

Commissioners vote 3-2 to change course amid fears of legal ramifications

COVINGTON, Ga. — Tempers flared at times Tuesday night as Newton commissioners narrowly reversed a previous vote to donate funds for the county's annual Juneteenth celebration.

The Newton County Board of Commissioners voted 3-2 to rescind the May 4 motion that led to a vote to donate \$1,500

to the nonprofit Newton County Historical Committee on Black Heritage Preservation that is organizing the event June 19 and 20 at Legion Field.

One commissioner seeking the rescission said he was worried the board may have violated state law by voting to give public funds to a nonprofit and wanted a written policy in place.

However, District 4 Commissioner J.C. Henderson objected to the recission and accused three "Republicans" of not wanting to support the event before they asked Chairman Marcello Banes to place the matter on Tuesday's agenda.

"The reason why we're rescinding the vote is we've got ... three Republicans who don't want to support \$1,500 for Juneteenth day," Henderson said.

Commissioners approve nonprofit funding policy

Requires entities to show 'substantial benefit' to county

COVINGTON, Ga. — Newton County's governing board has approved a new policy specifying that nonprofits seeking funding must

prove their "substantial benefit" to the county before it will consider giving them

County Attorney Megan Martin told the Newton County Board of Commissioners on Tuesday that she

created the External Appropriations Policy to make sure the board "is not conferring a gratuity upon (nonprofits) in violation of the

Georgia Constitution." The new policy specifies procedures and timing for nonprofits to apply for and receive county funding - and for the Board to review its effects afterward.

Martin said it would allow the county to treat all groups in a consistent manner while allowing it to defend against court challenges from groups to which it denies funding.

"I cannot say enough about how important it is that we be consistent with how these are handled," Martin

County cuts ribbon on splash pad at Denny Dobbs Park

Newton County government officials hosted a ribbon-cutting and demonstration of the county's new splash pad at Denny Dobbs Park Thursday, May 20

The water recreation facility in the west Newton County park is designed with a Hollywood theme befitting its placement within the "Hollywood of the South."

The project cost an estimated \$260,000 with funding from SPLOST and a \$2,000 donation from funds raised by Harrison Kirkham as part of an Eagle Scout project.

Kirkham, the son of Joshua and Amanda Kirkham, originated the design for the splash pad in 2016 and it evolved into a water park designed for children of all abilities to enjoy. It opens to the public May 29.

1994 killer has chance for release; Monroe mayor pens letter of opposition

COVINGTON, Ga. - A woman who was convicted of the murder of her ex-boyfriend has a chance at getting out of prison.

Rhonda Rene Vining was found guilty of killing Rodney Spence Singleton on Dec. 14, 1994, in Covington. She pleaded guilty to

felony murder and was sentenced to life in prison. Vining

is cur-Vining rently serving a life sentence at Arrendale State Prison in northeast Georgia.

Vining was 21 and a student at Emory University when she chased Singleton down and shot him in the upper torso.

Covington police were called to a location in the 5110 block of Emory Street Northwest, where they found Singleton on the ground with gunshot wounds. Vining was at the

home they had shared on Hillside Drive, where their argument had begun. She barricaded herself inside the home and threatened suicide, and at one point set fire to the home.

However, after negotiations with a Covington police sergeant, Vining gave up and exited the home through a window and was arrested.

Singleton later died at Newton General Hospital, now Piedmont Newton Hospital.

Covington News archives show Vining had a record of violent behavior, including a conviction of beating a woman in the face a few years prior to shooting Singleton.

The relationship between Vining and Singleton reportedly was a rocky one, with her allegedly filing a false police report in an attempt to keep him from leaving her.

Vining initially pleaded not guilty by reason of insanity. It was revealed she left the


run a campaign with integrity and focus on the people. My motto is 'Here

The Newton High

School graduate remains undecided on which post she'll be running for in the West

Ward but intends to announce her decision closer to qualifying, which is slated for Aug. 16-20 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day at city hall. Two posts in the

West Ward are up for election in Covington, including Post 2 and Post 3. Post 2 is currently held by longtime councilwoman Hawnethia Williams. Scotty Scoggins announced in March his intentions to run for Post 2. Williams has yet to publicly announce her decision to run for another term in office.

Post 3 is currently held by Anthony Henderson, who has also yet to publicly announce his reelection bid. In February, Henderson was reportedly accused of violating election laws during the 2017 election cycle and bound over to the state Attorney General's Office for prosecution. No other candidates have come forward to run for Post 3.

Covington council OKs water, sewer territory swap with county

City would add new Eastside High School property, gain \$868,400 in assets if both parties agree

— A proposal to swap a handful of water and sewer territories with the Newton County Water and Sewer Authority would be "favorable" for the city, if approved by the county.

During its regular

meeting Monday, May 17, the Covington City Council voted unanimously to approve the territory proposal presented by Planning & Development Director Tres Thomas. He said the proposed deal would help optimize both the city and county's water and sewer systems.

"We wanted to make the system more efficient," Thomas said.
"We wanted to eliminate the pass-throughs, which means maybe we have the water and somebody else has the sewer, or vice versa.
We like to have the water and sewer together. So, we wanted to make sure that we could try to do that in all areas possible."

