SUSPECT KILLED, DEPUTY WOUNDED

GBI called on to investigate Newton County officer-involved shooting at Hwy. 162 residence

COVINGTON, Ga. — The Georgia Bureau of Investigation has identified the suspect killed in an officer-involved shooting Tuesday night in south Newton County.

Alexander Matthew Collins, 27, of Covington,

was shot and killed by a Newton County sheriff's deputy after reportedly pulling out a handgun and wounding a

deputy at a residence in the 3400 block of Georgia Hwy.

Newton County Sheriff's Office spokesperson Caitlin Jett said deputies were initially called to the home in the Rocky Plains area in relation to a wanted person


Collins had outstanding warrants for aggravated assault, false imprisonment, and pointing a gun at another person, the GBI stated in a news release.

Jett said when deputies arrived at 5:44 p.m., the suspect barricaded himself inside the house.

"Collins was located inside the residence while deputies negotiated with him to surrender. The NCSO SWAT Team was also deployed during the standoff," the GBI release stated.

After deputies were able

Hose drops at Station No. 8

Officials celebrate opening of state's first fire station with decontamination unit

OXFORD, Ga. — One of Georgia's first fire stations built with a decontamination area designed to lower firefighters' cancer risk officially opened for business Thursday, June 24, in north Newton County.

Newton County elected officials, staff members and Newton County Fire Service firefighters and administrators participated in a ceremonial "hose drop" — the equivalent of a ribbon cutting — to officially open the new Fire Station No. 8 in Ox-

The \$2.7 million facility at 2345 Gum Creek Road will serve a part of unincorporated Newton County roughly between Gum Creek Road on the south and the Walton County

line on the north. Fire Chief Mike Conner said the station was "kind of a concept" that was the product of a building committee of firefighters and elected

officials. "This station has kind of a cancer initiative that we tried to implement into this station," Conner said.

He noted studies have found firefighters have a much higher rate of cancer than the overall popula-

tion because of the often hazardous materials with which they come in contact when fighting fires.

"It's because of our jobs," Conner said.

The decontamination process in the new station begins when firefighters return from a fire and leave their equipment outside for cleaning, said Jeff Prine, the county's project manager.

Firefighters then enter the decon-

tamination unit — located off the truck bay — and clean and wash their personal equipment, such as their suit, in a room before showering in a separate area.

This prevents them from entering the living space covered with any contaminants that can spread to other firefighters.

"It sounds simple but it takes a lot

Davis speaks to Newton Republicans

Opens up on return to coroner's office, cloudy future of position

COVINGTON, Ga. — The county's interim coroner says he already had experienced one hazard of the job to which he returned in late May.

Interim Coroner Tommy Davis showed off a brace on his wrist as he spoke during a meeting of the Newton County Republican Party Tuesday.

"I got called down to the woods to do some coroner work,

tripped, fell and cracked my hand," Davis said.

State law requires a coroner to be notified about deaths that occur as a result of such factors as violence or suicide, sudden death when in apparent good health, and death in any suspicious or unusual manner, especially those 16 years of age and

Davis has served in the position since May 26 when he was appointed to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Dorothea Bailey-Butts.

A Covington funeral home owner, Davis served three terms as coroner before losing a reelection bid to Bailey-Butts in November 2020.

Bailey-Butts resigned May 26 after almost five months in office. She said a number of factors affected her decision, including a threatened lack of cooperation from other county first-responders and outdated views of her competency because she is

Probate Judge Melanie Bell issued an order the same day as Bailey-Butts' resignation and appointed Davis to fill the vacancy.

Davis said Bell conferred with Probate Court judges statewide before issuing the order.

"This is not something that she



to get the suspect out of the home, Jett said that's when shots were exchanged.

The GBI confirmed that around 8:27 p.m., Collins came out of the house and the SWAT Team tried to take him into custody. Collins then pulled out a handgun and fired at deputies, injuring one. One deputy returned fire, striking Collins.

"Our officer was wounded, and the suspect was pronounced deceased by the coroner," Jett

The deputy was transported to an Atlanta hospital for treatment. The severity of the deputy's wound or wounds was not released. The deputy's identity was not disclosed.

