for her service, according to the letter county officials made public Friday.

"Your resignation as coroner is hereby accepted, and I wish you all the best," Kemp wrote.

Bailey-Butts declined to respond to an interview request from *The Covington News*.

She had removed her items from the coroner's office in the Historic Courthouse Friday before 8 a.m., county officials said.

Kemp's letter followed a Wednesday, May 26, order signed by Probate Judge Melanie Bell based on a letter of resignation from Bailey-Butts dated the same day, according to information from the county government.

In the same order, she appointed former coroner Thomas E. "Tommy" Davis to fill the vacancy.

However, it was unclear Friday from county officials if Davis will serve as an interim coroner until a special election is held by May 2022, or if he will serve the remainder of Bailey-Butts' term that ends in December 2024.

Davis was appointed to replace his successor, Bailey-Butts, who defeated him in the Nov. 3 election for the job.

Bailey-Butts said on Tuesday in a letter to county officials she was resigning as Newton County coroner effective Friday, May 28, at 8 a.m.

In response, the county government stated on Wednesday, "Whereas the vacancy has arisen unexpectedly and prior to the end of Bailey-Butts's elected term, an appointment ... has been made to fill the vacancy as outlined in (state law)."

It said that Davis, who served three terms as coroner from 2008 to 2020, "has been appointed ... to serve the office of interim coroner until his successor is duly elected and qualified.

"His experience and familiarity with the position as the previous coroner allows for a seamless transition in this critical office," the statement said.

Then, on Wednesday, Bailey-Butts said on her Facebook page that she was rescinding the resignation she had publicly announced the day before.

She told Atlanta TV station Fox 5 she decided to withdraw the resignation after being interviewed by the station. She then posted on her Facebook page: "PSA..... I have decided that I am not going to resign as Newton County Coroner. I am withdrawing my resignation effectively today. I am not resigning from my position. The citizens voted me

in this position.

Coroner is an elected position in most Georgia counties and is responsible for such tasks as investigating suspicious deaths and producing death certificates.

Bailey-Butts, a registered nurse, began her term on Jan. 1 and it has been marred by controversy at times, including County Manager Lloyd Kerr's request to a state coroner's training board that it remove her from office.

Complaints also

came on social media about an envelope she showed county commissioners in January that she said contained damaging information that she never publicly disclosed.

She showed the envelope during a presentation she made during a public meeting in which she asked commissioners for

GDOT officials suspend highway construction over holiday weekend

State Patrol encourages motorists to make safety priority

Memorial Day weekend is anticipated to be one of the busiest times of year on the road.

In order to help ease expected traffic congestion, the Georgia Department of Transportation announced it would suspend all construction-related land closures from noon Friday, May 28, until 5 a.m. Tuesday, June 1.

Also in preparation for the 78-hour holiday travel period, the

Georgia Department of Public Safety is encouraging motorists to "practice safe driving habits" over the weekend.

"Now that the state has reopened, CDC has released updated guidelines for those who have been vaccinated, and schools have closed for the summer, we expect the number of people traveling on our roadways to visit family and friends to increase this weekend," said Col. Chris C. Wright, who is commissioner of the GDPS.

In a news release, state officials said Troopers and officers would be on "high-visibility patrols" to watch for impaired drivers as well as other violations that could pose a threat to other motorists.

Over last year's Memorial Day weekend, the Georgia State Patrol investigated 382 traffic crashes that resulted in 256 injuries and 10 fatal crashes, involving 13 fatalities, according to the news release. In addition to the traffic crash investigations, Troopers and Motor Carrier Officers arrested 323 people for driving under the influence, while issuing 9,536 citations, and 9,714 warnings. Citations included 430 Hands Free, 936 Seat Belt, 213 Child Restraint, and 33 Move Over violations.

"The Georgia Department of Public Safety wants everyone to enjoy their Memorial Day celebrations with family and friends, but

Commission OKs new plan for 'truck stop' site

Earlier opposition falls away as convenience store, restaurants approved near Social Circle

COVINGTON, Ga. — A downsized version of a previously controversial plan for a travel center near Social Circle will be considered by Newton County commissioners in June after the planning board unanimously voted to

and two attached fast-food restaurants after residents and developers compromised in such areas as operating hours and building appearance. The zoning board's Tuesday, May 25, action followed

rejections by it and the Board of Commissioners of the same developer's plan for a travel center, fast-food restaurants and future big-box supermarket on a large part of the overall 46-acre site in February.

The applicant, JPC Design & Construction of Jackson, was denied after area residents and homeowners groups united to oppose the plan.

Many opponents said the former plan was for a "truck stop" because it would have offered fuel and amenities to both commercial tractor-trailers and personal vehicles.

JPC's revised plan is for less than a quarter of the site and includes a convenience store and two attached fast-

food restaurants facing Hwy. 11, said JPC attorney Richard Milam.

"This is not a truck stop," Milam said.

He said the project would be a \$6 million investment and employ a total of about 20 to staff the store and restaurants.

The developer has agreements with Burger King and Dunkin' Donuts to operate the fast-food restaurants which he said will each include drive-through windows to lessen the amount of traffic on the site, Milam said.

He said the new design includes gas pumps to serve personal vehicles only and no fuel facilities for tractor-trail-

Residents had criticized the former travel center's operating hours because it would have allowed overnight truck parking and lighting.

However, Milam said hours will be limited to 5 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. in the new plan.

Lighting is required to be "down-cast," and not shine outside the site, said county development services director Judy Johnson.

Johnson said developers also would be required to install a landscape buffer along the perimeter of the site.

Leanne Long, an area resident and representative of some homeowner groups, said residents knew the site will eventually be developed for commercial use even with the restrictions of the **Brick Store Overlay District** which places additional requirements for design and appearance on new construction in the northeast Newton

"We're all trying to work together to make this something we can all be proud of," Long said.

One area resident asked if commissioners could approve conditions to prevent future owners from building a larger, truck-oriented facility on the

site.