The proposed swap included the following areas:

- Old Atlanta Highway with the city picking up the area spanning the interstate from Old Atlanta Highway/Cook Road to Dinah Pace Road and the land south to the Yellow River.
- Cinelease Studios

 Three Ring with
 the city picking up
 Flint Hill Elementary;
 Cinelease Studios —
 Three Ring; Merryvale
 Assisted Living; and a
 neighborhood around
 Stewart Drive, just off
 Georgia Hwy. 142.
- Hazelbrand with the city picking up territory east of SKC and
- west of Alcovy Road.

 Deerfield with the city relinquishing the water tank, water mains and other water infrastructure in Melody Farms Subdivision but, in return, picking up the Morgan property and the new Eastside High School. "[There is] already a lot of [city]

water [supplied] in the area but the sewer is in 'no-man's land," Thomas said. Covington would need confirmation from the county to allow the school to be served with city sewer.

• Georgia Highway 36 — with the city picking up the area from Bypass Road to East End Road.

If the proposal were to be approved, Thomas told the council that the city would lose 28 customers and assets valued at \$868,400 from the Deerfield area to the NCWSA. But, Covington would gain a total of 431 customers across the remaining areas and assets with a cumulative value of \$927,306. The city picked up 256 customers in the Hwy 36 swap, which was approved prior to the Monday meeting. The city will pick up an additional 203 customers with this swap.

Thomas said the NCWSA officially relinquished the territory along Hwy. 36 (listed above) in April 2019, and the authority and city had been working on the other proposed swaps for the last two

years.
Six master meters
within the current system would be removed
and two relocated,
Thomas said, but the
NCWSA would split
the \$506,000 cost.

Thomas recommended the city approve

the proposal with one stipulation.

If approved, the new Eastside High School located in the Deerfield area would become a city customer. Thomas said within the next two years, the city would need to extend gravity sewer to the school property, which is an estimated \$1 million project. In order to do so, Thomas said the county would have to allow city sewer service within the Deerfield

Covington won a bid in October to provide electrical services to the

Thomas said if Covington were not able to get the county to agree to the stipulation, it may not be as "favorable" of a deal for the

city as it could be.

If approved, the official swap date is tentatively scheduled for early August. It was unclear when the county would hear the proposal and put it to a

vote. In other business related to city infrastructure, the council approved the purchase of a brush chipper in the amount of \$72,000 for the electric department. The current chipper was 15 years old and staff said \$12,000 had been spent over the last

six months for repairs. New transformers totaling \$207,684 were also approved for the electric department.

"Whenever it comes to people of color, they always do this."

A majority of the five-member board is required to ask the chairman to place an item on a meeting agenda.

Henderson's comment apparently was directed at Democrat Demond Mason of District 2, who is Black, after he joined Republicans Ronnie Cowan of District 5 and Stan Edwards of District 1 to request

the rescission. Afterward, Mason said he did not want to respond to Henderson's comments.

"I know who I am,"

Mason said. During the meeting,

District 3 Alana Sanders criticized the three commissioners seeking to reconsider the contribution after four commissioners supported its placement on the agenda and all five members voted for it May 4.

"I find this very disheartening," she said. "This organization reached out to every last

one of us," Sanders said.

to this you should have never put it on the (May 4) agenda."

Henderson said he wanted the three commissioners to make public their reasons for rescinding the May 4 vote as a matter of "transparency."

"If there was a rebuttal

"Are we hiding behind something?" he asked. "I'll tell you right now. I will not rescind the motion that we done what's hard about that?" Cowan said he asked

for reconsideration of the motion because he feared the board may have violated the Gratuities Clause in the Georgia Constitution. Elected officials in

Georgia have been convicted of violating state law contained in the Gratuities Clause that prohibits a direct payment of cash or services with public funds to a private organization without receiving something in return.

Cowan said be believed board members were doing something from the "heart" May 4 but "we did it wrong."

"I felt like we overstepped our bounds," Cowan said. "Like I said before, 'There's never a right way to do the wrong thing.

"Usually procedures are the way you get in trouble with the courts." Mason said he be-

lieved all commissioners wanted to assist the Juneteenth organizers but an approved policy with specific procedures for doing so needed to be in place before it was approved.

sure we're following the proper protocol, that we're following the proper policy," Mason said. "We just want to make sure that we're being consistent across the board and we're not doing something for one (nonprofit) and doing something different for another (nonprofit)."

The Newton County Historical Committee

apparently now will be required to provide documentation about its nonprofit status and other information before applying for the funding. Cowan assured its leaders during a break the contribution was still forthcoming.

Banes briefly struggled to gain control of the meeting as some commissioners openly complained about the rescission vote. Banes said he would not stand for them being disorderly during an open meeting.

"Do you want to go home?" Banes asked at one point.

At the end of the meeting, Sanders said she apologized for an "outburst" during discussions about the rescission but said she was dealing with a "touchy" subject like African-American heritage.

"Sometimes you have to stand your ground on issues," she said. "If you don't stand for something, you'll fall for anything."

Convenience store at former travel center site on Newton County planning agenda

Newton County Planning Commission is set to consider requests for rezonings, use permits and a planned subdivision Tuesday, May 25, at the Historic Courthouse in Covington. JPC Design & Con-

struction of Jackson is seeking a conditional use permit for 46.12 acres at Georgia Hwy. 11 and I-20 for construction of a convenience store with underground fuel tanks in the Little River watershed.