"It is a tragic incident," Jett said. "[The suspect] was a resident of this community, so our hearts do go out to his family, regardless of the situation.

"And on behalf of Sheriff Ezell Brown, we

do want to extend our hearts to the officer who is at the hospital right now and wish him a speedy recovery," she said Tuesday night. Wednesday morning, Jett said, the officer

was released from the hospital and "doing

Jett said the GBI was notified of the officer-involved shooting and has since taken over the investigation.

The GBI Medical Examiner's Office in Decatur will perform an autopsy on Collins, the state agency reported. It will complete an independent investigation and turn over its findings to the Alcovy Judicial Circuit District Attorney's office for review, the agency stated.

of effort and design to get to that

point," said Prine. The contaminants can include

any number of cancer-causing agents found within more than 100 chemicals released when materials burn, as well as asbestos in older structures.

An International Association of Firefighters research study showed that cancer was the disease that caused the most death among firefighters, with cancer causing a 61% rate of career lineof-duty deaths among firefighters between 2002 and 2017.

"In these fires, they come into contact with all of these carcinogens — plastics and stuff — and it's absorbed through our skin," Conner said. "We have a very, very high rate of cancer in the fire service."

Prine said the \$2.7 million station was completed under budget and on time with three truck bays, a decontamination area and office and living space.

The building also was designed to be an "emergency event stage" with an electric generator to provide emergency power so it can remain online during a major event, Prine said.

Newton County Fire Service formerly responded to the north Oxford area from Station 9 on

Mt. Zion Road, which is about five miles from the new station site, and Station 1 in Covington, officials said.

Insurance companies in the U.S. typically use a rating from one to 10 by a company called Insurance Services Office (ISO) that rates how well a fire department is equipped to serve homes and businesses within a geographic area.

One is the best possible rating while a 10 means the fire department did not meet ISO's minimum requirements.

Conner said some north Newton residents formerly saw lower insurance rates because they lived close enough to take advantage of a mutual aid agreement with Walton County's fire department.

However, many others in the area did not live within five road miles of a station or a source of water for fighting fires which the

In recent years, the ISO rating of those residents' homes increased and their homeowner insurance rates "went through the roof," Conner said.

With the completion of Station 8 and Station 4 under construction in eastern Newton, about 96% of all county residents will

live within five road miles of a fire station and likely see reduced insurance rates, he said.

ECONOMY SLOWED CONSTRUCTION

Conner said the station's construction was included in the voter-approved 2011 Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax. However, officials did not begin work to complete the project until 2019, he said.

Former District 3 commissioner Nancy Schulz said sales tax collections were slow during the economic downturn in which the 2011 SPLOST was approved. The county also was unable to use bond financing based on the 2011 SPLOST, Schulz said.

"Consequently, we had to wait until we received a substantial portion of the collections to begin each project," she said.

Schulz, who served from 2009 to 2020, said she worked with her District 3 predecessor, Ester Fleming, and his son, former District 5 commissioner Tim Fleming, on the project.

She said the project was slowed as the county focused on finding a site for Station 8 in northeastern Newton from 2014 to 2018.

did on her own," Davis

Bailey-Butts' term was to end on Dec. 31, 2024. Bell's order cited Georgia law in stating that Davis will "fill the vacancy and serve out the unexpired term of office of Dorothea Bailey-Butts until his successor shall be duly elected and qualified."

"(Bell's order) means to me three and a half years in office," Davis

Georgia law concerning a "vacancy" in the office of coroner states, "In the event a vacancy occurs in the office of coroner, the judge of the probate court shall appoint a person to serve out the unexpired term of office and until his successor shall be duly elected and quali-

fied." Davis said he did not like the way a resignation led him to be returned to the office. "I hate the way it happened," he said.

He also said he hated "everything about the way that it went down," including Bailey-Butts feeling the need to resign from the office rather than completing a full term.

But Davis said he was "proud to be

serving Newton County again" after being the Newton County coroner from 2009 to 2020.