Planning commission attorney Paul Frickey said the county government could not prevent future requests for such a use but the Board of Commissioners would be required to approve any action to change the plan presented by JPC.

"It cannot be a truck stop without that process," Frickey

The Board of Commissioners now is scheduled to consider it at its June 15 meeting.

Milam said after the meeting that JPC is waiting to see what action the Board of Commissioners takes on approving the revised plan before deciding if it will proceed with a lawsuit it recently filed in Newton County Superior Court.

The lawsuit was the only legal remedy JPC had to appeal the Board's February decision to deny the previous travel center plan, Milam said.

Nissan Infiniti. Both had been shot multiple times, the sheriff's office reported.

The case is still an active investigation and the sheriff's office is asking that anyone with information on the case

to call 770-278-8059. In a separate case, the Rockdale sheriff's office also is asking for the public's help in finding suspects in the Monday, May 24, shooting death of Kelvin D. Battle, 34, of Covington, while he

was riding a bicycle. Battle was found on a bike shot multiple times on Salem Road at Golfview Drive at about 4:47 a.m., according to Deputy J. Canty of the Rockdale County Sher-

iff's Office. Battle was transported to an area hospital where he later died from his injuries.

Salvation Army, community partners hold food giveaway

COVINGTON, Ga. — Volunteers from throughout Newton County took time off from work or leisure Tuesday to help some fellow area residents in need.

The Salvation Army hosted its Fishes and Loaves food box giveaway Tuesday, May 25, which sought to provide boxes of food free to 500 people on a first-come, first-served basis with "no questions asked."

Volunteers from Takeda Pharmeceuticals, Solid Rock Baptist Church and Salvation Army board members were among those working in assembly-line fashion at times to load food boxes into car trunks and back seats outside First Baptist Church of Covington.

Salvation Army advisory board member Sam Ozburn praised Takeda workers for helping with the distribution — noting about 50 had helped fill boxes the day before the

"They're a God-send," the retired judge said of the Takeda workers.

Companies like Food Depot, General Mills and Kroger either donated or sold their food at deep discounts to the agency and were major contributors to the effort, said advisory board member Donna Sneed.

Sneed, who was a main organizer of the project, said she began working on the Fishes and Loaves project in early March.

She said some who came through the line Tuesday were seeking food for three generations of their families. One family was asking for food to feed 13 children, she said. Volunteers filled two kinds of box-

es. One contained non-perishable foods like cereal and apples, while the other had perishable foods like whole fryers, milk, cheese, chicken nuggets and more.

All were filled with copies of the New Testament, she said.

Sneed said numerous retailers and industries assisted with the effort. General Mills donated 500 boxes

of cereal and numerous boxes of Fruit Roll-Ups, while Kroger

Celebrating *my 50th* trip around the sun

ruth be told, birthdays have never been that big of a deal for me.

Yet, I suppose this one is more of a milestone than



some. On May 27 my personal calendar will flip to 50. The big 5-0. Half a century.

The day itself won't really seem different from any other. I will be working at one of my multiple jobs so I probably won't even think about it much.

Confession time: Birthdays in recent years have been tougher. They really have seemed that way since I turned the big 4-0 a decade ago. I'm not sure why. A mid-life crisis I suppose or at least perhaps it was to some degree.

On May 27, 1971 your newspaper columnist arrived in this world, the first son of Paul and Melba Bridges. For it's worth I was born in Macon and grew up in the Middle Georgia town of Monticello, a few miles down Hwy. 11

Recent years though have brought the loss of loved ones. That is actually what I think most about, certainly more so than my current age. Knowing the older I get it means family members from previous generations as well friends will be lost.

It has been 30 years since I graduated high school and we have already lost one member of our small class. Truth to known our class is probably lucky that number is only one.

It's all a part of life but it's still tough to wrap my head around. Or maybe I just don't want to.

I have tried to look at age 50 as simply another birthday. No bigger

Take time to honor our fallen heroes

n my adolescent years, my family took a trip to Washington, D.C. To be honest, I don't re-

member much of the trip, as I'm sure I spent entirely too much time being a teenager whose nose was stuck in his phone.



I do recall visiting most of the iconic destinations, such as the Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument, Capitol Hill and of course, the White House — unfortunately, we actually didn't get to tour the president's home.

But the unforgettable experience came about 20 minutes away in Virginia, when we got to visit Arlington National Cemetery and witness the Changing of the Guard.

Arlington National Cemetery is 639 acres of beautiful landscape that is the final resting place for thousands of our nation's veterans dating back to the Civil War. To date, there are approximately 400,000 graves on site.

For readers who have seen the cemetery in person, you'll understand when I say that there's a sobering aura to the place that I've never felt anywhere else.

We read the number of soldiers who've died in battles throughout the ages, but on paper it doesn't seem like much. But when you lay your eyes on the grounds at Arlington, as markers upon markers flood the fields, your eyes are

opened. You finally understand the magnitude of those numbers, and you realize they are so much more than that. What a sight to behold.

He wasn't the most eloquent president in our country's history, but, in 2005, I believe President George W. Bush said it best:

"Looking across this field, we see the scale of heroism and sacrifice. All who are buried here understood their duty. All stood to protect America. And all carried with them memories of a family that they hoped to keep safe by their sacrifice."

An even greater spectacle, in my opinion, is the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the Changing of the Guard.

No one is buried in the tomb. Rather, it is simply a monument that represents all of our fallen soldiers whose remains are unidentified. An inscription on the tomb states, "Here rests in honored glory

an American soldier known only to God."

The statement, "Honoring and keeping faith with America's missing servicemen 1958-1979," is carved into one of three pavers set in front of the tomb.

Twenty-four hours a day, soldiers from the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, known as "The Old Guard," stand watch over the Tomb. The Changing of the Guard occurs every half hour from April 1 through Sept. 30 and every hour from Oct. 1 through March 1.

This Memorial Day, my heart goes out to the families of those soldiers — not only those who died, but also the ones who never made it home. So often, we take those lives for granted.