Zoning for the site is a mix of CH (Highway Commercial) and AR (Agricultural Residential).

The same applicant was denied a request to build a travel center on the site earlier this year. The travel center was denied by Newton commission ers in February after residents within the area strongly opposed the development.

Also on the agenda for the Tuesday, 7 p.m., meeting are a preliminary plat presentation, a permit request and two rezoning requests on City Pond Road and Salem Road, respectively.

a nonprofit seeking funding must show it is providing a "substantial benefit" to the county in some way, Martin said.

"It's going to be

hate group benefits the county," Martin said. Elected officials in Georgia have been convicted of violating state law contained in the Gratuities Clause in the Georgia Constitution that prohibits using public funds to make direct payments of cash or services to private

organizations without

receiving goods or

services in return. District 5 Commissioner Ronnie Cowan said Tuesday he asked for reconsideration because he feared the board may have violated the Gratuities Clause when it voted for a May 4 motion to donate to a nonprofit group organizing a Juneteenth celebration in Covington June 19 and 20.

It was unclear if the new policy's requirements will affect those nonprofits already under consideration for funding in the county government's 2022 budget, such as Alcovy CASA Inc. that advocates for children in the court system. The policy requires

each applicant to be registered with the state or federal government as a 501c3 organization to which federal law gives tax-exempt status because such agencies are charitable nonprofit agencies. Any nonprofit seek-

ing funding must have operated for at least 12 months and provide documentation certifying its tax-exempt status, Martin said. They also must

provide lists of board members, annual budgets and minutes of previous meetings, Martin said.

"That goes back to the point: Is this a

legitimate organization

that is operating and conferring a substantial benefit upon the citizens?" Martin said.

It gives a Feb. 1 deadline for applications for funding and a timeline for the board to hear presentations, review them and vote on their funding at a special called meeting, she said.

The board would vote on individual resolutions for each nonprofit and allow access to the resolutions on the county website to give "maximum transparency" to "who got funding and who did not get funding."

"A lot of times we hear rumors of, 'Oh, this entity is getting this,' or, 'This entity is getting that," Martin said. "We need to put it out there. You'll be able to see the resolution, signed, executed, on our website."

It requires the county to include the name of each organization and the amount given to

each one individually on the annual county government budget document posted on the county website.

The policy also requires each nonprofit to file an annual report and an audit with the county, and give live reports to the board twice annually.

County Manager Lloyd Kerr said his review of the policy showed some differences between the new policy and "standard operating procedure" the government already uses for reviewing nonprofits before they are recommended for inclusion in the annual budget.

Martin admitted Kerr was already doing reviews of nonprofits but she told commissioners a written policy would standardize the process for receiving applications.

Cowan, an attorney and former human resources director, said he wanted a written policy

in place that specified the steps a nonprofit must take to receive county funding.

He said his experience showed that judges typically look to see if governments had procedures in place in cases in which claims are made against them. Kerr said he want-

ed time to look more closely at the policy to see where it differs from the government's procedure. "This is not a new

thing because we've been doing this for a very long time," he said. "I just wanted to point that out to the board." However, some

commissioners agreed a written policy was needed immediately because the county had not operated with one previously and it could be more easily defended in court. Martin said the board

could make changes after its approval if they discovered major differences between the policy and current procedures.

The reconsideration

angered some community members and other commissioners because the Board voted unanimously for the \$1,500 donation to the Newton County Historical Committee.

Verna Bargie of

Debt

Juneteenth organizer said a set policy may have prevented the county from having to reconsider its action after already approving funding.

"It probably could have eliminated all this hostility and whatever," she said.

Reader wants transparent redistricting process

Dear Editor:

Now that the Census over, the redistricting season, which occurs every 10 years, has begun.

In Georgia new maps are drawn by whichever party is in charge of the state legislature. The work is done under a veil of secrecy sanctioned by law. Lacking an open, fair, and public process, everyone — no matter what party — has used this opportunity to protect their incumbents, to the detriment of Georgia voters. The upcoming redistricting will affect our state for the next decade, and voters need to have a say in developing these districts. Communities can have their influence diluted or overly concentrated by map line-drawers interested in partisan gain or pleasing powerful interests.

At a minimum, the House and Senate apportionment committees should:

- Do all the work in public, share all data used, and release proposed maps well in advance of their adoption for public comment.
- Draw maps based on community input given at open public hearings across the state.
- Commit to using independent, non-partisan guidelines to prevent partisan bias.

The non-partisan Fair Districts GA has resources on their website, fairdistrictsga. org to educate citizens about redistricting, and opportunities for involvement to encourage legislators to ensure that the process is fair and transparent.

It is important to contact Sen. Tonya Anderson tonya.anderson@ senate.ga.gov and ask her to guarantee a transparent, fair, and open process as Georgia's maps are redrawn.

Pondering parallels between gardening and area growth

uring my childhood, my parents and grandmother would often team up to raise a garden.

For years it normally ranged about half an acre. As Mawmaw Beck got older, the garden got smaller. Mawmaw would always



be an assortment of other vegetables, too, like peppers and okra. And, of course, it wouldn't be a garden without planting a few rows of corn.