He said he told County Chairman Marcello Banes and County Manager Lloyd Kerr that he would "pick up back where I was" to continue his previous work as coroner "with compassion and integrity and doing the right thing when sometimes it's very difficult to do."

Davis also said he was "ready to face the challenge" if county government officials decide to call a special election to elect someone to serve the remainder of the term

"I don't know what's going to happen in the next few months," Davis said.

County officials said after Bailey-Butts' resignation that a special election would be called between 120 and 365 days from May 28,2021 — or between Sept. 25, 2021, and May 28, 2022.

Georgia law states that a special election should be called, "If an election fails to fill the office of coroner."

It says if a special election is called in an odd-numbered year, such as 2021, dates for the election remaining this year include the third Tuesday in September or the Tuesday after the first Monday in November. In 2021, those dates would be Sept. 21 and Nov. 2.

Davis said after the Tuesday meeting he had not decided if he would be a candidate in a special election if one is called. However, he told the

audience Tuesday night that if a special election is called he would "face that challenge" like others "with a smile on our face."

He also told audience members he hoped no special election would be called because it would be an extra cost to the county.

Gabriel M. White, who lost to Bailey-Butts in 2020 for the Democratic nomination, announced recently he planned to run for coroner in a special election.

Newton County officials had not commented on the status of a call for a special election as of noon Friday.

County Board of Elections Chairman Phil Johnson said on Wednesday, June 23, the county had not sent the board any notices

about beginning the process of organizing an election.

Johnson added that state law specifies dates for conducting special elections. A countywide special election this year would strain the elections office's resources because it will also be conducting municipal elections around the same time, including a three-week

advance voting period, he said.

ard to believe that it has been six months ∟since I lost my soulmate, my anchor, my best friend. In

But you can't take them back and you beat yourself up for having made unnecessary mountains out of mole hills. Thank God, she always forgave me even if it is still sometimes hard to forgive myself.

Then you remember the good times. She would be the first to tell you that she had a great run. A midlife change from mother and homemaker to a college graduate with a nursing degree and a rewarding career at Delta Air Lines. Trips to her beloved vacation home at piano. Haggling over the price of a bushel of beans at the Farmers Market. (She always won.) Meeting presidents and first ladies. Her feigned indignation at being referred to in this space as "The Woman Who Shares My Name." (Secretly, she loved it.) Her 5 p.m. "Wine Time," a hallowed daily ritual. Her pride in being a grandmother and great grandmother. All of this swirls through

your head. All day. Every day. Grief one minute. A good memory the next. And then there are all the

"firsts." The first Christmas. The first birthday. The first anniversary. The first time back at church in our old pew. The first trip to St. Simons without her. (Probably the hardest one of all.)

If you aren't careful, you can find yourself wallowing in self-pity and making things uncomfortable for those around you who want to help but don't know what to say or do. That is where perspective comes in.

At lunch not long after her going-home service, my grandson reminded me that while a lot of people go through what I was going through, many don't have the strong support system I do. Out of the mouth of grandsons. Even though this grandson is a schoolteacher/ coach with a Ph.D. It was a gamechanger.

I have been sustained by the care and concern from my family and my friends. I think about having to navigate this difficult journey without them. I'm not sure I could. There are the phone calls, the cards, emails,

grocery shop, to drive me wherever I need to go, to treat me to lunch. I don't know what I have done to deserve such kindness. I think it is because I married someone who touched so many lives with her own innate kindness. I am just the beneficiary. On our refrigerator is a

magnet that says, "Coincidence is God's way of remaining anonymous." It was one of her favorite sayings. We would laugh at how God was doing things in our lives that we would say were coincidental but we both knew better. We used to call them "God moments."

While at St. Simons trying to wrestle with the memories, I agreed to accompany my daughter-in-law to a small silver shop in the village as she shopped for a

Looking in the display case, I noticed a small sign that read, "To Life! I am living. I am blessed." Next to it was a bracelet with the Hebrew symbol representing "Chaia," a word meaning "life." A coincidence? I don't think so and neither would she. It was her way – and God's – of telling me that she blessed my life and to now embrace every precious moment I have left on this earth.