I'm thankful to live in a place where there have been and continue to be so many men and women willing to put their lives on the line to

serve our country and defend our freedoms.

Many of us will enjoy a day off from work Monday, and while doing so, I encourage you to try visiting one of our local memorials or attending a ceremony to honor the fallen. And if you've already committed to other plans, I implore you to take but just a moment to think about the sacrifice of those men and women. Send up a prayer for the families who are still in mourning.

After all, as someone once said, our nation's heroes paid the price for freedom with their lives, and that is a debt we, as a society, will never be able to adequately repay. Nevertheless, we should do all we can to show them our appreciation and respect.

Grief can remind us we've loved and been loved

ast weekend was the 15th anniversary of my youngest sister's death.

Every year, May 15 is a sad day for me, not because I don't believe



in eternity and the hope of heaven, but because losing someone far too early (she was 22 years old) just doesn't seem right. Granted, losing anyone, whether they are an infant, or 100 years old, brings grief, but when the seemingly natural order of things is broken—children dying before parents, a widow raising her children without her spouse, children growing up without a parent—there is a lasting grief that can surprisingly spring up on you, even when you have mostly moved on with your life.

I see a lot more smiles these days. Maybe because I see vaccinated people without a mask, living their lives without the fear of hurting another individual. And then maybe it is hope that seemed buried for quite a while this past year as we tried to optimistically look forward, but saw so many roadblocks ahead. I see people at mass I have not seen in over a year, vaccinated and excited to connect with people again. You can kind of feel the hope in the air, as life starts to look more like it used to.

Yet even with this hope, this weekend reminded me that there are still a lot of people hurting. There are people celebrating their first Mother's Day without their mother. Children dreading a Father's Day without their father. Grandmothers bringing their grandchildren to mass because their husband no longer stands next to them. Many are hurting over the loss of loved ones, but

equally, people are

relationships and connections with others, the loss of experiences that can't be replacedprom or going away for a first year of college, or reunions and celebrations.

COVID took away a lot of things this year, but the opportunity to grieve with people was one of the saddest losses. You might hear of someone dying, but you couldn't go to the funeral because of limits on attendance. And then you didn't see their surviving family members because you weren't fully vaccinated and you were trying to follow the health recommendations as best you could. And now, maybe even a full year after some of these losses, you see someone sitting alone and that part of your heart that never got to grieve finally "gets it." The grief that that person has been experiencing for over a year, mostly alone, is finally yours and then what do you do with it?

One of my favorite, and incidentally the shortest, verses in the Bible is John 11:35, "Jesus wept." Jesus came to Mary and Martha after the devastating loss of their brother. He knew he was about to raise Lazarus from the dead, and that his family members would be re-

hurting over the loss of united with him again. Yet as they grieved next to him, he wept. Sometimes, in the depths of my sorrow, I have imagined Jesus sitting next to me, crying with me. No words. Just him and our tears. It doesn't take away the grief, but I don't feel quite so alone in

my grief. As we join with people who have experienced a loss this year, we can't bring back loved ones or take away the suffering. But maybe we can just weep with someone. Share in their grief, even when there are no words to say, to show them they are not alone in their sorrow.

We can commit to pray for people going through hard times, believing that God can use us, even when the circumstances make it difficult to be physically with them. Prayer should never be a "copout," or a way to get away with not actually doing something for another person, but when we pray, we can believe that God is moving, and that He will lead us when there is an opportunity to physically do something for others.

Or maybe we can laugh with them. We can reminisce about the wonderful memories that we have and keep loved ones alive with our stories. There is

no script for what we should say and only the Holy Spirit can really guide us as we seek to be used by Him to bring comfort and connection.

Connection is really the key. Connecting ourselves with others and ultimately allowing our lives to be a tool to connect others with God. We serve a God who is compassionate and loving and listens. I pray that even in my imperfection, I can get out of the way enough to let God work in me and through me so others can experience the only peace that can meet us in our grief.

Grief is not something that you get over, but when we can sit with the author of peace, grief can become an old friend that reminds us that we have loved and been loved in return. And that is something we can share with others and that can never be taken away.

The state Attorney General's Office later told Training Council officials they had no authority to remove Bailey-Butts' certification because she had not gone through training courses required for the position when the actions Kerr alleged had occurred.

Bailey-Butts alleged in her letter on her Facebook page Tuesday, May 25, that "the people who are supposed to help me carry out my tasks well, are making things very difficult."

She also said, "There were too many scandals and issues about how I do my duties which mainly comes from the fact that I am Black.

"There were even issues with my office space, my deputies, and other stuff which weren't a problem with the previous coroner."

In response, the coun-

ty government's statement issued Wednesday said the Newton County Board of Commissioners and members of its staff "worked with Bailey-Butts to ensure the needs of the residents of Newton County were met."

An amendment of \$50,000 was made to the coroner's budget in January for operating supplies and any additional training that was needed, the statement

said.

"Bailey-Butts was also in the process of moving to a larger office to accommodate the needs she expressed to the Board of Commissioners and the county manager.

"Newton County firmly denies any claims of lack of support to the coroner's office and any allegations of discrimination based on gender or race."



Red Devils swept in state finals

Loganville's title run ends after 3 straight

ATLANTA — All good things must come to an end.

Loganville's streak of consecutive state titles was halted at three Tuesday night as the No. 2 seed Red Devils were swept by top-seeded Starr's Mill in the Class AAAAA state finals at Truist Park.

The Panthers rode the arm of ace right-hander Chay Yeager to a 1-0 victory in Game 1. In Game 2, a scattering of nine hits, mixed with a dominant outing from left-hander Daniel Courtney, resulted in a 4-2 win that gifted Starr's Mill's its first state title in program history.

Loganville closed out the year at 30-11. It marks the club's first runner-up finish since falling to Houston County in 2016.