We spent many springs and summers on that plot of land. As my brothers and I would complain about our backs hurting from staying bent over too long, we'd often hear how Mawmaw grew up picking cotton and living off the

land. She'd reminisce about

how many pounds of cotton she'd have to tote. She'd also

tell us about our dad's time

picking cotton. It was kind of

hard to imagine.

I didn't care too much for the anecdotes at the time — I guess because it didn't do anything for my back — but, now, there's nothing I wouldn't give to hear Maw-

maw tell those stories again and spend one more season in that garden with her.

We were taught many lessons while working in the garden. Possibly the first and simplest proverb learned was, "you reap what you sow," but I didn't realize until I was older how much this could be used in all aspects of life.

When it comes to gardening, you can't just throw out a few seeds and expect a bushel of the world's best tasting vegetables to sprout from the earth. There's a lot of planning and work involved. Seeds have to be watered regularly, kept free of weeds and you might even spray pesticides, depending on what type of critters you might have nearby.

If you don't do those things, what happens? If you don't remove weeds, your plants' will starve because the weeds are taking all the water. No pesticides means your crop is subject to being ruined by bugs and other critters. And without water, well, congratulations, you've grown a desert.

The bottom line is our actions determine how well the garden grows.

I can't help but draw many parallels to the growth we're seeing across Newton County, and local attorney Phil Johnson put it all into perspective when I spoke to him about the Neely Farms development in Covington a few weeks ago.
For a place like Newton
County, which is growing and changing, whether we like it or not, Johnson said what the county and cities need to do

is embrace it and plan for it so the area may continue to prosper and remain a beacon for new incoming industries. "When I was a young man, Newton County had 26 dairy farms and had about 30,000 people," Johnson said. "Now, we have no dairy farms — nobody's milking — and about 115,000 people in Newton County. We are

farms — nobody's milking — and about 115,000 people in Newton County. We are changing dramatically, and you see some tension in the community about, 'Do you want to grow or not grow?' And I think that when you're this big and you're near a metropolitan area like Atlanta that is expanding dramatically and just about pushed as far north as you can reasonably support, they're going to have to come east and south. So we're going to grow. It's a question whether we can do thought-out, planned community kind of growth, or we're going to grow like in 2005."

In 2005, he said, the area was booming, but not in a well thought-out manner. When the recession took hold three years later, Johnson said things changed.

"Our primary industry, I think, was starter homes because that's what we were doing," he said. "We were

building them all over Newton County, and I did a lot of them ... but there was no connection between them. They were just isolated islands out there. Then the recession came and all that ground to a halt. A lot of people in the development business, they got personally hurt by the recession. But I will tell you, in my opinion, the recession was one of the best things that could have happened in Newton County because it made us stop and take a breath, you know. It let us kind of freeze in place while things like Stanton Springs could mature and become real. And when they did, we began to have a job base that we could support people, and everybody wasn't dependent on driving in to Atlanta for employment. We could generate jobs. That's what has made the difference, and we're seeing a much more thought out, connected growth. This is exactly where the growth ought to

Johnson is right. Regardless if we approve, growth is happening in Newton County. I'm just thankful to see our leaders putting in the work to make the most of it, and, soon enough, we'll benefit from the fruits of their labor.

Do we take sides or pray for peace?

can still feel the sun beating down on my face and hear the cacophony of voic-

es like it was yesterday. The playground at my elemen-



tary school in the small town of Pacolet, South Carolina was where I first learned to choose sides. In this instance, it was in the context of games or sports at recess – flag football, basketball, tag, and more. Even as I think about it, my stomach starts to twist. "Will I be picked last? What if I'm first, does that mean they think I'm really good at this?" Spoiler alert: I was hardly ever picked first or last.

We learn how to take sides early in life. It seems that all I have been reading lately is about taking sides: Israel or Palestine, to mask or not to mask, Donald Trump or Liz Cheney. My social media feeds are full of passionate and sometimes mean-spirited posts about being on the correct side.

the correct side.

On the one hand, I want to say that this is part of human nature.

We want to be on a side, to make things easy and fit into a normal system. To be somewhere in the middle, often known as a grey area, is not often comfortable.

My colleague in religious life at Emory University, Rabbi Jordan Braunig, did some free-writing a few days ago in the wake of all that's happening in Israel and Gaza. What he ended up with from this contemplative practice (my words, not his) has been shared at least 30

times on Facebook.

He starts with,

It is possible to pray for peace.

Our prayer life need not know our boundaries. No

green lines, no dashes, no subtle demarcations.

I am sharing this with you with his permission even though we have yet to sit down with one another to learn where we stand on this issue. I do not know what side he is on. That conversation will be important to have in person, but it is not always readily accessible, especially in COVID times. Instead, we get to see whatever one or the other posts on social media while we attend to the everyday needs around us with our families, friends, work, communities and more.

