fraud either at the polls or through absentee ballots.

Democrats have

criticized the additional restrictions in the new law as voter suppression pushed by Republicans determined to reverse last year's high-turnout victories in Georgia by Biden, Ossoff and fellow Democratic Sen.

Raphael Warnock. Along with Ossoff's bill, congressional Democrats are working to pass other legislation that would set national voting standards.

Republicans, including Gov. Brian Kemp, say such efforts represent an unconstitutional usurpation of states' rights to run elections.

A companion bill to Ossoff's legislation has been introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by Rep. Mondaire Jones, D-N.Y.



conducted an Open Records Request for all P-card spending documents for all Newton County cardholders from June 2020-June 2021, records showed you, Mr. Banes, had spent \$12,895.90 over that period. Statements confirmed \$3,633.43 (28.2%) was spent on food-related purchases, and of those food related purchases, \$3,346.15 (25.9% of total spending) was spent specifically on food for meetings and lunches with constituents. BANES: During a one-year perioa, I know I have had well over 100 lunches or dinners with my wife, Cheneeka. My wife has volunteered hundreds of hours at county weekend events when we have been short staffed or needed her particular assistance. She has assisted me during numerous weekend duties that I have performed as chairman. In the oneyear period that you requested my P-card activity, you have identified two instances where I have produced

ments?

for lunch for me and my wife. While you only identified two, there are actually three totaling less than \$92. I have taken my wife to a lunch with others to get her perspective on certain county issues. I've taken her to a newly opened local business owned by a husband and wife that contacted me through my office for an appearance and discussion regarding county affairs. I have taken her to lunch on one occasion because of her commitment to help at one particular county event. I consider these to be a legitimate expense that is far exceeded by the benefit received.

THE NEWS: Before and after publishing these findings, members of the public, specifically taxpayers, have voiced their concern to The Covington News that they believe this spending amount on "meetings with constituents" and food related expenses is excessive. What would you say to that claim? **BANES:** It is impos-

sible to perform the role of chairman of Newton County without regularly talking with the people who live here or those who are employed by the county. I not only want to hear the concerns of the people of Newton County, I want them to know that the chairman's office is accessible because I represent them. Meeting with members of the community, fostering relationships with stakeholders and building [morale] of county employees are essential to performing my job. Many elected officials have a supplement in addition to their salary to fund items such as lunches and food for meetings. Based upon the Enabling Legislation and the customary expenses of previous chairmen, these "meetings with constituents" and food related expenses are

I often have to meet with heads of industry, state representatives, and congressional delegates with the goal of impressing upon them the professionalism of Newton County and its representatives. It is critical that when engaging in my duties as chairman I am putting the county's best foot forward. These expenses are incidental to achieve this goal. These exact expenses also have been cleared by county policy and/ or our county attorney prior to them being incurred and are customary expenses of previous chairmen.

THE NEWS: After reviewing P-card policy and procedures, it is understood there are certain things county employees and officials can and cannot use P-cards for, such as personal items, cash advances, alcohol, etc., but the term "personal use" seems to be quite broad. Is there a guide for P-card users to refer to if an item, activity or service is ever in question?

COUNTY: An item is for personal use if it is not of relevance to performing duties as detailed in an employee's job description, or the Enabling Legislation of the county, or Georgia's Constitution, depending on the user. As you have noted in an earlier article, each purchase has a log sheet, in which the description of the purchase is noted.

THE NEWS: Could you provide a few examples of what consti-

tutes "personal use?" **COUNTY:** Personal use would be for something that does not fall under the job description. Each P-Card user has different roles therefore their work-related use would be different. For example, part of the duties of Chairman Banes, as stated in the Enabling Legislation, says "To be available to the constituency, citizens and civic organizations on a regular basis' therefore a lunch with constituents is in line with performing that duty. However, for, say, someone in Information Services whose description doesn't include to be available for constit-

THE NEWS: With what many argue as broadly, loosely defined terms within the P-card policy, how can one differentiate or draw the line between what is legally acceptable versus what is ethically acceptable?