On the eve of graduation, Loganville head coach Jeff Segars spoke about the impact his senior class — which posted a 103-28 record with a pair of state titles over the last four years

Loganville came up short in its quest for a fourth consecutive state title on Tuesday. The No. 2 seed Red Devils were swept in two games by No. 1 seed Starr's Mill, 1-0 and 4-2, in the Class AAAAA state finals at Truist Park. It marks the Red Devils' first runner-up finish since 2016.

"They meant everything," he said. "They've put together a very impressive run. I'm super proud of them — their effort, their production, who they are, what they represent."

The Red Devils were striving to become just the second team in

GHSA history to win four consecutive state titles, and the first to do it since Richmond Academy won six straight from 1951-1957. A daunting task in its own right, Segars and his staff understood it would take a high level of execution to knock off a talented Starr's Mill squad.

The Panthers' roster

is loaded from top to bottom with freakishly athletic kids at every position, as well as a deep pitching staff. They showcased both strengths Tuesday.

"I knew it was going to be tight. I knew we needed to make plays," Segars said. "I thought we'd be a little bit more successful offensively. But, you know, they

had a lot of speed and they covered a lot of ground. It was tough to get balls to them on the infield. Anything in the air was caught. They could really run."

'SUPREME SACRIFICE'

Legion leader says it is important to remember who died for this country

COVINGTON, Ga. - Aleader of a military veteran organization says Newton County residents need to remember who gave the ultimate sacrifice so they can remain free.

That's why Don Floyd and wife, Marcia Floyd, will lead a Memorial Day ceremony at the war memorial on the northwest corner of the park in the center of the Covington Square.

"I think it's very important that they never be forgotten," said Don Floyd, commander of American Legion Post 32. "They gave the supreme sacrifice fighting for the United States of America."

"If you forget history, you tend to repeat it," he said.

Post 32 will host the ceremony on Monday, May 31, at 10 a.m.

"As commander of Post 32, I will make a few comments then the names of those who gave the supreme sacrifice will be read," he

Covington VA Clinic eager to serve area veterans

COVINGTON, Ga.

— It's time to spread the word.

The Covington VA Clinic opened its doors on Eagle Drive in late February 2020. Unfortunately, due in large part to the COVID-19 pandemic immobilizing in-person care and forcing the clinic to provide much of its care virtually, the establishment is still largely unknown to veterans in the community.

With vaccines now widely distributed and the clinic doors fully reopened, Darkita McColumn, RN, and her staff are hoping to get the word out that they're here and ready to provide health care to former military

"We are seeing a lot of our veterans in the Newton County community, but a lot of veterans still just don't know that we're

members in the area.

here," McColumn said.
"They're riding for several miles to get to the main facility [in Atlanta.] It helps to have this clinic here so they can have immediate services."

Operated by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, the Atlanta VA Health Care System exists to provide health care services to veterans in and around the Metro Atlanta Area. Covington's location — plotted at 10155 Eagle Drive, down the street from Eastside High School — is Newton County's branch of the system.

Among services the Covington VA Clinic provide to veterans in the area are primary care, mental health integration and Telehealth. They also offer phlebotomy services, a procedure in which needles are used to draw blood or introduce fluids.

"I was so excited for this to open because I

was going to the VA Clinic in Stockbridge," said Covington City Councilman Don Floyd. "I was really excited about this location opening because of the convenience and the great care they provide."

The building currently houses three primary care providers, but McColumn stated that they hope to ultimately expand to five providers.

The clinic is open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Those interested in enrolling at the Covington VA Clinic are encouraged to call 404-321-6111 and dial extension No. 202222. However, prospective enrollees may also sign up in person at the clinic.



Area veterans memorials honor sacrifices of soldiers, sailors

The American Legion is responsible for installing two of Newton County's most visible memorials to the nation's war dead.

The Legion's Post 32 in Covington maintains the stone obelisk war memorial on the northwest corner of the park in the center of the Covington Square, and the "Eternal Flame" in the park at the intersection of Monticello and Church streets, said Commander Don Floyd.

Its members also placed crosses near the Eternal Flame to represent the 83 Newton Countians who lost their lives in the two world wars, Korea, Vietnam and the Gulf War, he said.

Floyd said the Covington-based group was instrumental in raising the money, doing the research to find the names, and erecting the obelisk in the 1970s.

The Legion worked over several years to create the monument, including working with the Department of Veterans Affairs for

some of the names, he said.

The 83 names include its latest,
Army soldier Carl Fuller who
died in the Gulf War.

Fuller died in Baghdad, Iraq, on July 24, 2005, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle while he was on patrol.

"I hope that's the last one,"

Floyd said

The Legion also maintains the Eternal Flame memorial for fallen soldiers, which was installed in the 1970s, Floyd said.

Members placed the crosses in a park near the Eternal Flame to continue a tradition begun by the late Davis Morgan, Floyd said.

The group originally placed them in the grass median of U.S. Hwy. 278 but were forced to move them after GDOT complained, he said.

Their location has changed several times but the Legion has placed the crosses near the Eternal Flame in recent years, he said.

Members have worked to keep the crosses in good repair over the years and added names to them after repairing them last year, Floyd said.

Another veterans memorial in Newton County is the Porterdale Veterans Memorial Park at 33

It was established in 2013 and honors all the branches of the military. Among its features are a park, covered pavilion and flagpoles for American and Georgia flags

Some other area veterans memorials include:

• Walk of Heroes Veterans War Memorial at 2825 Black Shoals Road in Conyers.

A key feature is the Walk of Heroes which spans the length of the memorial and is crossed by 70 marble bands engraved with the actions of America's military during that year, according to information from its website.

"Each marble band represents a year where American armed forces were deployed overseas in armed conflicts and as peacekeepers and is engraved with the year, the country and a brief description of the conflict."

• Heritage Park Veterans Museum at 99 Lake Dow Road in McDonough "is dedicated to all veterans and their families and to those that serve now and in the future."

The museum includes vehicles, uniforms and artifacts; a display of the two Henry County Medal of Honor recipients; and a "Henry County Fallen Hero" area.