The sign sits on my laptop and the bracelet is on my wrist. It is a daily reminder that life goes on and I must, as well. That is what she would want. I owe her that and so very much more.

Jones must overcome obstacles in gubernatorial race

ernon Jones can be described as a typical politician in many ways.

wind is blowing a certain direction, then Jones wants



to follow along. Jones was a lifelong Democrat and was elected as such to various offices. Now he is a full-time Republican and wants to be the next governor of Georgia. Talk about doing an about face.

Just a short time ago seeking statewide office in Georgia as a Republican was not that difficult. But Jones faces some obstacles on the course.

First, Brian Kemp is running for reelection as a Republican. His 2018 campaign used some silly but effective tactics. He talked about having his shotgun ready for would-be suitors of his daughter. Behind closed doors you have to wonder

Gov. Geoff Duncan and Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger, came under intense fire following the 2020 election. Ironically, none of the three Republicans were even on the ballot.

When Donald Trump lost the state of Georgia to Democratic challenger Joe Biden, many in Georgia faulted the trio. When each began speaking out that voter fraud did not exist, the banter got even hotter.

Raffensperger took the most criticism. It reached a point where his family had to go into hiding for a time after homes were broken into. Kemp came to the defense of Raffensperger, but eventually Kemp realized his key to reelection in 2022 was to ease off that defense and begin impressing voter fraud.

Kemp would later sign a new voting law into law which has drawn criticism from many, including Major League Baseball which pulled this year's All-Star game from Atlanta. That move cost the state millions of dollars.

Jones meanwhile was a very vocal supporter of Trump during the 2020 election. Jones had great value as a long-time Democrat who was now campaigning for the other side. He was seen crowd surfing at a Trump rally in Macon.

In recent months, Jones has decided Kemp did not do enough to make sure President Trump won Georgia's electoral votes. As a result, Jones is now running in the Republican primary for governor in 2022.

Most of the news from the Jones campaign centers on how Kemp has not and is not doing enough to declare Trump the winner of Georgia's 2020 vote. Even if, in theory, that was to happen, Trump would still not have enough electoral votes to win.

Recent polls, however, among Republicans show that 30% believe Trump is somehow going to be returned to the White House, not after the 2024 election but in the year 2021.

Jones is banking on making Kemp as anti-Trump as possible. It is a strategy that will almost certainly win him a good slice of the

GOP primary voters next year.

Educator Kandiss Taylor is also running in the GOP primary for governor against Kemp and Jones. Taylor ran in the 2020 "jungle primary" for US Senate and has built a strong grassroots level of support. Her campaign has centered on many of the topics that Jones talks about including an audit of the 2020 Georgia vote.

It is certain more names could enter the Republican primary for governor. Kemp is certainly vulnerable and Jones has pointed out that with Stacey Abrams the likely Democratic nominee, that it would take another African-American candidate like himself to defeat her.

Abrams came within an eyelash of winning the 2018 election. Two years later the Republican tide which has swept over Georgia for decades ended up receding somewhat with both US Senate seats going to Democratic. This was in addition to the outcome of the

presidential election

here. No word yet on if Kemp's shotgun will make a return in 2022. The governor should know that stereotypical slogans might not be enough to win a second

Kemp is in for a tough battle in continuing his political career. As the incumbent he is still the favorite to win the GOP nomination but he then faces

a well-organized and well-funded Democrat for the general election.

Will Kemp be Georgia's governor by the time 2023 arrives? Right now the odds are about even.

Stop, read, apply: Pesticide safety for homeowners

As Georgians head into summer, problems with weeds, diseases and insects in the landscape and around vegetable gardens can be

Some of these pest problems can be solved without the use of chemicals, but if the pest population reaches damaging levels, using pesticides may be warranted. Remember that using pesticides is safe and legal but requires reading and following label directions in their entirety.

The first step is properly identifying the pest or problem in order to select the correct control method. The local University of Georgia Cooperative Extension agent can help in selecting the correct pesticide and recommended application rate.

Once that is determined, it is very important for users' safety and for the environment that users follow all label directions and safety precautions.