COUNTY: We follow state law along with our own legal policies, which ensures we do things that are legally acceptable. Newton County also has ethic policies and guidelines. That, coupled with the character of the people we employ, help us stay in line with what is ethically acceptable. All Newton County employees and our elected officials are cognizant of the fact that we are funded by the taxpayer, and their actions reflect

the trial date to book a flight and hotel rooms for victims. I understand this sometimes means that the flight may be more expensive, but it is a better choice than paying for a ticket only to have the trial continued. Travel insurance does not cover this circumstance. Trials such as this often take days; therefore, our office had to pay for flights for multiple people and for hotel rooms for multiple days. Ultimately, the trial ended in a conviction for all charges and the defendant was sentenced to life in prison.

"Any travel expenses such as this, must be approved by my victim services director and me. However, the taxpayers of our county should also be aware

that I anticipate further expenses like this in the near future. We currently have multiple cases of child victims of serious crimes that have moved out of the state. Part of that is just based on the normal moving of people as they live their lives as time passes. But having an entire year without trials due to the ongoing pandemic means that these cases are older and people cannot put off their lives forever. I asked to increase the amount of money that is in my budget for witness/ victim travel because of this. This increase was questioned by a county commissioner at our budget meeting. I explained the reasoning and it appeared everyone was satisfied with my explanation."

There were also photos of messages written in chalk on the sidewalk area surrounding the statue, but none were threatening the monument.

No threats of damage to the statue were documented before July 14. Regardless of the

Nash said the monument was erected after women of Newton County held a 14-year penny drive around the turn of the 20th century.

"It's for their suffrage, but it's also for the men and sons that never came home," he said. "For the people that automatically tie this to slavery, that's just in their mind."

Nash believes the statues removal would be detrimental to the businesses on the Square and goes against the chairman's mantra

of "One Newton." "Marcello came up with this term 'One Newton,' but he's never going to get there trying to take this statue down," Nash said. "It's too important to too many people.

"It's just wrong," he continued. "We don't take from one party to please another party. This is not a Robin Hood thing, you know. Leadership requires that you're doing something for all people of the county. There's a lot of people that come to me, including people of color, and tell me point blank that they don't want that statue gone. They may not say it in front other people, but they say it to me ... If you really want 'One Newton,' then don't

After the Georgia Court of Appeals ruled in favor of the county, Nash said advocates were currently in the process of either getting an executive order from the Governor's Office, or taking the case to the state Supreme Court. It's a process that could take several months, but Nash said it's a necessary battle.

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

athletes don't expect to lose. The athletes feel like this is their year to start making a difference and to start winning."

Lowe stressed he didn't want spurts of success. He aims for long-term achievement for the program as a whole.

It starts with softball, which didn't graduate a single player. Then, football has a lot of continuity with coaches and players coming back.

The biggest change from a season ago will be in volleyball. There'll be almost a brand new coaching staff at the helm of this year's program.

Across the board, though, there was very little turnover in coaches and players, which plays into what Lowe is wanting to build at Alcovy.

"We have taken [that winning attitude] to more of a program standard," Lowe said. "We're not looking at just having one good season. A lot of our major contributors are young. So, we're looking at years to come, being successful and developing our students."

Lowe continued to state that he expects all of Alcovy athletics to "become state competitors."

Another factor of

Lowe's plan has been branding for the athletic program. Specifically, he mentioned the use of social media as a great tool in accomplishing that.

Alcovy High School, baseball, basketball and football in particular can all be found on Twitter. A few athletic programs can be found on Instagram as well.

For the most part, the feedback about rebranding Alcovy athletics has been positive, but there have been naysayers. That hasn't deterred Lowe in his mission one bit.

"The only pushback I have gotten has been 'well, it's been this way for years," Lowe said. "I always say if this is the way it has always been and you've gotten the same result, you got to try something different. So, why not trust the direction we're going if it has proven to work time and time again."

Lowe plans to continue going this current direction with branding as long as it shows it works. He stressed that he's a firm believer in sticking with an idea as long as it still works.

As a matter of fact, the negative feedback was expected by Lowe, but he's pressed on for the good of the students.

"It's a new day and a new leadership," Lowe

Covington's Godwin earns bronze in mixed 1,600-meter relay

For a guy that didn't make the finals of the 400 meters in either the NCAA Indoor or Outdoor Track and Field Championships, Elija Godwin is a long way from Georgia's Spec Towns Track right now.

Despite his disappointments at the two NCAA Championships this year, Godwin made the most of his biggest opportunity of the year. He did reach the final of the 400 at the U.S. Olympic Trials, held at Eugene, Ore., on the same track as the NCAA Outdoors the week before, and finished sixth, earning a relay spot on the U.S. team in the Tokyo Olympics.

"There are a lot of thoughts that come to mind when you think about, I'm actually about to go to the Olympics," Godwin said before leaving Athens. "Sometimes I think about how this is one of the biggest stages I've ever been on, and then I think about it again and I'm like, no, this is THE biggest stage that you can be on as a track and field athlete.

"To be able to have come so far and be able to accomplish something like this, it's amazing to me. I feel extremely blessed and I'm just excited to go out there and see what it will be like."

Godwin, a Covington native and rising senior at UGA, was a part of a history-making quartet July 30 at Olympic Track Stadium in Tokyo. He joined former Bulldog sprinter Lynna Irby, the 2018 NCAA champion in the 400, in the inaugural Olym pic heat of the 4x400 mixed relay, a new event that features two women and two men. Godwin led off the race, handed the baton to Irby, who passed it to Taylor Manson, and then Bryce Deadmon

ran the anchor leg. The U.S. won the heat easily, but it was then disqualified for a zone violation. About five hours later, the U.S. team's appeal of the disqualification was granted, allowing the team to advance to the final. Godwin ran the opening leg in 45.67 seconds and Irby ran her's in 49.77. The group won its heat by more than a second, with a total time of 3:11.39, which ranked third among all quali-

If Godwin isn't selected for the mixed final on Saturday, he will likely be back in action on Sunday during the men's 4x400

relay qualifying. At the NCAA Outdoors, Godwin said he ran a poor race strategically in the semifinals, posting a time of 46.18, which was fourth in his

heat and 11th overall, two spots out of making the final. It wasn't all bad at the NCAAs, though. Godwin teamed with Matthew Boling, Arian Smith and Delano Dunkley to place second in the 4x100relay with a school-record time of 38.54, .06 out of first.

Godwin was able to shake off his disappointing 400 at NCAAs quickly and get his mind right for the Olympic Trials a week later.

"You would think that would hurt my confidence or something negative, but it wasn't that," he said of not reaching the NCAA final in the 400. "I looked at it as, I'm going to turn this moment into something positive. I'm going to come back successful.

"To actually do it, to set your mind to some-

thing, to have a big dream and make a plan, and then actually be able to see it through, it's like a surreal moment. You've got to keep telling yourself it's real."

It's real because he made it real. Godwin won his first heat at the Trials in 44.81, running the second-fastest time overall. In the semifinals, he ran 45.10, placing second in his heat and sixth overall, earning him a spot in the final. In that final, with a spot in the Olympics on the line, Godwin ran 44.94 to place sixth and punch his ticket.

Of course, Godwin didn't know he'd made the team immediately after the race. He walked off the track disappointed in sixth, thinking that he'd had a good shot at third if he'd finished better.

"I was walking off

the track and I got to the tent and everybody was like, 'Congratulations.' When I got to the warmup tent, they gave me my processing papers for the next day because I'd made the team. I remember a hint of excitement but I was more flooded with the emotion of coming in sixth," he said.

"I kind of wish I would have gone back and enjoyed the moment a little bit more, but as a true competitor, coming in sixth isn't something you feel good about initially. Once I realized how big this was, I was able to smile about it, really take it in and be happy about it."

Great comebacks are nothing new for Godwin, who in May 2019 was seriously injured when he was impaled by a javelin. Two years almost to the day after

that, on May 15, at the 2021 SEC Outdoor Championships, he ran a personal-best and school-record 44.61 in the 400.

"It's crazy to me to see my story unfold, and this is another climax in my story," he

It's a great story that's still unfolding, on the biggest stage in track and field.

Saturday, July 31, Godwin earned a bronze medal in the 1,600-meter mixed relay in track and field. He earned the medal after running on the relay in prelims, then the U.S. foursome of Trevor Stewart, Kendall Ellis, Kaylin Whitney and Vernon Norwood finished in third in the finals with a time of 3 minutes, 10.22 seconds.