He continues:

We have the capacity
to pray

for the old couple crouched in their stairwell in

Ashkelon and the terrified child

in his pajamas in Gaza.

pajamas in Gaza.
On the other hand,
maybe there is a way
to nurture our human
nature. Is choosing a
side the only option? In
some instances, I will
admit that it is the way
forward. Rabbi Jordan,
though, says that "We

have the capacity to pray." In his poem/
prayer, he seems to be pointing us to pray for peace. Or at least urging us to "spread our prayer like a tattered shawl...over the tired shoulders of these and across the narrow

frames of those.' I am not naïve to think that prayer is all there is to this. But, as Rabbi Jordan also says, "We are not naïve, not cowards, nor traitors to pray for peace." When we pray, we extend the possibilities of our moral imaginations, and the hope is that we see what we did not once see and hear what we did not once hear. That could be for the situation at hand or perhaps about the person (or their Facebook post) directly in front

of us. We are about to celebrate Pentecost in the Christian tradition, 50 days beyond Easter when the Holy Spirit rushed over those early followers and birthed the church. In many of the churches where I have worshipped on Pentecost in the last decade, they have decorated the sanctuary with red balloons, streamers, and banners. Red is the liturgical color that represents the Holy

Spirit. The other festive

decorations are meant to celebrate the birth of the church while also representing the tongues of fire that rested on the followers

that first Pentecost. I like to use the image of "the wave" when talking about Pentecost. You know, when you are at a baseball game and someone encourages their section of the stadium to stand up and throw their hands in the air and move their body like an ocean wave. If it catches on, the sight and experience can be overwhelming. From this one small section, one person or small group's vision, emerges an entire stadium moving a collective wave across 60,000

people.
To get something like that going takes vision, coordination, the ability to see and listen, and results in action. We have the capacity for all these things, and when we tap into our capacity, learn to pray, and use our gifts, we extend the possibilities of our moral imaginations and create new hope.

Pre-trial program expands eligibility for low-level crimes

COVINGTON, Ga. A Newton County judicial system program giving some low-level offenders chances to eventually have clean records has

been updated. District Attorney Randy McGinley said the program now is a more streamlined and effective process while also being open to a wider array of low-lev-

el offenses. "It accomplishes everything that I think is important in such a program," McGinley

said. "It holds those that committed crimes accountable, it protects victims and our communities, and it gives those that have made a mistake a second chance that won't follow them around for life, all while building trust in our criminal justice process," he

"One important thing that has not changed is that victims will always be consulted prior to a participants' entry into the program."

The Alcovy Judicial Circuit's Pre-Trial Intervention Program (PTIP) began in 2017 and has helped hundreds of individuals get a second chance at having a clean record, McGinley said.

Georgia law allows for the District Attorney's Office to create and administer such a program — with entry into the program at the discretion of the District Attorney based upon written guide-

However, by law any crime that requires a mandatory minimum sentence of incarceration or imprisonment that cannot be probated is ineligible for partici-

pation in the program.

District Attorney Randy McGinley said the Alcovy Judicial Circuit's Pre-Trial Intervention Program (PTIP) began in 2017 and has helped hundreds of individuals get a second chance at having a clean record.

McGinley said the prosecutor assigned to the case screens those who apply for the program — or whom the DA's office gives an offer to participate — to determine whether the case qualifies, he said in a news release.

However, the assigned prosecutor now will decide which of two tracks the participant's case fits in: Track I is the "drug track" and Track II is the non-drug track, the release stated.

Track I will cover both drug possession crimes and crimes that arose from substance abuse issues, he said.

It is a longer program than the non-drug track and includes intensive drug screening and treatment designed to address the participant's underlying problems with addiction, McGinley said.

In addition to shifting to the two-track system, McGinley said other major changes to the program include:

 More drug possession crimes will qualify for participation, including all Schedule III, IV, and V substances as well as marijuana.

More serious drugs that are listed in Schedules I and II are not eligible because of the nature of those substances," McGinley

"Exceptions are made for THC oil and cocaine," he said.

"Additionally, cases involving a small number of marijuana plants that are clearly for personal use only will be eligible for entry into the program.

Crimes involving sale, trafficking and possession with intent to distribute will continue to be ineligible for the Alcovy PTIP.

Track I can be supervised from six to 12 months, while Track II, the non-drug track cases, can be supervised for between three to six months.

• The District Attorney's Office will hand off responsibility for supervising participants to Georgia Probation Management.

"This puts supervision in the hands of those who do that regularly while freeing time for DA's investigators to focus on serious and violent crimes," McGinley said.

 Any restitution due to victims will now be paid in full at the initial supervision meeting.



Barr running for Hice seat; pledges to continue congressman's work

MONROE, Ga. — State Rep. Timothy Barr said he's the man who can keep up Jody Hice's work in Congress.

Barr, 40. announced his candidacy late last week for the Republican nomination for the 10th District seat in Congress. He's served in the state House

since 2013.

Hice, a Republican from Greensboro, is giving up the seat he's held since 2015 to run for secretary of state next

Barr credits trips to Bolivia with his wife in volunteer work for putting him on the path for public service.

"Their government is extremely oppressive," he said. And along came the chil-

"And then as you have a child, you start thinking long term, down the road, 20 years, what does the United States look like for them? So when our daughter came, we actually named her Liberty to remind us on a daily basis, that we need to fight for her liberty to preserve freedom for the next generation."

In his first interview since announcing his candidacy, Barr said the run for Congress is about continuing that work. "It again goes back to

preserving freedom," he said. "And when the congressman got out, my wife (Melinda) and I started praying about what the next step looked like for us.

"And so it was a tough choice, but in the end, we feel like taking the fight to D.C. to help preserve freedom, to stand up for America, and battle against the cancel culture, was very important.