The pesticide label gives users all the information needed to safely and effectively use the product, and users should never take liberties with label directions. For example, doubling a recommended rate will not achieve quicker results and can have an adverse effect on the intended site.

Follow these guidelines when using a chemical pesticide:

 Read the label before you buy or use the product and make sure that it is registered for the pest and site you intend to treat. Observe signal words like DANGER,

WARNING and CAUTION. These signal words tell the user how toxic a product is if it gets on or enters the body.

- Read the entire label and follow all instructions. The label will have important information about storing pesticides, disposing of excess pesticide, handling spills, first aid, and poison control.
- Observe all safety precautions on the label. Examples include "Keep out of reach of children" and "Do not use near fire, sparks or

- Wear proper protective clothing as listed on the label. This should include liquid-proof gloves and shoes, long-sleeved shirt, long pants and a wide-brimmed hat.
- Do not eat, drink, smoke or go to the bathroom while handling pesticides. Wash your hands before and after use.
- Observe the reentry periods before allowing pets and people into the treated area. Make recently treated areas

off-limits until it's safe.

- Avoid mixing pesticides near wells or open water. It's critical to avoid contaminating water sources.
- Do not apply pesticides to blooming plants. This is especially important if honey bees or other pollinating insects are visiting them. If you have to spray, do so early in the evening and use a non-dust formulation.
- Evaluate your control efforts. If it is unsatisfactory, consider these possibilities: correct identification of pest, using the correct pesticide

on the correct site, timely treatment, old product or pest resistance to the pesticide. Rain can also hinder treatment effectiveness.

If you come across a product that has been sitting in a storage shed or no longer has a label, contact your county Extension agent for help. It may be tempting to just mix a little and spray, but that's not a good idea. Most product labels can be found at greenbook.net. Follow the exact instructions to ensure your safety and to achieve the best results. You should never use a product that you are unsure about. Remember that the safe and legal use of pesticides requires that the entire label be followed exactly.

Former teacher pleads guilty to obscene contact with child

COVINGTON, Ga. - Aformer Newton County middle school teacher who had served as a teen's mentor pleaded guilty Thursday to an internet porn charge related to his request the boy videotape himself for the teacher's pleasure.

Former seventh-grade math teacher Winfred Akins, 48, of Covington, pleaded guilty to one felony count of Obscene Internet Contact with a Child in a negotiated plea in Newton County Superior Court Thursday, June 24.

Judge Layla Zon accepted the plea and sentenced Akins to 10 years, with the first three in confinement and the remainder on probation.

"There's something wrong with an individual who would prey upon innocent young men," Zon told Akins during the hearing.

She told Akins he would be classified as a sex offender and ordered him not to

have contact with children under age 16.

The judge also said she did not want him to go "off the radar" if he moved from his Henry

County home. She ordered Akins to notify Newton County Superior Court if he changed residences because of her concerns he would become involved with a new group of youths as he went through the "bureaucracy" of linking

"I don't trust you around children," Zon said.

with a new probation officer.

The judge also allowed the boy's mother to read a victim impact statement Thursday.

She said she had trusted Akins enough to allow him to mentor her 14-year-old son. He had visited her church and told an audience during a public event the boy was an "inspiration" to

others, she said.

"And 'blah, blah, blah' and all the other jibberish," she said. "Not knowing the day I asked you to mentor my son would be a day I would

She said she now has a strained relationship with her

The woman said she is a single mother and endured physical ailments from the mental anguish she went through for allowing Akins access to her son.

"The defendant convinced my son he had no one to turn to," she said.

The ailment also kept her from working at times, despite being a sole provider for her family. Akins declined to speak.

Zon noted prosecutors had

said the 14-year-old victim had found it odd that he was being asked to share images of himself with his teacher.

"I think that the mother's words summarized just a small part of the damage you've done in the community," Zon told Akins.

Akins had worked in two counties as a teacher and had "years of direct involvement" with young students before working in Newton County, said Assistant District Attorney Alex Stone during a September bond hearing.

She said Akins, who was married with two children, also had mentored a church youth group but was told to leave the job after he allegedly made advances toward a group member during a trip to Orlando, Florida.

