

Crime at the Border

Covington man pleads guilty to smuggling

Attempted to get 117 illegal aliens past border patrol in Texas

LAREDO, Texas — A Covington man admitted in federal court Monday he tried to smuggle 117 undocumented immigrants in a tractor-trailer past a U.S. Border Patrol checkpoint in Texas in February.

Jonathan Kyle Price, 42, pleaded guilty Monday, July 26, to a charge of Conspiracy to Transport Undocumented Aliens in U.S. District Court in

Price admitted he agreed to smuggle 117 aliens past a Border Patrol checkpoint on Interstate 35, according to information from the U.S. Attorney's Office of the Southern District of Texas.

He was allowed to remain on bond pending an October sentencing hearing where he

Newton County P-card records from June 2020-June 2021 revealed

othing personal. That's what the policy and procedures framework adopted in 2013 says concerning how Newton County employees and elected officials are to use their purchasing card

As reported in Part I of a series on P-cards within the July 24-25 edition of The Covington News, the cards are simply meant to be a

"more efficient, cost-effective" way to complete small-dollar purchasing transactions, but not "bypass or avoid appropriate purchasing procedures."

Though the cards operate similarly to a personal credit card, there is to be nothing personal about them except the name listed on the card.

Per the policy, P-cards are "not for personal use," and must be used for buying "supplies that are deemed

necessary for the operation of the county," and for "legitimate business purposes only." P-cards may not be used for "entertainment, alcohol or cash advances."

In recent weeks, residents have raised concerns over P-cards and even accused officials and employees of

Many have alleged some purchases previously made public could be classified as personal and illegitimate concerning county business.

Others want clarity on how certain purchases may or may not be deemed personal and for county

In an effort to provide this clarity, The Covington News submitted an open records request to the Newton County finance department, calling for all P-card spending records of all 50 Newton County P-card holders from June 2020 to June

Developer cites 'economics' in return to larger travel center plan

SOCIAL CIRCLE, Ga. — A developer has changed its plan for a travel center in northeast Newton again to create more space for a convenience store and fast-food restaurants compared to one it showed county com-

JPC Design Construction has submitted a concept plan for a building three times the size of the one it showed the Newton County Board of Commissioners June 15, officials confirmed.

missioners in June.

Jeremy Crosby of JPC said the company needed a larger building and more space for amenities simply to

make it financially feasible for the developer to operate based on the price of the land at I-20 and Georgia Hwy. 11.

"It's just economics," Crosby said. "We have to have more to offer."

The building planned for the site

has increased from the previous 8,000 square feet in June to 24,900 square feet and includes room for at least three fast-food restaurants.

Crosby said anticipated demand from the traveling public on I-20 required more gas pumps and space for bathrooms — which will cover 4,000 square feet of the building than the previous plan.

The new plan's design is similar to a travel center that JPC's parent company, Jackson-based Jones Petroleum, operates near

I-75 in Butts County, Crosby said.

It is expected to accompany JPC's request for a conditional use permit on which the board of commissioners on June 15 delayed action until its Aug. 17

JPC included Burger King and Dunkin' Donuts in the latest plan. Both had committed to locate in the building from the start of JPC's effort to gain approval of a travel center development on the 46-acre site in January,

Development moratorium questioned

Chairman says public asking why subdivision plats still being approved

COVINGTON, Ga. — A moratorium did not affect some development plans officials considered in recent months because they were submitted before county commissioners approved the ban in January.

But some members of the public still are confused about how the county planning commission can consider plats for approval when a moratorium is under way, said commission Chairman Landis Stephens.

"They think we're pausing on all growth," Stephens said.

The Newton County Board of Commissioners recently voted to extend until Sept. 21 the moratorium on new applications for zoning petitions and petitions for preliminary plats and concept plans for new residential development.

County planning commission members indicated Tuesday night that some residents had not heard details before their meeting about preliminary plats and had concerns about them.

Those concerns apparently led the planning commission to delay action until Aug. 24 on a preliminary plat for a multi-use project containing 20 town-homes and a retail center on Salem Road near Georgia Hwy. 81. Stephens also asked if county commissioners knew about the plans, as well, since they often hear from residents about

planning commission issues.