"We have a need for that conservative leadership that the congressman provided," he said. "And we want to step in and continue that conservative approach in D.C."

Although the 10th District currently stretches from Gwinnett County east to the outskirts of Augusta, and includes the eastern half of Newton County, Barr's Lawrenceville home is just outside in the 7th District, now represented by Carolyn Bourdeaux, a Democrat from Suwanee.

But Barr said he aligns with the culture of the 10th District and thinks the every-decade reapportionment later this year may well put him in the 10th anyway.

"Our values align really, really well — you know, a man of faith with a small business, protecting life and family are super important to me," he

During his time in Atlanta, Barr said he's proud to have worked to have supported the Living Infants Fairness Equality Act, also known as the "heartbeat bill." It would have banned abortion in almost all cases after six weeks.

Gov. Brian Kemp signed the act in 2019, but it was struck down as unconstitutional a year later.

Barr said he and his wife have four children — in addition to Liberty, the family includes Haven, Maverick and Dixie — and two of them were born prematurely.

"Our family spent quite a bit

of time in the NICU (neonatal intensive care unit)," Barr said. "We understand that life begins very, very early. "Those little ones that are

premature, just gave us a profound respect for life."

He also pointed to a bill that repeals a law that curtails a citizen's gun rights during a state of emergency, as Georgia has been in for more than a year due to COVID-19.

Otherwise, Barr said he stays vigilant on what is coming down the pike under the Gold Dome.

"I read a lot of legislation and sometimes there are a lot of unintended consequences, so stopping legislation that shouldn't have gone through" is a key accomplishment, he

The primary elections for the congressional race will be May 24, 2022, with the general election on Nov. 8, 2022

Also in the race for the 10th District seat is Dr. Paul Broun of Athens, who held the seat from 2007-15, and businessman Marc McMain.

Monroe publisher joins race for Congress

MONROE, Ga. — Proclaiming himself an "outsider" bidding to continue the work of former Presi-

dent Donald Trump local businessman Marc McMain announced he is running for Congress. McMain



is the owner of Town Values magazine, formerly the MTM Shopper. He and his wife, Liliana, live in Monroe. "Our nation is at a

crossroads and our political system has been hijacked by the left," Mc-Main said in a statement announcing his candidacy. "We must continue what

President Trump started and put America first."

McMain is running for the 10th District seat now held by Rep. Jody Hice, a Republican from Greensboro. Hice is not seeking a fifth term next year, instead running for secretary of state with Trump's endorsement.

"Career politicians have ruined this country," McMain said. "I am a proud Christian, husband and Republican who is the ultimate Washington outsider ready to get our

country back on track.

"I started working when I was 14 years old, saved money and paid my own way through community college.

"We need less attorneys in Congress and more people who have walked as I have in the shoes of everyday Americans."

McMain said he is the youngest of three brothers in a family that moved to Stone Mountain when he was 10. He graduated from Rockdale County High School in 1988 then spent the next year teaching karate and washing cars to save money from college.

He went to college in DeKalb County (now Georgia Piedmont Technical College). McMain recalled working in a tire warehouse in the mornings, then going to class and teaching in the evenings at a karate school he started.

After earning an associate degree in Spanish, McMain turned his attention to the karate school, growing it to more than 250 active students. He eventually sold it and began the MTM Shopper in 2003 in Loganville.

McMain joins a Republican primary that includes state Rep. Timothy Barr of Lawrenceville and former U.S. Rep. Paul Broun of Athens.

State budget to fund UGA poultry science, horticulture projects

Gov. Brian Kemp signed the fiscal year 2022 budget for the state of Georgia on May 10 securing \$21.7 million for the construction of phase one of a new Poultry Science Complex on the University of Georgia's Athens campus.

The project will increase the size of the Department of Poultry Science's existing facilities in UGA's College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences (CAES) to 75,000 square feet, expanding instructional and lab space; providing modern, student-centered facilities; and helping

to attract and retain world-class researchers.

"The new building will feature facilities and equipment to provide for advanced research to keep Georgia at the forefront of forward-thinking, relevant poultry research, advancing its UGA Cooperative Extension and outreach programs,"

said Todd Applegate, head of the Department of Poultry Science. "This will keep staff on the cutting-edge to ensure that industry and government entities increasingly seek them out to address research questions. It will also strategically provide UGA with a competitive advantage in terms of attracting extramural funding to lead innovation to solve grand challenges facing the poultry sector."

State-of-the-art learning labs will bolster the traditional classroom experience with production courses, demonstrations and relevant field-learning exercises and contribute to the department's expanding FFA, 4-H and other youth programs, as well as assist with student recruitment efforts.

"The demand for poultry continues to grow with each new generation and the University of Georgia is committed to attracting the best and the brightest, and developing them into future leaders," Applegate added.

The Poultry Science Complex building campaign is a public-private partnership, and the recent commitment from the Georgia legislature and Gov. Kemp marks their second and largest phase of public support of the project, which has an estimated total project budget of \$54.1 million. Construction is scheduled to begin in spring 2022 with completion in fall

2023.

Ranked the No. 1 poultry science program in the nation, the CAES Department of Poultry Science has been a major contributor of research and university-trained experts that have led to the exponential growth of the state's industry for many decades. The department and its faculty are well-known for their industry-focused innovation.