He worked as a teacher at Liberty Middle School for two years and served as a step team coach and a student mentor.

The investigation into the charges began when the victim's mother told a sheriff's deputy on Aug. 11, 2020, that she had discovered her 14-year-old son received messages by phone from Akins in December 2019.

Akins had asked the boy to videotape himself committing a sex act so the suspect could watch it and tell him if he was doing it correctly, Stone said.

Stone said sheriff's office investigators then secured a search warrant for Akins' home Aug. 28, 2020, and seized electronic devices, including computers and cell

They also seized a list of "multiple" names of potential victims, and a pencil case containing names and images on what appeared to be replicas of temporary driver's licenses, Stone said.

After his Aug. 28 arrest, he resigned from his teaching job six days later after being charged with child molestation and computer pornography crimes.

Zon denied Akins' request for a bond to be set during the September hearing because of his alleged actions to convince his wife to remove files from a cell phone that was part of the investigation.

Covington council OKs 2021-2022 budget

Records show nearly \$14M increase from last year

COVINGTON, Ga. — Council members unanimously approved a \$142 million budget for the city to operate with over the 2021-2022 fiscal year.

According to records provided by the city, the budget amount was a nearly \$14 million increase from the previous fiscal year. For 2020-2021, the budget was \$128 million.

While estimated revenues for the city totaled \$142,509,003 for the new year, expenditures were totaled at \$142,104,611, leaving \$404,392 earmarked as contingency funds.

The majority of the budget increase appeared to be mostly

pointed toward salary increases for city employees across nearly all departments. Exceptions were the mayor and council (\$72,000 - no change),Utility Billing/Meter Reading employees (\$266,265 — decrease of \$57,384), Auto Repair Shop employees (\$243,860 decrease of \$30,659), and

Cemetery and Parks employees (\$80,847 — decrease of \$16,862). The city estimated a slight

decrease in general property tax revenue for the new fiscal year (\$5.3 million) than the previous year (\$5.4 million). Sales tax revenue was an-

ticipated to increase by about \$800,000 in 2021-2022.

The police department will have an annual operating expense of \$8.8 million — the highest of all departments

— followed by the fire department's expense total of \$6.3 million. The city's street department will try to operate with a cap of \$1.94 million.

Other notable expense totals by department:

Administration – \$1.6 million Planning & Zoning – \$1.3

Engineering – \$1.1 million. Marketing/Communications – \$1.03 million Elected Officials – \$543,591

It appears Elija Godwin will be heading to Tokyo after all.

The former Newton Ram and current Georgia Bulldog placed sixth in the U.S. Olympic Track & Field Trials at Hayward Field in Eugene, Ore., last weekend. He ran a 44.94 in the 400m final. the third-fastest time for a collegiate sprinter in the event, but missed the cut to automatically qualify for the Tokyo Olympics.

This week, however, the University of Georgia athletic department announced Godwin had been named as a relay leg for Team USA.

Wednesday morning, Georgia's Track & Field twitter account sent out a photo of Godwin walking in a Team USA sweatshirt

while hauling luggage that had Nike and Team USA logos imprinted on them. The picture was accompanied by a caption, which read: "Know what that means if Elija Godwin is leaving #TrackFieldTrials21 in Oregon with Team USA gear?? Ticket PUNCHED."

Godwin's selection to the Team USA relay team was later confirmed on GeorgiaDogs.com, the official website for University of Georgia athletics.

Godwin, a junior, has been nothing short of historic thus far in 2021. He set the record for the fastest indoor 400m relay leg in collegiate history with a 44.21 and shattered several program records for the Bulldogs during the SEC Outdoor Championships.

Finding the right nursing facility

The quality of care a facility can provide should be the utmost priority, but the value of choosing a facility that's close to loved ones cannot be understated, especially for seniors who will be moving in for a lengthy period of time. Routine visits from loved ones can lift the spirits of SNF residents. In addition, AARP® notes that regular visitors can scrutinize care and serve as residents' advocates if they feel their concerns are not being satisfactorily addressed by staff members.