Development Services Director Judy Johnson said the department she leads publicizes what will be on the agenda prior to the meeting by publishing information in the county's legal organ. "There was never any smoke and mirrors," she said.

She said preliminary plats the Newton County Planning Commission considered Tuesday, July 27 — and a third still awaiting action — were the last three submitted before the moratorium went into effect.

Johnson said the county development ordinance only allows the planning commission — not the Newton County Board of Commissioners — to approve preliminary plats.

She also noted a county commissioner appoints each planning commissioner from the district where they live and "you should be reaching out to that commissioner" with any concerns, Johnson said.

If the planning commission approves a preliminary plat
— which typically is a rough outline of plans — the Development Services staff handles the other steps that end with approval of final plans for placement of roads, home lots and other amenities.

Johnson said she told the board of commissioners previously there were pending petitions the moratorium would not affect because they were submitted before it took effect.

She said she told the board of commissioners some applications take "months to move forward."

Board of commissioners members first approved the moratorium Jan. 19 so they could consider updating the county development ordinance to take into account "current trends for residential development" the ordinance may not "adequately" address.

"Trends" include building densities, lot sizes and more that are common in newer residential subdivision plans than when the ordinance was written, officials said.

Commissioners voted to extend the moratorium after voting earlier this year to extend it to July 20.

Johnson told the board of commissioners the extension to September was needed because her staff had not been able to schedule a work session with the board. She said the work session would allow the the planning staff to work with the commissioners on specific changes they wanted to make in density requirements and other areas in the ordinance, she said.

County planning staff members need "direction from the board" to consider specific changes in the ordinance — which allows up to 12 units per acre in some developments.

Kemp puts more funding toward fighting crime

Gov. Brian Kemp is committing up to \$2 million from the Governor's Emergency Fund to the state Department of Public Safety's Crime Suppression

This move Wednesday was the latest he and other state Republicans have taken to combat rising crime rates, particularly in Atlanta.

In May, Kemp committed \$5 million from the emergency fund for the same cause.

The \$2 million he's freeing up now is not part of that \$5 million package, which was allocated for the fiscal year that ended June 30, Kemp spokesman Cody Hall said. However, not all of the earlier money had been spent when fiscal 2021 ended, Hall said.

"This additional funding is necessary to keep the streets of Atlanta safe and protect residents and visitors alike," the speaker said. "Our state law enforcement personnel are working around the clock to bring criminals to justice, and I greatly appreciate their work on behalf of all Georgians."

Georgia Democrats want Medicaid expansion added to special session

Democrats in the Republican-controlled General Assembly are asking GOP Gov. Brian Kemp to add Medicaid expansion to the legislature's upcoming redistricting special session.

A letter dated Tuesday signed by 67 Democratic members of the Georgia House and Senate called the need for legislative action to expand Medicaid coverage "urgent."

"This governor has made it clear he wants to expand the scope of the session beyond redistricting," said Rep. Matthew Wilson, D-Brookhaven, the chief signatory to the letter, referring to Kemp's announcement last week that he will add tackling the recent rise in violent crime to the special session agenda.... If we're going to include other items in the special session, Medicaid expansion must be a top priority."

Georgia Democrats have pushed for Medicaid expansion since then-President Barack Obama steered the Affordable Care Act through a Democratic Congress in 2010 with no Republican votes.

Kemp instead proposed a more limited expansion, which the Trump administration approved last year. But the new Biden administration has put that plan on hold because of concerns that it includes a work requirement for Medicaid recipients.

Port of Savannah enjoys record year

The Port of Savannah has become the first container port in the Southeast or on the Gulf Coast to move more than 5 million 20-foot equivalent units (TEUs) of cargo in one year.

The port handled 5.3 million TEUs during fiscal 2021, which ended June 30, a 20% increase over the previous year, the Georgia Ports Authority (GPA) reported Monday.

The record came during a difficult year that saw major disruptions to supply chains around the globe.

"GPA leadership, our employees and our partners across the logistics community put in a tremendous effort

to make this milestone possible," said Joel Wooten, incoming chairman of the ports authority's board.