"The staff of the museum consists of retired military veterans and are most knowledgeable in the history of all the uniforms and artifacts and will gladly spend as much time as you would like to tell you the history. A library room is available and you are welcome to sit, reflect, heal, and learn," the website states.

Memorial Day is celebrated each May to commemorate the people who died in service of the United States of America.

Even though barbecues and visions of the upcoming summer weather may command much of the attention come Memorial Day weekend, the holiday really serves as a remembrance for those military members who paid the ultimate sacrifice for their country, as well as the personnel who continue to protect and serve today.

Memorial Day was first known as Decoration Day and was borne out of the Civil War. On May 30, 1868, General John Logan, a national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, decreed General Order No. 11, which designated the day for the "purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land." May 30 was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

It took several years for the first state to recognize the holiday, which New York adopted in 1873. By 1890, all northern states recognized Decoration Day. When the holiday changed from commemorating those who died fighting the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war after World War I, the South began to recognize it as well.

Although Memorial Day pays homage to the brave people who perished fighting for their country, it also is an opportunity to recognize the military men and women and their families who continue to work to ensure the freedom of Americans.


The United States Armed Forces is renowned for its size and strength. Various sources suggest the size of the United States military is somewhere between 1.4 and 1.6 million active service people. The military is comprised of the Army, Army National Guard, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard. Each of these military branches also has its own reserves.



emorial Day, once known as "Decoration Day," is a federal holiday in the United States for honoring and mourning the military personnel who have died in the performance of their military duties while serving in the U.S. Armed

The holiday is observed on the last Monday of May. From 1868 to 1970, the holiday was formally observed on May 20

Memorial Day is considered the unofficial beginning of summer in the U.S. while Labor Day, the first Monday in September, marks the unofficial start of autumn.

According to the Library of Congress website, "Southern women decorated the graves of soldiers even before the Civil War's end. Records reveal that by 1865, Mississippi, Virginia and South Carolina all had precedents for Memorial Day. The earlier Southern Memorial Day celebrations were simple, somber occasions for veterans and their families to honor the dead and tend to local cemeteries. In following years the Ladies' Memorial Association and other groups increasingly focused rituals on preserving Confederate Culture and the Lost

Cause of the Confederate narrative. "In July 1862, women in Savannah, Georgia, decorated the graves at Laurel Grove Cemetery of Col. Francis S. Bartow and his comrades who died at the Battle of Manassas the year before.

"The United States National Park Service and numerous scholars attribute the beginning of a Memorial Day practice in the South to a group of women in Columbus, Georgia. These women were the Ladies Memorial

Nonprofit program offers veterans one-of-a-kind experience to remember lost comrades

CONYERS, Ga. — Numerous memorials have been erected in and around Washington, D.C., dedicated to thousands of troops who served as early as World War I and made the ultimate sacrifice while defending Americans' freedom.

While these are considered an admirable tribute to fallen American soldiers, many veterans across the country have never laid eyes on the monuments. But Honor Flight has vowed to change that.

Honor Flight is an organization that flies veterans to Washington on an all-expenses-paid trip to see the memorials. There are approximately 245 Honor Flight hubs across 45 states, including four in Georgia.

Blair Smith, who is a president of the Honor Flight hub in Conyers, recently spoke to the Rotary Club of Covington about the veteran program. The local program serves veterans across metro-Atlanta and works to provide the free trips for them, because Smith said program leaders have learned many veterans, unfortunately, can't afford such a

Since taking off in 2005, Smith said the national nonprofit program has flown nearly 270,000 veterans to the nation's capital for a one-day tour of its veteran memorials. More

than 23,000 veterans were taken on trips in 2019 alone.

Currently, the program's primary focus is serving veterans who served in World War II to the Korean War and through to Vietnam. However, the program is open for participation of all veterans, especially terminally ill veterans, from

any era of service.

Due to the pandemic, Honor Flight was forced to suspend trips, but Smith said he looks forward to starting trips again on Aug. 15.

Smith said the program has become an esteemed organization, which often results in their veterans getting the "red carpet" treatment.

"Honor Flight is very well respected by D.C. in what we do so

much that when we come to [Arlington National Cemetery], we are the only group that can bring a bus all the way to where the Changing of the Guard is," he said.

"We also have a police escort for the entire day in D.C.," Smith continued. "And if anybody's been in D.C. traffic, it kind of makes Atlanta look quite not so bad... We get the same treatment as the president."

For every veteran that goes on a trip, Honor Flight includes a "guardian" participant. Guardians are typically non-veterans and are required to pay for their trip outright or through donations. Smith said guardians escort veterans through-

out the day.


Smith said the program is a great way for veterans to open up by sharing their stories and experiences with each other — something many are hesitant to do with their fami-

"It's an incredible experience," Smith said. "You could learn more from that veteran than you will in a history book, that's for sure."

For a while, the program did not allow family members to attend as guardians, but Honor Flight has

changed its course over the years. "It used to be family couldn't go with their veterans, and the reason we did that was a lot of people, especially those that served in World War II, had not opened up about what they did and what they saw. You have to understand, when they

Travel tips for holiday weekend

Memorial Day weekend is one of the busiest travel weekends of the year. In 2017, the automotive group AAA estimated that 40 million Americans would travel 50 miles or more on Memorial Day weekend. Those estimates also projected that 34.6 million vehicles would be used to make those trips.

Often referred to as "the unofficial beginning of summer," Memorial Day and the weekend that precedes it has become synonymous with beach trips and backyard barbecues. Travelers who want to avoid traffic jams and ensure their weekends get off on the right foot can benefit from employing these three travel-savvy strategies.

1. Start the weekend early. In its "State of American Vacation 2017" survey, Project: Time Off found that 662 million vacation days were unused in 2016. People traveling for Memorial Day who typically leave some vacation days on the table can start their weekends early this year. Many offices close early the Friday before Memorial Day, and workers who aren't so lucky may just leave work early, meaning Friday afternoon traffic figures to be heavy. By leaving Thursday afternoon or evening, travelers can avoid the Friday rush to the beach.