• Visit facilities in person. Online ratings can provide some insight into a facility, but nothing can replace the value of an in-person visit. The American Health Care Association urges families to observe a facility in person so they can gauge its overall environment and whether or not it seems like a peaceful or chaotic place. each week. Physical limitations are a part of aging. But seniors need not let such limitations relegate them to repetitive, boring workouts.





Adults confront various age-related side effects as they transition from middle age to their golden years. Skin may begin to wrinkle and hair may turn gray, but those are just the visible side effects of aging. Many additional effects are unseen, but those changes can have a profound effect on adults'

quality of life. According to the Mayo Clinic, various parts of the body are affected by aging. For example, the cardiovascular system changes as people grow older. Blood vessels and arteries stiffen as adults age, forcing the heart to work harder to pump

blood through them. Though many changes are linked to aging,

other changes com-

monly associated with aging, such as a decline in memory, reasoning and other thinking skills, are not natural. The Alzheimer's Association® notes that dementia is not a normal part of aging. There are many different types of dementia, including Alzheimer's disease. and these are the result of damage to brain cells that affect a person's ability to communicate. That damage is not inevitable, even if it's commonly associated with aging.

The Harvard Medical School notes that fleeting memory problems experienced with aging often reflect normal changes in the structure and function of the brain. But it's important that those

Figuring doctor visit frequency



Routine health checkups are a key part of staying healthy. Older adults may feel like they're always visiting one doctor or another. But what is an acceptable frequency for doctor appointments?

The answer isn't always so cut and dry, and many health professionals have mixed feelings even among themselves over the magic number. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends adults over the age of 65 visit the doctor more than twice as often as 18- to 44-year-olds. According to Paul Takahashi, a physician at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., adults should see their primary care physicians at least once a year to make sure diseases are being properly managed and to stay current on preventative screenings.

Visiting the doctor more frequently does not necessarily add up to better health, and it actually can do the opposite. Dr. Peter Abadir, an associate professor of medicine at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, says frequent visits to health facilties where sick people congregate puts one at a higher risk of illness or infection. Visiting the doctor only when necessary is one way to avoid risky exposure.

Doctor visit frequency is not a one-size-fits-all answer. A yearly physical or checkup is a given, even for people who are healthy. People with a family history of certain conditions, like sleep disorders, cancer, high blood pressure, and other conditions, may need to see a doctor more frequently than those with no such histories. In addition, patients may need referrals to certain specialists who work together to provide an overall health plan. That can

increase the number of appointments and shorten the intervals between them. Johnson Memorial Health offers some statis-

- People visit the doctor four times a year on average.
- Studies show that poor or uninsured people prolong the time between doctor's visits.
- Individuals with high blood pressure may need to see the doctor four times a year to ensure medications are working properly.
- Patients on dialysis see the doctor several times a week.

Dr. Jennifer Caudle, a family physician and assistant professor at Rowan University School of Osteopathic Medicine in Stratford, New Jersey, says too often people visit the doctor only when they are really sick. That works to their disadvantage because the appointment will focus only on treating the illness instead of addressing other preventative care and screenings. Balance is neces-

sary in regard to health care. Patients can work together with their doctors to develop screening schedules that are customized to their particular profiles. These schedules can be modified as health history information changes or as patients age. Doctors can dial back or increase health visits as needed.





- Do I have firm feelings about life-saving methods? A living will allows you to spell out preferences on insertion of feeding tubes, if you want specialized hydration, if you want to be hooked up to life support if brain function is minimal, and a host of other scenarios.
- Is cost preventing me from drafting a living will? Cost need not be a factor in setting up a living will. You can download a free template from any number of online legal sources. Local hospitals often have forms as well, which can be notarized for only a few dollars.
- Have you selected a trusted person to carry out wishes? A health care proxy, according to the American Bar Association, is a person appointed by you with the authority to make decisions for you if you are unable to express your preferences for medical treatment. Together with the living will, the health care proxy, also called a durable medical power of attorney, can fulfill your wishes accordingly.

mortgage; downsizing a home to have a lower rent or mortgage payment; refinancing a home to a fixed-rate loan so that costs are predictable; and taking on a tenant to offset costs.