"Growing our business by 20 percent in a single year is an amazing accomplishment and secures Savannah's position as the fastest growing gateway in the nation over the past 10 years."

Part of the reason for the Port of Savannah's rapid growth in container traffic is that the authority added 210,000 TEUs of container capacity during fiscal 2021 by expanding container handling space and adding equipment at the port's Ocean Terminal.

The port also saw a 14% increase in rail volumes at Savannah's Garden City Terminal and a 26% increase in cargo lifts at the Appalachian Inland Port, a facility the ports authority opened in Northwest Georgia in 2017 primarily to bring exports by rail to Savannah.

Fiscal 2021 also was marked by progress on the multi-year deepening of Savannah Harbor, a \$1 billion project now 90% complete and due to be completed in December. Another project expected to open this winter is the \$220 million Mason Mega Rail, two sets of nine working tracks that will raise rail capacity at the Port of Savannah to 2 million TEUs per year.

The ports authority's trade in autos and heavy machinery also saw significant growth during the last fiscal year. Roll-on/ Roll-off cargo reached 703,528 units, with the Port of Brunswick alone handling more than 685,000 units of vehicles and heavy machinery. Total Ro/Ro volume grew by 18% over fiscal 2020.

State commission awards six licenses to grow marijuana, make cannabis oil

The state commission in charge of Georgia's medical marijuana program has announced its intent to award six licenses to companies to grow the leaf crop and convert it into low-THC cannabis oil.

Two so-called "Class 1" licenses will allow the licensees to grow marijuana under close supervision in up to 100,000 square feet of growing space. Four "Class 2" licensees will limit recipients to not more than 50,000 square feet.

The announcement of winning licensees was long in coming. While the General Assembly first legalized cannabis oil for the treatment of certain diseases in 2015, it wasn't until 2019 that lawmakers passed a bill giving patients a legal means of obtaining the drug inside Georgia.

The legislation created the state commission to oversee the program, but it got off to a slow start. Members of the commission weren't appointed until November 2019, four months after the law took effect, and it took another year to release a request for proposals from interested companies.

Sixty-nine businesses submitted competitive bids for the six licenses.

The businesses chosen to receive Class 1 licenses are Florida-based Trulieve GA Inc. and Biomedical Sciences LLC. Class 2 licenses will go to FFD GA Holdings, TheraTrue Georgia, Natures GA and Treevana Remedy.

Under the 2019 legislation, licensees will be limited to producing low-THC cannabis oil containing no more than 5% THC, the

psychoactive ingredient that gets marijuana users high.

The drug will be sold at licensed dispensaries or specially licensed pharmacies to patients

suffering from a range of diseases including cancer, seizure disorders, multiple sclerosis, Crohn's disease and Parkinson's disease, among others.

Final Olympic memory a lasting one

ne last word about the 25th anniversary of the Centennial Olympic Games and then we will

move Nostalgia is not one of my strong

points but having been associated with such a high-profile, oncein-a-lifetime (for me) event makes it hard to not take a quick peek back, especially when I keep getting asked about those times. For instance, a re-

porter wanted to know

if I could single out one personal highlight from my involvement in the 1996 Games. That took a moment because there were a lot of them: Seeing the Olympic flame being lit in Olympia, Greece; walking on the actual field where the ancient Games were conducted some 2,000 years ago; watching the Olympic flame pass through the White House Rose Garden with my daughter; getting to run the Torch in my mother's hometown of Cartersville with my son and son-in-law by my side.

But the most satisfying personal moment occurred on the final night of Olympic Games competition. There is a back story, so bear with me.

I grew up in East Point, south of Atlanta. In our church was a distinguished gentleman by the name of Fred Alderman. I knew him only as a quiet and dignified man and very polite to everyone including a kid like me. But that is all I knew about

Years later after having joined Southern Bell Telephone Company, I was selected to be part of a program to visit with AT&T shareowners and bring them up-to-date on the latest developments in the business and to ensure that their telephone service was satisfactory.