2. Take public transporta-

Travel during the holdiays, including Memorial Day weekend, can be hectic. However, being flexible and patient when traveling can pay off by making trips less stressful.

Travelers who can't take an extra day off or leave work early the Friday before Memorial Day may want to consider taking public transportation to their beach destinations instead of driving themselves. In 2016, the U.S.based data firm Inrix noted that a traffic-free Friday jaunt from New York City to Long Island's East end would take 90 minutes, while the same trip would take three hours and 40 minutes on the Friday of Memorial Day weekend. Travelers who can't leave early can save themselves from the stress of holiday traffic jams by letting someone else do the navigating.

3. Be patient and depart on Saturday morning.

Travelers who can be patient may find that waiting to depart for their destinations until Saturday can save them from dealing with much of the stress of traveling on Memorial Day weekend. The benefits of being patient may depend on where travelers live, as the Inrix study noted that Friday was the busiest

day to leave Los Angeles on Memorial Day weekend, while San Diego residents tended to deal with the most traffic on Saturday. An added benefit of waiting until Saturday is the likelihood that such travelers will not return home until Tuesday, avoiding traffic on Monday, which tends to be the busiest return travel day of the weekend. Memorial Day weekend

travel tends to be hectic. But savvy travelers with some flexibility can take steps to make their trips less stressful.

millions of whom have been separated from their families. Aging men and women spent a year or more isolated at home to protect themselves from a virus that public health officials acknowledged was especially lethal to people over 65. Adults who want to show their appreciation for military veterans can reach out to local veterans' organizations and offer to lend a hand. Such organizations

may be delivering meals to vulnerable veterans, driving veterans to appointments to see their doctors or get vaccinated or organizing events for veterans who have already been vaccinated. Pitching in to help with such efforts is a great way to show veterans their efforts are still appreciated, even if it's been decades since they last served.

• Help a military family. Data from the Office of the Undersecretary of Defense indicates that there were roughly 1.3 million active-duty military personnel in 2018. Many of those service members serve overseas for months at a time. Their families back home can use a helping hand even in the best of times, but they might be especially needy while confronting the pandemic. Though vaccination projections suggest hundreds of millions of Americans will be fully vaccinated by mid-summer, in the meantime neighbors can help local military families handle life at home.

Invite a local military family over for a weekly meal, offer to take kids to a sports practice if it's safe to do so or help out with chores like mowing the lawn or washing the car.

• Donate to charities that serve the military. Adults who have not been vaccinated and are hesitant to be around others can still show their appreciation for military service members. Various organizations help both active-duty military and veterans, and donating to such charities can be a great way to help an excellent cause. If you're unsure about which organization to support, visit Charity Navigator at charitynavigator.org. Charity Navigator evaluates hundreds of thousands of charitable organizations and can be an invaluable resource for prospective donors.

Veterans and active military personnel deserve support. There are various ways for people to express that support, even as the world continues to confront the pandemic.

represented by Mary Ann Williams (Mrs. Charles J. Williams) who, as secretary, wrote a letter to the press in March 1866 asking their assistance in establishing an annual holiday to decorate the graves of soldiers throughout the South. The letter was reprinted in several southern states and the plans were noted in newspapers in the North. The date of April 26 was chosen and the holiday was observed in Atlanta, Augusta, Macon, Columbus and elsewhere in Georgia as well as Montgomery, Alabama, Memphis, Tennessee, Louisville, Kentucky, New Orleans, Louisiana, Jackson, Mississippi and other regions across the South.

"Gen. John A. Logan commented on the observances in a speech to veterans on July 4, 1866, in Salem, Illinois. After General Logan's General Order No. 11 to the Grand Army of the Republic to observe May 30, 1868, the earlier version of the holiday began to be referred to as Confederate Memorial Day.

"A year after the war's end, in April 1866, four women of Columbus, Mississippi, gathered together to decorate the graves of the Confederate soldiers. They also felt moved to honor the Union soldiers buried there and to note the grief of their families by honoring their graves as well. The story of this gesture of humanity and reconciliation is held by some writers as the inspiration for the original Memorial Day despite its occurring last among the claimed inspirations.

The name "Memorial Day", which was first attested in 1882, gradually became more common than "Decoration Day" after World War II but was not declared the official name by federal law until 1967. On June 28, 1968, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which moved four holidays, including Memorial Day, from their traditional dates to a specified Monday in order to create a convenient three-day weekend. The change moved Memorial Day from its traditional May 30 date to the last Monday in May. The law took effect at the federal level in 1971, and all 50 states adopted Congress' change of date within a few years.

The American Legion members were always about during my youth prior to Memorial Day and on the actual day, distributing paper versions of the poppies, due in fact to two important people: Lt. Col. John McCrae, a physician with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, who wrote the poem, "In Flanders Fields," describing the fields of poppies that grew along the soldiers' graves in Flanders, and Miss Moina Michael, a YWCA worker, who was so inspired by McCrae's poem, when she attended a YWCA Overseas War Secretaries' conference, she wore a silk poppy pinned to her coat and

distributed over two dozen more to the members present.

In 1920 the National American Legion adopted it as its official symbol of remembrance.

One of a number of great Walton County citizens who brought fame and honor to our county and town, Moina Michael was born on Aug. 15, 1869, and lived on what is now known as 3698 Moina Michael Road in Good Hope. She was the eldest daughter and second of seven children of John Marion Michael, a Confederate veteran of the American Civil War, and Alice Sherwood Wise. Both sides of her family had Huguenot ancestry, with origins in Brittany and Flanders respectively. Her family was wealthy and owned a cotton plantation until 1898. She was educated at Braswell Academy in Morgan County and the Martin

Institute in Jefferson, Georgia. She became a teacher in 1885, initially in Good Hope and then in Monroe. She also taught at the Lucy Cobb Institute and Normal School, both located in Athens. During 1912-13, Miss Michael studied at Columbia University in New York.