The first phase of funding for the project came during the current fiscal year, with \$2.2 million allocated from the state for the design of the new Poultry Science Complex. A final capital budget request of \$3.2 million to equip the building is slated to be included in the University System of Georgia's fiscal year 2023 capital budget request.

Private fundraising is underway for the project, said Mary Ann Parsons, senior director of development for CAES.

"Private gifts are critical to complete funding for the Poultry Science Complex and will enable us to grow the industry workforce, improve the learning environment for our students and solve some of the greatest challenges we face as a state, nation and global community into the future," Parsons said. "I join our college leadership and the building steering committee in celebrating the industry leaders, alumni and friends who have given financial support to this

building in our initial efforts and welcome the interest of those who want to be a part of this important advancement at UGA."

The fiscal year 2022 budget, which was passed by the Georgia General Assembly on March 31, also includes \$5 million for the design, construction and equipment for a new Multidisciplinary Greenhouse Complex on the UGA Athens campus. This greenhouse project will help bridge the gap between laboratory and field experiments, supporting research within CAES

"We are so thankful for the support of our governor and state legislature for these critical projects. These funds will ensure that our facilities are capable of producing high-quality results in both horticulture and poultry research, along with providing increased opportunities for hands-on learning for our students in labs and greenhouses," said CAES Dean and Director Nick Place. "Increasing our capacity for innovative research in agricultural and environmental sciences allows CAES to continue serving these industries, our state, and ultimately the world as we develop cutting-edge technologies and practical solutions."

fielder batted at a .325 clip with a .495 on-base percentage for the Tigers this spring. He notched eight doubles, drew 20 walks, stole eight bases and scored 28 runs en route to being named First Team All-Region 3-AAAAAA.

What did Hughes see in Payne before the start of his varsity career that led him to believe he could produce a special year?
The 'it' factor.

"Sometimes you see a guy and how he handles himself, and you realize, 'Hey, this kid's got it,'" Hughes said. "He's probably one of the hardest workers we have in the program, if not the hardest worker. He takes care of his business on the field. He takes care of his business in the weight room. He takes care of

the little things.

"Just watching how he took care of the offseason work going in, watching how he handled practice, watching how he interacted with his teammates — there was just something there that kind of jumped out like, 'OK, this kid's about to do something. We just don't know what it is

Payne was penciled into the heart of the lineup from Day One. There were understandable growing pains as he adjusted to the speed and movement of varsity pitching, but

the freshman rose to the challenge.

"Part of putting him up [in the lineup] early in there year was you want to see how he's going to handle it," Hughes said. "A lot of freshmen, and even sophomores, when they see that varsity arm on the mound for the first time, you can tell a lot just from how the look. How are they handling their emotions? How are they handling the mental aspect of it?"

As time went on, it became apparent Payne was adjusting just fine.

There were games when Payne faltered at the plate. Sometimes he'd struggle to see a certain pitcher. Other times he'd make hard contact and simply couldn't avoid fielders' gloves. But whether he went 0-for-3 or 3-for-4, his demeanor remained unchanged.

"A lot of 14- and 15-year-olds will have that, 'Woe is me' attitude or 'I can't handle this.' But nah, he was just a bulldog for us," Hughes said. "He went out there and kept competing."

Pitcher of the Year — Cade Mitchell (Eastside)

There's no question who the ace of East-side's pitching staff was

this spring.
Time and time again, senior southpaw Cade
Mitchell brought electricity to the mound for the Eagles. And when

he locked in — when all of his pitches were clicking and he was attacking batters downhill — he was among the most dominant arms in the state, if not the country.

Mitchell went 6-1 as a starter in 2021. He posted a 1.33 ERA, allowing just nine earned runs over 61 innings of work. He struggled at times to find the strike zone, resulting in 37 free passes, but countered this with a filthy arsenal that resulted in 126 strikeouts — an average of 14.5 strikeouts per seven innings.

"Some days I could kind of feel it wasn't going to be there," Mitchell admitted. "But some times, it was like I couldn't hear anything. It was just silence."

Head coach Brandon Crumbley pointed to the left-handers work ethic as the impetus for his breakout season.

"We talked a lot when he was younger about taking that next step of really taking control of his body and his arm. He bought into it, and then he saw the results, and then he really bought into it," Crumbley said. "I think if he wouldn't have had COVID shut down his junior season, he would've had two really, really good years

back-to-back.

But I also think, on the flip side of that, from having the shutdown last year he real-

ized how much harder he had to work to make sure he was prepared for this season. And, you know, just hat's off to him. I couldn't be prouder of where he's come as a pitcher and as a player."

Mitchell was a reliable workhorse all spring, but two of his outings stood out among the rest.

The first was a 16-strikeout gem in Eastside's home opener against Jones County, during which he allowed just one hit and one walk over six scoreless innings. The second came in the final week of the regular season when Mitchell struck out 14 while allowing just one hit in a complete game shutout against No. 1 Loganville.

"Those two games, you look back and you go, 'Man, he was electric those days," Crumbley said. "Like he said, there's some days he didn't have his best stuff, but even then he battled through it and he gave us a chance to win. On other days, he had really, really good stuff. It's just a testament to his work ethic and his competi-

tive fire that he has."

In his third season since taking over full-time following a stint in an interim role, Eastside head coach Bran-

don Crumbley was the best in the area.

Bar none.

Realignment forced Crumbley to navigate through one of the most brutal regions in the state in 8-AAAAA this spring. The Eagles not only brushed shoulders with state powers in three-time defending state champion Loganville, Greenbrier and Walnut Grove, but they traded blows and held their own.

Thanks to a two-game sweep of the top-ranked Red Devils in the final week of the regular season, the Eagles rolled in the Class AAAAA state playoffs as the No. 3 seed following a 21-8 campaign.

An early exit tempered the excitement, but looking back, it will be a season to remember for the Eagles for years to come.

"We played exceptionally well; a lot better than I thought we would've. It's a testament to those guys buying in to my mantra of 'Trust the Process." Crumbley said. "They understood that it was

every single day that we had to come to the ballpark and play hard. You couldn't take a day off."

Through 32 games in the regular season and playoffs, the Eagles never dropped more than two contests in a row.

Eastside opened the year with a pair of onerun losses to Ola and Northside, but responded with a nine-game winning streak. After getting swept by Greenbrier in mid-March, the team rattled off six consecutive victories. And after taking a pair of blows at the hands of Walnut Grove over spring break, the team took out its aggression on Jackson County before sweeping a twogame series with the top-ranked team in the

classification.

"It's one of those
things where if you
buy in to what we're
trying to do, and realize
that you have to show
up every single day
to play hard, then you
have good results and
you have a fun year,"
Crumbley said.

"He's done a great job here," Davidson said of Crumbley. "Unfortunately, when you've got great coaches, they move on eventually. He'll do well there.'

Crumbley spent the 2018 season in an interim role for the Eagles


following the departure of former coach Bruce Evans. He led the the club to a Region 4-AAAA runner-up finish and a Sweet 16 appearance, ultimately earning a promotion to full-time head coach.

He compiled a 50-22 record of the past three seasons. Eastside posted a 22-5 mark in

2019 and made a berth in the Class AAAA state playoffs. Following a shortened 2020 campaign due to the pandemic, Crumbley guided the Eagles back to the postseason as members of Class AAAAA this spring.

Whitewater resides in Region 2-AAAAA alongside the likes of

Starr's Mill, which will be playing for the Class AAAAA state title next week, Harris County, Northside and McIntosh. The Wildcats missed out on the playoffs this spring after placing fifth in the region with a 12-14 overall record and 8-10 mark against league opponents.

The abrupt cancellation of the 2020 campaign gave coaches, players and fans alike a renewed appreciation for the game. That translated into a high quality of play on diamonds across the area this spring.

Eastside, Newton and Social Circle qualified for the playoffs in their respective classifications, while Alcovy made great strides and

garnered experience for a team that will lose iust three seniors.

As usual, our area was chock full of elite baseball talent. From the coaching staffs down to the players, each dugout was overflowing with burgeoning stars ready to rewrite history. Every week of the season, one could walk into a ballpark and find a local team engaged in a high-stakes game that feature future collegiate — and, potentially, professional — ballplayers.

to proudly present the 2021 All-Covington News Baseball Team.

MVP — Kyle Shivers (Eastside)

You'd be hardpressed to find a player anywhere in the state of Georgia who had a more productive season at the plate this spring than Kyle Shivers.

The junior closed out the year batting .523 with a .569 on-base percentage and .817 slugging percentage. He tallied 87 hits - 26of which were of the extra-base variety and hit safely in 29 of the Eagles' 32 games.

To top it all off, his 23 doubles pushed him into third place all-time in GHSA history for two-baggers in a single season. His 2021 campaign now trails only Lanier County's Alex Lee (1989; 28 doubles) and Oconee County's Adam Frazier (2010; 24 doubles) for the most single-season doubles ever recorded in the Peach State.

Asked about his historic year, Shivers, a humble leader who notoriously avoids the spotlight, couldn't help but allow a sheepish grin to steal over his face.

"It went pretty good if I say so myself," he

"It's just the type of player he is," Crumbley said. "He's just a pure hitter."

Shivers shifted up and down the top-half of the lineup throughout the year, but the results remained the same. Whether he was leading off an inning or coming to the plate with two outs, he

understood what was expected of him. He constantly delivered quality at-bats for the club.

"The moment was never too big for him," Crumbley said. "No matter if he was hitting leadoff, in the 2-hole or in the 3-hole, he knew what his approach was. He knew what he wanted to do at the plate. If he got a fastball, or even a breaking ball, and it was in the zone, he'd swing at it and he'd hit it.'

As Shivers' batting average ballooned, opponents took notice. Scouting reports became progressively advanced and pitchers altered their approaches for handling him being in the batter's box.

And yet, at-bat after at-bat, he continued to produce.

"He did a really good job of when teams started to figure out how to pitch him, he would hit the mistakes that they made," Crumbley said. "That's very hard for high school hitters to do. It just shows what type of hitter he is at the elite level.

Newcomer of the Year — Reece Payne (Alcovy)

In late January, Alcovy head coach Jimmy Hughes sat inside his dugout to preview the Tigers' upcoming season.

"You're going to want to keep an eye out for freshman Reece Payne," Hughes told me, "because, more than likely, he's going to be your Newcomer of the Year."

Hughes spoke it into existence. But it was Payne's remarkable campaign that ultimately made his prediction come true.