One of the names assigned to me was Fred Alderman. I could not have been more pleased. Although in truth I occupied a low rung on the corporate ladder, I hoped he would be impressed to see that the kid he had known from church in East Point was now a telephone company manager.

It was a pleasant conversation that evening as I filled him in on the doings in the Bell System. At one point he excused himself for a moment and left the room. As I awaited his return, I noticed a book on an end table entitled "Amsterdam Olympics." I was casually

leafing through the book when suddenly I came across Fred Alderman's picture with three other athletes and a caption reading "4x400 gold medal winners." This quiet man I had known all my life was an Olympic gold medalist? I had no idea. I'm not sure if anyone else in East Point did, either.

Forget the shareholder visit. I wanted to know all about the experience and about the gold medal. He said the medal was somewhere upstairs, tucked away in a drawer. He talked about how he had been selected to compete in the Amsterdam Olympics. He was the NCAA sprint champion at Michigan State and was paired with three other collegiate sprinters from around the U.S. Later, I found that they set a world record in the 4x400 in Amsterdam with a time of 3:14.2.

The years passed but not my admiration for the man. When I joined the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games I promised Fred Alderman that he would see the 4 x 400 relay finals as my guest. And he did, although by now he was in a wheelchair.

What I was not prepared for was that Mr. Alderman's family had located and brought to Atlanta the other surviving member of that 1928 gold medal relay team, George Baird. Baird, a sprinter at the University of Iowa, had passed the baton to Fred Alderman in the finals in Amsterdam.

The two men had not seen each other since getting off the boat from Amsterdam in New York 68 years earlier. Now, here they were together once again in my box at the Centennial Olympic Games. Fred Alderman, 91, and

George Baird, 89. It was fascinating to watch these two old comrades as they sat silently and observed the finals, even leaning into the turns in their seats as the runners were doing on the track. To cap off a perfect evening, the United States 4x400 relay team won gold that night as they had in 1928, albeit with a

faster time: 2:55.9. Fred Alderman died two years later at the age of 93. But I had kept my promise to my hometown hero, an Olympic gold medalist. That was a moment I will forever treasure. Thank you for letting me share it with you.

Board narrowly approves warehouse, denies office rezonings

COVINGTON, Ga. Newton County commissioners recently struggled to put to rest some contentious zoning issues opposed by nearby residents.

The board of commissioners narrowly voted to approve and deny separate rezoning requests for controversial commercial projects planned for heavily traveled parts of the county's west end.

County commissioners on July 20 went against the county planning board's recommendation and voted 3-2 to approve a rezoning request to allow construction of a warehouse distribution center on a 28-acre site fronting the north side of I-20 at the Rockdale County line.

faces up to 10 years in prison, the U.S. Attorney's Office stated in a news release.

An arrest affidavit stated Price arrived at the checkpoint and told authorities he was hauling a load of produce, according to a report by Transportation Nation Network.

The checkpoint on I-35 was about 29 miles north of the Mexican border town of Laredo.

"However, he drove away before his immigration inspection was complete," the U.S. Attorney's Office stated.

Court documents said the tractor-trailer proceeded to leave the checkpoint "driving erratically and bypassing other tractor-trailers by cutting them off,"

Transportation Nation

Network reported. Law enforcement pursued "and quickly stopped him," the U.S. Attorney's Office stated.


After they stopped the tractor-trailer, officers said Price was "verbally resistant" to commands but eventually complied with instructions to return to the checkpoint, Transportation Nation

Network reported. "A service K-9 then detected an odor within the trailer. Authorities conducted a thorough inspection and found 117 undocumented aliens," the U.S. Attorney's news release

stated. Price later told authorities he was surprised to learn he was hauling undocumented immigrants when he believed he was hauling narcotics 160 miles north to San Antonio, according to Transpor-

records appeared to be relatively clean and properly maintained by the finance department. There were few instances where some P-card holders did not keep receipts for documentation, as policy requires.

There were also a small number of purchases that were, or could be considered, for personal use, but in most cases the purchase was made by mistake, properly addressed and paid back in a timely manner.