Moina Michael visited Europe in June and July 1914. She was in Germany when the First World War broke out in August 1914, and traveled to Rome to return home to the U.S. In Rome she assisted around 12,000 US tourists to seek passage back across the Atlantic. She returned to the U.S. on the RMS Carpathia and returned to teaching at the Normal School in Athens.

She was a professor at the University of Georgia in April 1917 when the U.S. entered the war. Taking a leave of absence, she volunteered to assist in the New York-based training headquarters for overseas YWCA workers.

On Nov. 9, 1918, she was so inspired by McCrae's poem, "In Flanders Fields," she wrote a poem in response called, "We Shall Keep the Faith." Miss Michael vowed to always wear a red poppy as a symbol of remembrance for those who served in the war.

At the completion of the war, she returned to the University of Georgia, where she taught a class for disabled servicemen. She saw immediately the need to provide financial aid and occupational support for these servicemen and came up with the idea of selling silk poppies as a means of raising funds to assist the disabled veterans. In 1921 her efforts resulted in the poppy being adopted as a symbol of remembrance for war veterans by the American Legion

Auxiliary and by Earl Haig's British Legion Appeal Fund, later named The Royal British Legion.

Miss Michael retired from the University of Georgia in 1934 and published an autobiography, "The Miracle Flower: The Story of the Flanders Fields Memorial Poppy," in 1941. Copies of this book can obtained by contacting the Walton County Historical Society.

After her death on May 10, 1944, the May 12 issue of The Walton Tribune carried a front page obituary: "Poppy Lady" Dead After Noble Career, which read in part, "News of the death of Miss Moina Michael, renowned "Poppy Lady," at the Athens General Hospital early Wednesday morning, was received with much sorrow in Monroe where Miss Michael had been born and reared.

"Funeral services were to occur at the First Baptist Church of Athens this Thursday afternoon at three o'clock and interment will follow at Rest Haven Cemetery in Monroe.

"Miss Michael suggested the poppy as a fitting emblem for Memorial Day and lived to see her suggestion observed throughout the United States, Great Britain and 53 other nations of the world, as it brought in annually approximately \$7 million for the aid of veterans.

"Two weeks before her death Miss Michael completed work on 300 poppies for the huge poppy anchor, which will be launched at Annapolis on May 30th. She had fashioned these anchors with her own hands since 1919, and all these years later these launchings have been an event of national interest.

"Miss Michael resided in Athens for many years where she was director of Winnie Davis Hall, a dormitory on the Co-Ordinate College campus for 35 years, but was a frequent visitor to Monroe. She retired in 1938.

"It was said Miss Michael planned much of her funeral service during her long illness. Her body was to lie in state for an hour preceding the service and an American flag she made will drape her simple mahoga-

ny casket." On Nov. 9, 1948, the Post Office released a 3-cent stamp honoring Moina Michael. At the left of the stamp is Miss Michael's portrait and name. At the left: "Founder of Me-

morial Poppy." Monroe was fortunate in having a citizen of such magnitude and foresight to bring honor to our town and is forever known far and wide as "The Poppy Lady."





Recounting Sherman's pillage of Covington on 'March to the Sea' during Civil War

In 1864, local historians said, the Civil War came to Georgia "in a way that its people had not before experi-

Union General William T. Sherman led 60,000 soldiers on a 285-mile march, which spanned from Nov. 15 to Dec. 21, 1864, from Atlanta to Savannah. His plan was simply to "make Georgia howl" by frightening the state's civilians and pillaging their commu-

nities along the way. Covington, as well as other parts of Newton County, were in the direct path of Union troops, despite the general's decision to split his army into two groups: a left wing and

a right wing. The right wing 'moved south via McDonough to feint at Macon, crossed the Ocmulgee River at Seven Islands (nine miles southeast of

trated around Gordon (17 miles southwest of Milledgeville), where it could communicate with the left wing, then converging on Milledgeville. Kilpatrick's cavalry division covered the right of the army as far as Gordon, skirmishing continually with Wheeler's caval-

ry." There were two sects

marched through Social Circle and Madison, feinted at Augusta, then turned south through Eatonton before later reaching Milledgeville. The other, accompanied by Sherman, marched from Atlanta into Covington, camping one night east of town on the banks of the Alcovy River. Historians say troops destroyed the

man's army. Some historians report that no cities or communities were technically destroyed by Sherman's army as they marched to Savannah. However,

documented first-hand accounts from people in Newton County at the time detail how Union soldiers caused upheaval throughout the

community. Sherman's Special Field Orders called for his army to "forage liberally" but were also to strive "to leave with each family a reasonable portion for their maintenance." However, many troops did not follow the latter of

these commands. Part of the general's orders also stated, "To army corps commanders alone is entrusted the power to destroy mills, houses, cotton-gins, &c., and

for them this general principle is laid down: In districts and neighborhoods where the army is unmolested no destruction of such property should be permitted; but should guerrillas or bushwhackers molest our march, or should the inhabitants burn bridges, obstruct roads, or otherwise manifest local hostility, then army commanders should order and enforce a devastation more or less relentless according to the mea-

his week we honor those who died, but

especially to honor the fallen.

It is fitting that we remember.

I have traveled the world round and round.

The thing that strikes me most in my many wanderings is how truly blessed we are to be American. Americans live in

a land of plenty. Our lives are peaceful and we enjoy the blessings of liberty. Yet very few of us have any idea how uncommon our blessings are.

Democracy is fragile – freedom is rare – despots and dictatorships are the tendency of man. Most of the world

– even today – lives under the boot of tyranny. China, far from becoming more democratic, is actually more autocratic than before. So is Russia, North Korea, Iran, Syria, and most of the Islamic extremists who are trying to create a new caliphate.

The vast majority of people who have ever lived on this planet lived in want and tyranny. In fact, if you added up all the billions of people who have ever lived, less than 2% of humanity has ever known freedom.