• Food: The cost of food will not change dramatically, but it can eat into your budget. Even though food costs may decline when there's only two mouths to feed, food and beverage spending may go up due to more leisure time and dining out. Utilize senior discounts by shopping on days when stores offer percentages off purchases. Save money on restaurant spending by eating out at lunch instead of dinner, splitting plates or skipping

appetizers. Healthcare: Experts warn while many expenses decline in retirement, health care spending increases. Studies show, the average 65-year-old couple retiring in 2020 in the U.S. needed roughly \$295,000 just to cover their retirement health care expenses. Those with family histories of severe illnesses or those with preexisting conditions will need even more. Roughly half of the population will need long-term care at some point, and that requires advanced budgeting. Many people find that Medicare supplement plans can bridge the gap in expenses that government-run plans will not cover. Saving through a health savings account when employed can create extra cash on hand for retirement

- Continue learning. HMS notes that a higher level of education is associated with improved mental functioning in old age. The reasons for that are unknown, but experts theorize that advanced education compels people to remain mentally active, which in turn helps them maintain a strong memory. Even aging men and women who are still working in challenging fields can benefit from pursuing a new hobby or learning a new skill.
- Use the tools at your disposal. It may seem counterintuitive to suggest that organizational tools like planners, maps and lists can help people maintain their memories. However,

to remember what to buy at the store makes it harder to learn new and important things.

• Let all your senses play a role. HMS reports that the more senses a person uses to learn something, the more his or her brain is involved in retaining a memory. HMS cites one study in which adults were shown a series of emotionally neutral images that were each presented along with a smell. Participants were not asked to recall what they saw, but were later shown a set of images and asked to indicate which they had previously seen. The participants had excellent recall for the odor-paired images, and researchers believe that's because additional parts of the brain were activated when participants were asked to use more than one sense.

Memory loss is not an inevitable side effect of aging, especially for adults who take steps to maintain their memories as they age.

What seniors should know about herbal medicines

A lifelong commitment to healthy living can improve life expectancy and quality of life while reducing a person's risk for various conditions and diseases, including cancer and heart disease.

Healthy lifestyle choices like eating a nutritious diet and exercising regularly can greatly reduce a person's risk for various ailments, but such choices don't eliminate that risk entirely. As a result, even health-conscious men and women may need to rely on medication to stay healthy. That's especially true for seniors since age is a risk factor

for various conditions. A 2014 analysis that appeared in the Archives of Gerontology and Geriatrics examined nearly 1,300 published articles that focused on the use of herbal supplements by elderly patients. Though only 16 of those articles met the researchers' criteria, the analysis concluded that herbal supplement usage is common among elderly patients, as was a lack of dialogue about such supplements between medical professionals and seniors. A concerted effort to initiate such dialogue on the part of both patients and health care providers can help shed light on herbal medicines so people taking them, including seniors, can learn more about what they're putting into their bodies.


What are herbal medicines? The National Health Service of the United Kingdom, a widely respected and publicly funded health care system, describes herbal medicines as those with active ingredients made from plant parts like leaves, roots or flowers. Because herbal medicines are

made from plant parts, many people assume they're safe to take without consulting a physician. However, the NHS urges people to treat herbal medicines with the same care and respect as they would more conventional medicines. Herbal medicines can affect the body in various ways. A frank discussion with a physician can shed light on the potential side effects of herbal medicines and whether or not they're safe.

Why should seniors be concerned about herbal medicines?

The NHS notes that seniors taking other medications may experience problems if they begin taking herbal medicines as well. The National Center for Complementary and Integrative Health, which is part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, notes that more well-designed studies are necessary to fully evaluate interactions between herbal medicines and prescription drugs. However, the NC-CIH notes that some evidence points to some harmful effects of mixing the two. For example, the NCCIH reports that prolonged exposure to concentrated garlic extracts may reduce the efficacy of some drugs. The potential for these types of interactions should be enough to compel seniors to think twice before taking herbal medicines without first consulting their physicians. In addition, the NHS has developed a list of various types of people for whom herbal medicines may not be suitable, and

that list includes the elderly.