Upon review, records showed the majority of P-card holders used

their cards to purchase food, fuel/maintenance for county vehicles and office supplies. There were also many instances where P-cards were used to pay for government training courses, certification training and related fees, such as lodging expenses, fuel and food.

[Editor's Note: Due to space constraints, The Covington News has only detailed the P-card spending records of high-ranking officials and employees that were viewed as questionable or notable, as well as P-card holders with higher monthly spending limits. Spending records for all cardholders retrieved as result of an Open Records Request are available for viewing in their entirety within the online version of this article at CovNews.com.]

Dorothea Bailey-Butts, former coroner (\$5,000 monthly spending limit):

Records for May 2021 show Bailey-Butts only made one purchase with her P-card before resigning on May 28. It was for office supplies from Office Depot in the amount of \$452.23.

Marcello Banes, chairman (\$20,000 monthly spending limit):

For June 2020, Newton County Chairman Marcello Banes had a spending total of \$488.27. He paid a total of \$276.18 for food for eight different "meetings with constituents" that took place at restaurants. He paid \$52.99 for a monthly Adobe Creative subscription. The remainder was spent on county vehicle maintenance and fuel.

According to July 2020 records, the chairman spent a total of \$930.55. He paid \$286.10 for food for six different "meetings with constituents"

(one of which he had no receipt) and \$79.61 for birthday lunch, flowers and cards for a "Mother Jackie Smith." Banes made a purchase at Parker's Village at St. Simons Island in the amount of \$46.61. There was no receipt and no description of the purchase recorded. He also did not have a receipt for a \$44.38 fuel purchase. The remainder of the purchases were for office supplies, vehicle maintenance and fuel.

August 2020 records showed Banes spent a total of \$793.05. He paid \$394.45 on food for 10 instances described as "meeting with constituents" that took place at restaurants. One of those instances was with only one person listed as Cheneeka Banes, who is the chairman's spouse. The chairman paid \$23.22 for the couple's meal at Skrimp Shack in Covington. During the month, Banes spent \$116.86 on office supplies. He spent \$54.99 on county vehicle maintenance and \$121.22 on fuel. Banes did not file a receipt for one fuel purchase in the amount of \$46.19. He noted "COVID-19" as a reason for no receipt.

A charge of \$105.53 for a taxi/Lyft was also listed, and although Banes noted it was a personal charge, he also pledged to pay the charge back. There were no documents showing if Banes did, in fact, pay the charge.

Banes' September 2020 report showed he spent a total of \$383.52. He paid for food for seven different meetings with constituents at restaurants, totaling \$218.48. The remaining four purchases were for office supplies, vehicle maintenance and fuel.

October 2020 records showed Banes spent a total of \$970.73. He paid for food for 10 different meetings with constituents at restaurants, totaling \$439.60. For three of the meetings, Banes did not keep a receipt, twice citing in statements that his "phone crashed" as the reason. Banes also spent \$314.59 on "chairman and homeless shelter supplies." The remaining balance was spent toward vehicle and office supply expenses.

Banes' spending report for November 2020 showed he spent a total of \$1,220.96. He paid \$475 for a training class for Commissioner Alana Sanders. Banes paid for food for six different meetings with constituents, totaling

\$324.82. Other purchases included office supplies, vehicle maintenance and fuel expenses. December 2020

records showed Banes spent a total of \$1,354.92. He paid \$600 for a training course for former coroner Dorothea Bailey-Butts. He spent \$566.15 on food for nine instances described as "meeting with constituents" that took place at restaurants. He spent \$70.74 on fuel and \$29.99 on "monthly maintenance" for his county vehicle. \$52.99 was spent on a subscription for an office-related item.

January 2021 records showed Banes spent a total of \$1,214.83 with his P-card. He paid a total of \$289.14 for food at five different "meetings with constituents" held at restaurants. A sixth charge for food totaled \$86.88 for a "late executive session" of the Newton County Board of Commissioners. He paid \$271.76 for "work boots for work sites." He also paid \$85.58 for cell phone screen protectors. Remaining purchases were for office supplies, vehicle maintenance and fuel.