Never mind the "1%" that many malign; each and every American is the luckiest 2% of humanity. Worse, almost ev-

ery country has been conquered at one time or another. Almost every nation knows the horrors of suffering under a foreign master. Thanks to the American veteran, we have never been conquered. In fact, since the end of World

War II, our country has basked in a time of blessings that is now referred to as "Pax Americana." Thanks to the "greatest generation," we've enjoyed 75 years of stability similar to the historic eras of "Pax Romana" and "Pax Britannica." We've had small wars, of course. We mourn every soldier that fell in those wars; each honored, hallowed and precious. But the true victory of those brave fallen can be measured by how very few we lost.

In a perfect world, there'd be no war. But there will always be men who want what other men have. To think otherwise is to ignore all of history.

"In a world where the lion lies down with the sheep," said Texas Sen. Phil Graham. "It is important that America remains the lion." The American soldier is the grantor of peace, not only for our own citizens, but of the entire world. Theodoric the Goth

 the barbarian who extinguished the Roman Empire – famously remarked, "Every Goth wants to be a Roman; no Roman wants to be a Goth." The quote is ironic in many ways, but mostly because even he – the pitiless destroyer responsible for the murder of hundreds of thousands understood what he had destroyed...and rued what had been lost.

The Romans were far from perfect. But the collapse of their civilization - who had once enjoyed a "Pax Romana" of their own ushered in a thousand years of misery we now know as the Dark Ages. If the American soldier were ever to fail, the globe would collapse into a ruthless period of ruin, anarchy, and poverty.

Regiment, "the Oglethorps" Georgia State troops, shared insight on Union soldiers' arrival to Newton County:

"The raiders scattered throughout the village.

Pillaging to some extent private residences, destroying government cotton and burning the home of Mr. Irving, an old citizen of the place."

At a home near Cov-

ington, Clark writes:

"... As I sat there on the piazza a federal brigade passed in a short distance from the house followed by a crowd of contrabands (slaves).

"One of the soldiers

came in and took a ham from the party without taking the trouble to ask for it. Others passed through the yard on other errands. Nothing was said to me and I made no special effort to attract their attention.

"I was saying nothing but I was doing some pretty tall thinking."

Dolly Lunt Burge, who lived southeast of Covington off present-day Georgia Hwy. 142, watched the Union soldiers converge on her farm:

"... Like Demons they rush in. My yards are full. To my smoke house, my Dairy, Pantry, kitchen, and cellar like famished wolves they come, breaking locks and whatever is in their way."

Burge was said to be a widow native of Maine who lived with her 9-year-old daughter at the time. They could see large fires burning in the direction of Covington.

"... Sherman (himself) with a greater por-

tion of his army passed my house all day," she wrote. "All day as its sad moments rolled on were they passing, not only in front of my house, but they came up behind; tore down my garden palings, made a road through by backyard and lot field, driving the stock and riding through, tearing down my fences and desolating my home,

wantonly doing it when there was no necessity for it. Such a day, if I live to the age of Methuselah, may God spare me from ever seeing it again." Burge said she was

left without anything to eat, but noted her greatest fear was being homeless. Union soldiers finally made their way out of Newton County by

around Nov. 20, 1864, and Sherman's march concluded in Savannah on Dec. 21 (about three weeks after taking Atlanta). Upon arrival, the city was left without Society. defense as approxi-

mately 10,000 Confederate troops fled days earlier.

The Civil War, which began in April 1861, came to an end the following spring as Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered to Union General Ulysses S. Grant on April 9, 1865, at the Battle of Appomattox Court

House in Virginia. Approximately 1 million soldiers served in the Confederate army while 2.2 million served in the Union Army. By the war's end, more than 1 million total people were recorded dead — roughly 50,000 were considered free civilians; 80,000 were slaves; and the remain-

While many are familiar with the U.S. flag's origin, most do not know the proper etiquette and responsibilities that come with flying the flag.

United States flag facts and handling etiquette

As Memorial Day has arrived and Independence Day draws near, many will be looking to put up their United States flag to honor the nation's fallen soldiers and celebrate the counrty's founding.

But how should they go about replacing a damaged or old flag? And where should they fly their flag? For

how long? The U.S. flag wa first imagined after the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. The Continental Congress authorized creation of the first national flag on June 14, 1777. It was decided that the flag should have 13 stripes, alternating red and white, to represent the original 13 colonies, and that the new union be represented by 13 white stars in a blue field to signify a "new constellation." Francis Hopkinson, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, is most

often credited with the original design.

Today there are 50 stars on the flag to represent the 50 states, while the 13 stripes still represent the 13 British colonies that became the first states.

While this may be common knowledge, Public Law 94-344, known as the Federal Flag Code, may not be as widely known.

The code dictates that the flag is to be treated with respect and proper etiquette. The code is extensive, but the following guidelines can help private individuals interested in displaying their flags do so in accordance with the law.

- Flags should only be displayed in public from sunrise to sunset, unless the flag can be properly illuminated during darkness. In this instance, it may be
- displayed at all times. • When displayed with other flags, such as on a single staff or lanyard, the U.S. flag should be above all

other flags. If flags are displayed in a row, the U.S. flag goes to the observer's left.

- State and local flags are traditionally flown lower than the American flag. During marching
 - ceremonies or parades with other flags, the U.S. flag should be to the observer's left.
 - The flag should be displayed at every public institution and at schools during school
 - When displayed vertically and not on a staff, the union should be on the left when observed. It should be suspended so its folds fall freely as though the flag were staffed.
 - The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.
 - The flag is often displayed at half-staff on days of mourning, including Memorial Day. The flag should first be hoisted to the peak for an instant, then lowered to half-staff position, which is half

the distance between the top and bottom of the staff.

• On a vehicle, the U.S. flag should be displayed from a staff firmly fixed to the chassis. It should not be draped over the hood,

top, sides, or back of a vehicle.

 The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise. It also should never have anything placed on it.

• A flag in poor condition should be destroyed with dignity, preferably by burning. Most American Legion posts and local Boy Scouts troops will have the resources to retire flags accordingly.