Banes' February 2021

records show he spent a total of \$1,512.26 with his P-card. Of the total, \$163.50 was spent at Professional Cleaners for Banes' "uniforms." He paid for two lunches with employees that totaled \$96.45. He also paid for four lunches "with constituents" that cost a total of \$110.51. He purchased an "office television for CNN, MSNBC for COVID-19 monitoring" from Walmart in the amount of \$318 and paid \$7.46 for a warranty plan for the TV. He also paid \$400 for training classes for Commissioner Alana Sanders. The remaining purchases were for office supplies, vehicle

maintenance and fuel. March 2021 records showed Banes spent a total of \$1,371.03. The largest purchase was for a \$510 training course for Commissioner Alana Sanders. Banes paid for seven lunches with constituents, totaling \$229.10. One of the lunches was, again, with his wife, Cheneeka. The two dined at Waffle House for \$30.92. The chairman also paid \$24.34 for a "departmental treat" for the elections department from Bread and Butter Bakery. The remaining purchases included office supplies, fuel and vehicle maintenance.

April 2021 records showed Banes spent a total of \$641.65 with his P-card. Of the total, \$106.08 was on "lunch with constituents" on four different occasions; \$312.57 was on office related expenses and \$223 was spent on "county uniform cleaning.'

Records from May 2021 show Banes spent a total of \$1,553.15 during the month. \$1,164.24 was spent for three different training classes for Commissioners Demond Mason and Alana Sanders. Banes only paid for food for two lunches with constituents, totaling \$72.54. He paid \$212 for "monthly uniform cleaning and maintenance." The remainder of his purchases were for office supplies and vehicle

maintenance. Banes' June 2021 records showed his spending total was \$460.98. The majority of the month's spending was for an educational training class for the county's deputy clerk in the amount of \$325. There was only one "meeting with constituents" recorded that took place at the Town House Cafe, which Banes paid \$33 for food. \$52.99 was paid for a monthly Adobe Creative subscription. \$49.99 was spent on two county vehicle

maintenance details. Over the course of the year, Banes' P-card spending totaled \$12,895.90, according to his spending records Statements confirmed \$3,633.43 (28.2%) was spent on food-related purchases, and of those food related purchases, \$3,346.15 (25.9% of total spending) was spent specifically on food for meetings and lunches

with constituents. **Sheriff Ezell Brown** (\$5,000 monthly

spending limit): For June 2020, Sheriff Ezell Brown used his P-card to spend \$235.46. Purchases included fuel expenses, advertising expenses and an Adobe Creative

monthly subscription. July 2020 records showed similar spending habits to the previous month for Brown. He spent a total of \$188.20 with his P-card. Purchases were for fuel expenses, advertising and an Adobe Creative monthly subscription.

For August 2020, Brown's spending totaled \$1,570,30. The majority of those expenses came from a \$465.54 purchase from Ingles as part of the

sheriff's office Random Acts of Kindness program. He also bought a funeral wreath for Jack Simpson's funeral for \$400. Documents show Brown reimbursed the county for both purchases from the Newton County Sheriff's Office Deputies Who Care Fund.

In September 2020 records, Brown showed a spending total of \$1,128.28, though only making five purchases. His report showed a \$989 purchase from Marquis Who's Who Ventures in New Jersey, which Brown later explained was a personal item charged to his P-card by mistake. "Unfortunately, I

have three debit cards that are the exact same color and very similar in design," Brown wrote in his financial statements dated Sept. 22, 2020.

He said he mistook the county P-card as his own, but wasn't aware of his error until receiving the statement.

"With that being said, I have attached a check for reimbursement to cover the payment," Brown stated. "Since this error, I have written 'Newton County' at the top of my P-card to immediately identify it."

Documents did reveal that Brown submitted a check dated Sept. 21 in the amount of \$989 to pay back the county. From October 2020 to April 2021, there were no other purchas-

es made by Brown that The Covington News deemed questionable, unusual or required explanation, largely in part well-documented bookkeeping by Brown and the finance depart-

Reports from May 2021 snow Brown spent more than usual, totaling \$3,956.62. However, the report was inflated due to an error committed by a vendor. Brown's P-card was mistakenly charged \$1,305.13 twice by "The Award Group" for the purchase of of certificates and frames. The charge was also recorded in the sheriff's June 2021 statements. Through documentation provided by the sheriff, the matter was shown to be resolved. Also within the

June 2021, there was

a \$113.50 charge to

in Covington. Brown stated the charge was an error and the hotel would be sending credit. There were no documents with the month's spending records to confirm credit was given.

spent \$629 on a recruitment testing tool and an operator learning and recertification course for an employee. An "accidental" purchase at Chick-fil-A in the amount of \$3.86 was listed on the statement. Brown noted his intention to make "restitution" but there were no supporting documents.

For September 2020, Brown spent a total of \$575.38. He made two food-related purchases, totaling \$85.38, for a "Water System Strategic Plan" meeting and a luncheon. The remaining balance was for American Water Works Association membership renewals.

Another food purchase came in October 2020 for a "departmental meeting" in the amount of \$91.97. He also spent \$55 on a membership renewal from BJ's Wholesale Club and \$12.84 for cleaning supplies.

Newton County Finance Director Brittany White said the county is given a certain amount of funds each year to pay for "wellness prizes that can include tumblers, coolers and coffee makers, as well as exercise equipment located on the third floor of the administration building— all paid for by the county's insurance provider, Cigna. In addition, those funds also pay for half of the county wellness director's salary. This year, White said, the county received

\$125,000. In January 2021, Brown only spent \$147, which included \$97 at Tubby Tom's for food for a "strategic planning meeting," and a \$50

purchase for classes at the University of Texas at Dallas Erik Johnson School of Engineering and Computer Science.

Brown spent a total of \$955.98 in February 2021. Records show \$93 were for food for a "strategic planning meeting" at Jim N' Nick's Community BBQ restaurant in Conyers. The remaining plans was attributed to business expenditures.

More food purchases were recorded in the March 2021 report, totaling \$38.48 at Little Phillies to supply food for a "departmental meeting.

Spending records for April, May and June 2021 showed Brown collectively spent nearly \$2,500, but all were related to Cornish Creek operations and county vehicle maintenance. No food purchases.



Johnson voted to establish the Grant program which provides support to businesses in the music and entertainment sector forced to close due to pandemic restrictions. The Small Business

Administration (SBA) administered the grants and recipients received funds based on a formula using 2019 gross earned revenue, a spokesman for Johnson

Grants were calculat-

ed for an amount equal to 45% of the recipient's 2019 gross earned revenue or \$10 million, whichever was less, according to the SBA.

The spokesman said congressional offices do not distribute grants or loans to businesses and do not get involved in application processes. The SBA opened

the Grant application portal in April 2021 for operators of live venues, including live venue promoters, theatrical producers, and talent representatives; live performing arts organizations; and movie theatres

Entities that had to shutter their doors in 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic were eligible. That included venues that promoted or booked concerts, plays, dance performances, movie premieres, museum exhibits, and more, the release stated.

For those who are talent representatives, at least 70 percent of operations must involve managing or representing performers, who must be booked at live events and paid

based on ticket sales or entrance fees.

All qualifying applicants must have been fully operational as of

Feb. 29, 2020. The program was initially plagued by technical challenges which have since "been greatly improved," a news release stated.

Plant Vogtle project encounters new delays, higher costs

ATLANTA — Georgia Power's nuclear expansion at Plant Vogtle is being delayed again due to "productivity challenges" and additional time needing for testing and quality assurance, the Atlanta-based utility announced Thursday. Under the new schedule, the

first of two new nuclear reactors being built at the plant south of August isn't expected to go into service until the second quarter

of next year. The second reactor won't be ready until the first quarter of 2023. That amounts to a three- to four-month delay for each reactor. The total capital cost of the

project also is going up by \$460 million, Georgia Power announced. The first of the two new reac-

tors at Plant Vogtle originally was to be completed in 2016, with the second reactor to go into service one year later. But the project has encountered a

number of delays, due in part to the bankruptcy of Westinghouse Electric, the original prime contractor.

The cost of the project has nearly doubled from the original estimate of \$14 billion approved by the Georgia Public Service Commission (PSC) a dozen years ago to about \$26 billion. Georgia Power is partnering with three other utilities on the project. The company's share of the total capital cost is now an estimated \$9.2 billion.



Timberwolves sign former Rams star

A Newton High School alum was eagerly waiting to hear if his basketball dream came true Thursday night. And it did.

Isaiah Miller was sgined by the Minnesota Timberwolves after the National Basketball Association's (NBA) 2021 draft. This is the second straight year that the Timberwolves have signed a former Ram.

The 6-foot, 190-pound point guard enters the league after four years at the University of North

Carolina at Greensboro.

Though his hometown is in New Jersey, Miller was already famous in Covington long before Thursday night.

In his senior season as a Ram, Miller helped lead Newton to a 28-2 record. In the same year, he led the team to the 7A State Quarterfinals, which catapulted them to a No. 4 standings finish in the state of Georgia.

Miller was a Ram for one season during which he averaged 20 points, six rebounds and a little over three steals per con-

Study shows Georgia residents have sixth most auto loan debt

Perhaps no part of daily life changed as much by the COVID-19 pandemic as mobility—how often residents leave their homes and where they go. With stay-at-home orders in effect for large parts of last year, Americans upended their daily routines and, where possible, began working from home, increasing their reliance on delivery services, and avoiding public spaces, including public transportation.

Amid these changes, it wasn't immediately clear how consumer spending and borrowing would be impacted, especially for cars and trucks. On the one hand, people weren't traveling for pleasure or commuting to and from work; on the other, individuals that previously relied on public transportation or rideshare increasingly sought to purchase their own vehicles.

Despite these changes, total auto loan debt continued to grow at the same pace in 2020 as in 2019, according to data from the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. In fact, auto loan debt hit a new record high of \$1.37 trillion last year and now accounts for close to 10% of total household debt.

Fortunately for bor-

rowers, auto lenders were generally as accommodating as credit card and mortgage lenders when granting pandemic forbearances, so the rate of delinquent auto loans, like delinquencies across other loan types, decreased in 2020 after rising for the past half decade.


One of the leading


reasons for the yearslong ascent of auto loan debt and delinquencies has been the steady rise of subprime lending beginning around 2010. Borrowers with the worst credit scores (less than 620) more than doubled the value of new loan originations between 2010 and 2015 to a level that remained relatively stable in the years preceding the

Since the start of the pandemic, however, new dynamics have emerged. Subprime borrowers may still be struggling to make their car payments, but they're not taking out new loans at the same levels. According to data from the New York Fed and Experian, new subprime loan origina-

Alongside rising delinquency rates, auto loan debt has grown to account for nearly 10% of total household debt **CoPilot**





tions dropped quickly in 2020, while borrowers with high credit scores—and also young borrowers—made up the difference. Generation Z consumers grew their auto debt by 12% while Millennials accumulated 6% more vehicle loan debt in 2020 than 2019.

Another factor that changed dramatically in the midst of the pandemic was used car prices. The Consumer Price Index for used vehicles had been steadily declining since the end of 2013 until July 2020, when it began to skyrocket. In just over a year, used car prices increased by 45%, including record spikes of 10% and 10.5% monthover-month in April and June 2021.

For borrowers struggling with their auto loan debt or lease payment, there likely hasn't been a better

time to sell a vehicle and cash in on the high used car prices. The average used car was worth about \$5,000 more in July than in the spring, according to the CarGurus Index. The one catch for potential sellers? Record low inventory of both new and used vehicles means that finding a replacement won't be

To find out where borrowers are having the hardest time paying their auto loans, researchers at CoPilot analyzed data from the New York Fed and Experian, then ranked states by the percentage of auto loans that were at least 90 days delinquent at the end of 2020. Researchers also reported the percentage of total household debt accounted for by auto loans, total auto loans per capita, and the average credit score in

each state. The analysis found that the overall auto loan delinquency rate in Georgia is 6.08%, compared to 4.76% at the national level. Out of all states, Georgia has the sixth most auto loan debt. Here is a summary of the data for Georgia:


