CAN-DO ATTITUDE

Schools collect 21,000 food items for local pantries

COVINGTON, Ga. — Newton County School System (NCSS) staff and students brought in more than 21,000 items of food for its recent collection effort and a Covington church was a major contributor to its successful delivery to local food pantries.

The NCSS Can-A-Thon produced 21,472 food items for the community in the friendly competition among schools for collection of the most items.

This year, Mansfield Elementary School earned bragging rights by collecting 4,219 cans, followed by the Newton County Board of Education Central Office employees who collected 4,152 items.

Rocky Plains Elementary School brought 2,185 canned goods in for local families, followed by Oak Hill Elementary School with 1,916 items of food.

Officials noted that all food items collected in the NCSS Can-A-Thon remain in Newton County to support local families.

NCSS social worker George Hutchinson said the school district's annual Can-A-Thon is extremely important to the Newton County community.

"This is one of the largest, if not the largest, food drives in Newton County and our local food pantries have come

Groundbreaking makes Newton a tech epicenter

COVINGTON, Ga. — When Absolics, a subsidiary of SKG Inc., broke ground on a new \$600 million manufacturing facility in Covington last week, it literally rolled out the red carpet for the 100-plus people in attendance for the event.

In a sense, it was a miniature Who's Who gathering of state and Covington/Newton County business sector leaders, with U.S. Senator Jon Ossoff making an appearance for good measure. All of them came to celebrate what both Newton County Chairman Marcello Banes and Covington mayor Steve Horton called "a huge deal" for

the local area.

A week removed from last Tuesday's groundbreaking, we've had time to consider the implications of Absolics' newest facility, what our local officials have to say about it and what it could mean for the Covington/Newton County community.

Absolics' new manufacturing facility brings exclusivity to Newton County

The relationship with Korean materials industry juggernaut SKG has already been well established, both in Covington and statewide. That happened 26 years ago when SKG first showed up in Newton County,

Ralston stepping down as Georgia House speaker

ATLANTA — Georgia House Speaker David Ralston announced Friday he will not seek another term as leader of the legislative chamber in January, citing a health issue.

“Serving as speaker of the Georgia House of Representatives has been the honor of a lifetime, and I owe a heartfelt thank you to my colleagues for the trust and confidence they placed in me 13 years ago,” said Ralston, R-Blue Ridge. “I need to take time to address a

health challenge which has arisen recently, and the House needs a speaker who can devote the necessary time and energy to the office.”

House members elect a speaker every two years on the first day of the General Assembly session following the November elections. Ralston was elected speaker in 2010 and has been reelected every two years since then, usually with only token opposition if that.

Friday’s announcement will not affect Ralston’s representation of the 7th House District in Northwest Georgia. He is running for

reelection next week unopposed and said he will continue to serve his district during the 2023-24 session.

“I love the House and want to see the honorable men and women who serve in it succeed,” he said. “I will work the remainder of my term as speaker to ensure a smooth transition for my successor.”

Ralston was elected to the House in 2002 after spending six years in the state Senate during the 1990s. He ran for attorney general in 1998, losing to Democrat Thurbert

Baker.

Highlights of Ralston’s time as speaker include his backing of the largest state income tax cut in Georgia history, a \$900 million transportation funding bill that has helped the state plug a backlog of critical bridge and highway improvements, adoption reform, and the first-ever paid parental leave policy for teachers and state employees.

Most recently, Ralston led the way this year to passage of legislation overhauling Georgia’s mental health-care system.

pend on us for this food drive to restock their pantries for the upcoming holiday season and winter season,” Hutchinson said.

“Particularly right now with our economy being so impacted by the pandemic, a lot of people are hurting and in need. This goes a long way for these food pantries to provide for their

needs.” As the number of cans collected continued to grow, Newton County School System had to reach out for assistance with pickup and delivery of the canned food items this year. When the call went out for assistance, New Life Praise Center quickly stepped up to the plate.

The leadership team at New Life — a NCSS

Partner in Education — immediately began coordinating a delivery plan.

Within a week, all 21,472 items from the participating schools had been delivered to three local food organizations: The Salvation Army Food Pantry, the Newton Community Food Pantry and the Covington First United Methodist Church Food Pantry.

Some schools had so many items that multiple trips were needed to

complete the delivery. The team of volunteers from New Life were very glad to be part of this great work.

“I can’t say enough about the incredible efforts of Pastor Justin Adams and New Life Praise Center,” Hutchinson said. “Their army of volunteers, under the leadership of Mr. Artie Brunson, facilitated the pickup and delivery of all of our items from 19 locations and delivered them to the three food

pantries in a little over a week, assisted by volunteers at each school who helped load the items. This accomplishment deserves special recognition!”

Pastor Justin Adams is no stranger to serving this community. As the NCSS 2018 Partner of the Year, New Life Praise Center and Adams dedicate time and resources to seven NCSS schools through partnerships and support. “Investing in our local

schools and community continues to be a big part of our work through these 12 years as a local church,” Adams said. “Everyone is welcome at New Life Praise Center, and we view our community as an extension of our church family.

“We were very proud to help NCSS with the Can-a-Thon this year, and we will continue to be ready to serve our community in so many great ways.”

Excuse me, but animation not just for kids

Animation is in a bit of a crisis in the constantly teetering world of pop culture these days.

Netflix, hemorrhaging money lately due to various questionable business decisions, has nearly shut down their entire animation department. Warner Bros., under the leadership of a new CEO dedicated solely to cutting down expenses after yet another costly merger acquisition, is also cutting down heavily on their animation output.

Now, in yet another sign that the people who are supposed to produce animation don't actually like animation, the CEO of Disney, Bob Chapek, threw his own company's most famous asset under the bus.

Chapek was quoted in The Wall Street Journal that his customers are, to all intents and purposes, not interested in animated product when they're not watching with their children.

This is the head of Disney, which has produced the most famous animated movies in the world. Clearly the family audience is their primary target, but does he really think you make nearly a billion dollars off of "Frozen" based solely on the under-13 crowd?

Does he not understand how many so-called "Disney adults" are out there, still coasting off of 90s nostalgia in their love for all things from the Mouse?

But no one in Hollywood really seems to understand that animation appeals to anyone other than small kids and overgrown man children.

An executive at Cartoon Network recently said they wanted to branch out into live-action programming — on the cartoon channel, mind you — because girls don't watch cartoons after a certain age.

Never mind the idea that maybe girls would watch cartoons if they catered to their interests more. No, the medium is the problem, let's throw it out along with the entire mission of the cable channel while we're at it.

You're probably shaking your head right now, wondering what all the fuss is about. I'm well aware a lot of people DO think cartoons are only for children, which only further contributes to the problem — because no one expects animation to cater to anyone but kids, the studios continue to aim most of their animated output at mostly kids.

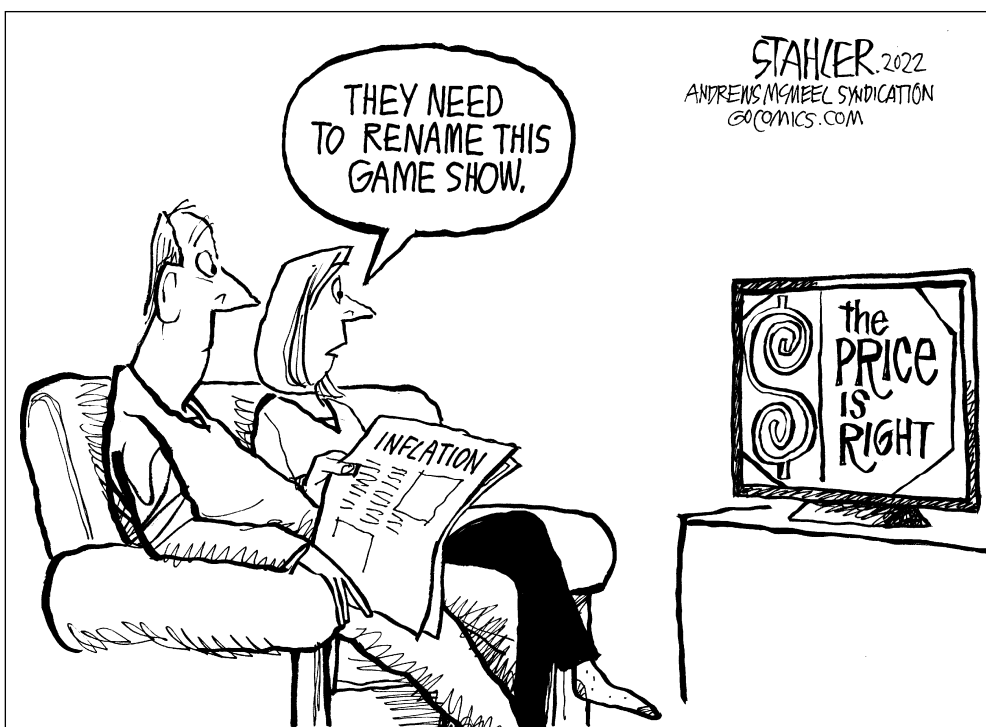
But animation can appeal to more than just kids — and I don't mean in the way, say, "South Park" attracts a teen audience by deliberately adding curse words and innuendo.

Adult animation is prolific on TV, where "The Simpsons" and "King of the Hill" have been standards for years. Animation

Midterms, Biden and the filibuster

On March 2, 2021, when he had been president less than two months, Joe Biden met with a group of liberal historians in the White House East Room. The subject was Biden's "determination to be one of the most consequential presidents" in U.S. history, according to an account in Axios. The group talked a lot about Franklin Delano Roosevelt and the New Deal — Biden's model for the "think-big, go-big mentality" that characterized the first months of his presidency. The president has "giant plans teed up that could make Biden's New Deal the biggest change to governance in our lifetimes," Axios wrote.



It was all a little ludicrous, given one fact: Democrats had the barest of majorities in the House and no majority at all in the Senate, where a 50-50 tie gave them control only with the tie-breaking vote of Vice President Kamala Harris. Roosevelt had huge majorities in both houses of Congress when he pushed reams of far-reaching legislation into law.

Still, it's fair to say Biden punched above his weight for a while. First, he passed the "American Rescue Plan," a giant \$1.9 trillion spending package os-

tensibly devoted to "COVID relief" that flooded the economy with unneeded money and helped worsen the inflation that has marked his time in office. Then he passed, with a lot of Republican help, a giant \$1.2 trillion bipartisan infrastructure bill. And then, after much drama, with the crucial assistance of Democratic Sen. Joe Manchin, he passed a giant \$450 billion climate change and health care bill misleadingly called the "Inflation Reduction Act," which purported to help solve the problem exacerbated by his first big legislative achievement.

So for a president with a tiny majority in the House and none at all in the Senate, Biden managed to do a lot of damage. But now that is about to end.

If Republicans win control of the House in this week's midterms, as they are all but guaranteed to do, whatever remains of the president's legislative agenda is over. It will not pass. The Republican House leadership, headed by likely Speaker Kevin McCarthy, will not help Joe Biden go big. It will not help him go anywhere. In the Senate, a Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, should that come to pass, would not be much more helpful.

Actions may rob future generations

Dear Editor,

As the four Chambers of Commerce representing Jasper, Morgan, Newton and Walton, we serve hundreds of businesses across the four counties. We believe the Rivian opportunity is yet another business that will benefit our community.

The primary goal of economic development and support for local businesses is regional economic growth through quality job creation. That is a basic function of our chambers. It is our mission to support local businesses and recruit high-paying, quality job creators that can increase the median household income and per capita income for the area. Higher incomes attract higher-end retail and restaurants to the region. What's more, those with disposable income are more likely to support local businesses, donate to local nonprofits, tithe to local churches, and spend on services that support businesses like hardware stores and beauty salons.

A larger tax base improves quality of life through enhanced and expanded public services including public safety, parks, hiking trails, and walkability. The larger tax base

from the Rivian project will also support critical emergency services like ambulances and police resources. It's easy to overlook the benefits this community has reaped from quality economic development projects such as Takeda and Meta. Thanks to these efforts and the positive business climate we've created in the region, property tax rates have not increased.

The math is simple: better development leads to better resources. Right now, 60% of our taxes go to our schools. New tax revenue would also allow the community to attract teachers with competitive salaries in an area with strong job prospects for their students. Broadening the local tax base and keeping good-paying jobs in the region are the only long-term ways to ensure schools consistently provide top-tier education and results for children. Simply put, a rising tide lifts all boats.

We are confident in this project because of the immense, tangible benefits that it would provide both in the short and long term. Rivian's arrival will allow our community to invest more resources in education, job

tries to explain the news to the president’s supporters. “For President Biden, the Dreaming-of-FDR phase of his presidency may end in a little more than a week,” the Times wrote. “If Republicans capture one or both houses of Congress in midterm elections, as polling suggests, Mr. Biden’s domestic agenda will suddenly transform from a quest for a New Deal 2.0 to trench warfare defending the accomplishments of his first two years in office.” The Times stresses the efforts Republicans might make to undo some of what Biden has already done. While the GOP will indeed stop Biden from doing anything new, it is unlikely they will actually reverse much of what has been passed. For

two reasons. One, Biden remains president. He can veto things. Even if bills undoing his accomplishments made it through both House and Senate, Biden will be able to stop them, and there is virtually no chance Republicans would be able to muster the huge majorities needed to overturn a veto. The second reason is the filibuster. Even if Republicans take control of the Senate, they are likely to have a 51- or 52-seat majority. The real optimists hope for 53 or 54. But even the best-case scenario for the Senate leaves Republicans far short of the 60 votes required to pass legislation over Democratic filibusters, which will surely come. The legislative filibuster is the best barometer of hypoc-

rises in the U.S. Senate — and that is saying something. The late Republican Sen. Fred Thompson used to describe it simply: “If I’m in the minority, the filibuster is good. If I’m in the majority, the filibuster is bad.” The problem is, the Senate changes hands. A senator who is in the majority today can be in the minority next year. That, as it happens, is what might happen to Democrats soon. To cite one good example. In April 2017, when they were in the minority, 33 Democratic senators, including now-Vice President Kamala Harris, signed a letter to the majority leader defending the filibuster. “We are united in our determination to preserve the ability of members to engage in extended debate when bills are

sent to the floor,” they wrote. “Therefore, we are asking you to join us in opposing any effort to curtail the existing rights and prerogatives of senators ...” Back then, the filibuster was good. Less than four years later, Democrats had won tenuous control of the Senate, plus control of the House and White House. Guess what happened then? The filibuster became bad. Eager to pass the Biden agenda, nearly all Democrats jumped on board to eliminate the legislative filibuster. If it had not been for holdouts like Manchin and Sen. Kyrsten Sinema, they might have done it — because the filibuster was bad, bad, bad. Now, however, Senate Democrats face the prospect of returning to the minority.

And -- you guessed it -- the filibuster will again become good. Democrats will use it to stop the “radical agenda” of the GOP. It will likely not be a hair-on-fire urgent issue, because Senate Democrats know they have a backstop in the White House, where the Democrat in the Oval Office will veto any unwanted legislation Republicans might improbably get through the Senate. But the filibuster will, once again, be good. But that is all details. The bottom line is that, as far as the legislation that Biden and Democrats want to pass is concerned, the party will be over.

forgive the voters for they know not what they have done.” The voters may have been forgiven, but they did not forget. He ran again in the next election, and got beat even worse. I also predict that some of the sore losers will spout conspiracy theories, much like what we’ve seen nationally in recent years. Finally, I predict defeated candidates, particularly those with national name recognition, will eventually lick their wounds and move on to a new career. They will become lobbyists or commentators on the cable opinion network that best amplifies their views. And, they will make even more money than if they had been elected. You can see why I have full confidence in the accuracy of my predictions. History really does repeat itself.

starting a strong and continuous connection that now has grown to include Georgia Tech and has given a different kind of exclusivity to Covington in the tech industry.

How, you ask? Simply because last week's announcement not only signals the creation of, as Ossoff put it, "400 new jobs for Covington, for Newton County and for the state of Georgia," it also means that our area will be the first global producer of a new glass substrate that industry experts say will help revolutionize the world of computer technology.

Ossoff called the groundbreaking a win for the CHIPS (Creating Helpful Incentives to Produce Semiconductors and Science) Act which was signed on August 9, 2022, designed to boost U.S. competitiveness, innovation and national security.

"This is why we passed the CHIPS act earlier this year," Ossoff said. "It's focused specifically on attracting and incentivizing investments just like this one. What's happened here is vital to our state's economic future and our national security."

It puts Covington in a place where it can be an epicenter of

sorts for the continued growth of the semiconductor industry.

Covington/Newton County area primed for future growth

When Chairman Banes began his statements about the impact of Absolics' glass substrate manufacturing facility, the first thing he mentioned pointed to the strengths of the Covington/Newton County community that continue to make it attractive for business growth.

"They really could've gone anywhere to do this, but they chose us again," Banes said. "That's because we have great things to offer here. We have great people in leadership, and that makes companies and industry want to come here."

Mayor Steve Horton had similar feelings.

"It is a great economic venture, and it'll mean jobs, high paying jobs," Horton said. "It'll bring that collateral and employment base and jobs that furthers not just Covington, but the county, the state and all over the region.

It speaks very highly of our area. This is the third place the SK Group has invested in in Georgia. Two of them are right here in Newton County, Georgia."

Banes pointed to several specifics that he feels makes the area a continuous attraction.

"First of all, water is a major thing," Banes said. "We have great community partnership here with the City of Covington and Newton County Water and Sewer Authority. Sewer capacity is something they look for when they come to a community. They look at our school systems and the things they have to offer. Even things like our recreation opportunities and our trail system. This company is an outdoor type of company that promotes healthy living. We have things in place that make us attractive."

Horton, a native of Covington, remembers when the SK Group first showed up on the scene in Newton County when it built its current

facility back in 1996. He said that this next phase proves that the area is doing many things the right way.

"It was a big deal then when they first came 26 years ago, and it's still a big deal today," Horton said. "But how much more of a big deal now with all the additions coming?"

What's more is, every economic and predictive marker indicates that the semiconductor industry is on the precipice of a strong trajectory forward. According to a recent report from Deloitte, it's safe to expect steady growth in the industry, which can produce some growing pains, but also more opportunities.

"Over the long run, semiconductor revenues are likely to oscillate around a trend line," the Deloitte report states. "Still, that trend looks steeper than ever before as we enter a period of robust secular growth." The group predicted that some chip shortages would ease in 2022, and developments like what Absolics rolled out last week are a part of that.

Industry brings relief to the area

Currently, the Covington/Newton County area can be accu-

ately described as a house divided in some regards when it comes to the discussion of local growth.

When I first returned to the area back in August, I noticed a sharp uptick in traffic, not to mention hotels, businesses and development in places where empty fields once sat when I first arrived in 2016. It's evident that while some are excited to welcome the growth and see it as positive, another segment of the community is wary of the negatives it can bring.

Banes and Horton tried to encourage those who feel a bit hesitant to embrace the area's industrial boom by highlighting the positives, economic and otherwise.

"Right now, Newton County is a place where the citizens of our community carry the workload on our tax base," Banes said. "And we look to bring in different industries into this community to help bring relief to the area. The only way you can bring that kind of relief — the kind that takes burden off the citizens — is to bring in industry that lifts that burden. That's why we're excited about this opportunity."

Said Horton: "This

brings that collateral and employment base and jobs to the area that we need, but it doesn't just further Covington, but the county, the state and region. Since we seem to roll out of one economic valley into another, especially since the pandemic, we need that."

While any new development will bring about its own unique set of challenges, Horton says he also knows that the kind of opportunities that come from a Korean company that's done the work to build a healthy relationship with this community can only be good things.

"The entrance and increase of this industry in our area shows the strength of relationship building," Horton said. "We can do a lot of things together that we'd never been able to do just as a city, or county or even a state alone. All this started with people working together. It says that if it's right and there's a way to do it where it benefits the community, the investor and our region, we'll do it."

"You've gotta think a little bit bigger than the immediate spot you stand on."

Eastside travel to Calhoun for round one

The Eagles' (6-4, 3-3) first round matchup will be against No. 1 seed Calhoun (7-3, 4-1 Region 7-AAAAA) on the road Saturday, Nov. 12 at 7:30 p.m.

This is Eastside's seventh consecutive season in which it has qualified for the playoffs. According to head coach Jay Cawthon, Saturday's contest will be a tough one.

"[Calhoun] is a great football team with a lot of tradition," Cawthon said. "It's going to be a four quarter, physical football game. We just have to be mistake free and handle the bad with the good. It's going to be a four quarter war. And, we pride our-

selves on being physical. So, we'll take up there and see what happens."

On Oct. 28 at Sharp Stadium, the Eagles officially stamped their ticket to the postseason with a 30-14 win over Winder-Barrow. Eastside also downed region opponents Flowery Branch and Heritage to claim the region's four seed. All three region losses were against higher seeds and two of them were by a combined four points.

The Eagles were led by their defense which only surrendered 14-plus points on two occasions in 2022. D'Von Duplessis, Jean Claude Joseph III and Jacorey Jackson were among the top of the list of defensive performers throughout this season.

Their three-headed rushing attack of Kenai Grier, DJ Henderson and Jayden Barr as well as quarterback E'Sean Arnold assisted in a big way for Eastside's postseason berth. Saabir Berrien helped lead the wide receiver corp, too.

Stay food safe this Thanksgiving

WASHINGTON — Keep your stomach full of turkey and free from food borne illness this Thanksgiving holiday.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reminds all that it's important to remember the steps to food safety during America's biggest meal.

USDA Deputy Under Secretary Sandra Eskin said, "While the four steps to food safety — clean, separate, cook and chill — are important every day and at every meal, they are particularly significant on Thanksgiving.

"There will likely be many guests and many delicious dishes at your holiday table, but you don't want to invite any food borne pathogens. Follow those four steps — in particular remember to use a food thermometer — and your Thanksgiving dinner will be a safe one."

Keep a Thanksgiving celebration food safe by following these tips:

Clean and Sanitize

Handwashing is the first step to avoiding foodborne illness. Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds with soap and water before, during, and after handling food. In a recent study, 97% of participants in a USDA test kitchen failed to wash their hands properly.

Make sure to follow these handwashing steps:

- Wet your hands with clean, running water.
- Lather your fingers with soap.
- Scrub soapy hands and fingers thoroughly for at least 20 seconds.
- Rinse your hands under clean, running water.
- Dry hands off with a clean towel or air dry them.

Clean and sanitize any surfaces that have touched raw turkey and its juices and will later touch food such as kitchen counters, sinks, stoves, tabletops, etc.

Avoid Cross-Contamination

Cross-contamination is the spread of bacteria from raw meat and poultry onto ready-to-eat food, surfaces, and utensils. One way to avoid this is by using separate cutting boards — one for raw meat and poultry, and another for fruits and vegetables.

A recent USDA study found that sinks are the most contaminated areas of the kitchen. USDA recommends against washing your raw poultry due to the risk of splashing bacteria throughout your kitchen. Clean and sanitize any areas that will come into contact with the turkey before and after cooking.

Thaw the Turkey Safely

Never thaw your turkey in hot water or leave it on a countertop. There are three ways to safely thaw a turkey: in

the refrigerator, in cold water and in the microwave.

• **Refrigerator thawing:** Turkey can be safely thawed in a refrigerator to allow for slow and safe thawing. When thawing in a refrigerator, allow roughly 24 hours for every four to five pounds of turkey. After thawing, a turkey is safe in a refrigerator for one to two days.

• **Cold water thawing:** The cold water thawing method will thaw your turkey faster but will require more attention. When thawing in a cold-water bath, allow 30 minutes per pound and submerge the turkey in its original wrapping to avoid cross-contamination. Change the water every 30 minutes until the turkey is thawed. The turkey must be cooked immediately after thawing.

• **Microwave thawing:** To thaw a turkey that fits in the microwave, follow manufacturer's recommendations.

Cook it immediately after thawing because some areas of the food may become warm and begin to cook during the thawing process, bringing the food to the "Danger Zone" — between 40 degrees F and 140 degrees F which is where bacteria can multiply quickly and cause the food to become unsafe. Discard all foods that have been left out for more than two hours.

It's safe to cook a completely frozen turkey; however, it will take at least 50% longer to fully cook.

Cook Thoroughly

Your turkey is safe to eat once it reaches an internal temperature of

165 F. Insert a food thermometer into the thickest part of the breast, the innermost part of the wing and the innermost part of the thigh to check its internal temperature.

USDA recommends using a food thermometer even if the turkey has a pop-up temperature indicator to ensure it has reached 165 degrees in the three previously stated places.

Stuffing your Turkey

USDA recommends against stuffing your turkey since this often leads to bacteria growth. However, if you plan to stuff your turkey, follow these steps:

- Prepare the wet and dry ingredients for the stuffing separately from each other and refrigerate until ready to use. Mix wet and dry ingredients just before filling the bird's cavity.
- Do not stuff whole poultry and leave in the refrigerator before cooking.
- Stuff the turkey loosely — about 3/4 cup of stuffing per pound.
- Immediately place the stuffed, raw turkey in an oven set no lower than 325 degrees.

• A stuffed turkey will take longer to cook. Once it has finished cooking, place a food thermometer in the center of the stuffing to ensure it has reached a safe internal temperature of 165 degrees.

• Let the cooked turkey stand 20 minutes before removing the stuffing.

The Two-Hour Rule

Don't leave your food sitting out too long! Refrigerate all perishable foods sitting out at room temperature within two hours of being cooked, or one hour if the temperature is 90 F or above. After two hours, perishable food will enter the "Danger Zone."

Remember the rule — keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold.

• **Transporting hot foods** — Wrap dishes in insulated containers to keep their temperature above 140 F.

• **Transporting cold foods** — Place items in a cooler with ice or gel packs to keep them at or below 40 F.

When serving food to groups, keep hot food hot and keep cold food cold by using chafing dishes or crock pots and ice trays. Hot items should remain above 140 F and cold items should remain below 40 F.

Leftovers

Store leftovers in small shallow containers and put them in the refrigerator. Thanksgiving leftovers are safe to eat up to four days in the refrigerator. In the freezer, leftovers are safely frozen indefinitely but will keep best quality from two to six months.

Certain items are staples of the Thanksgiving dinner table. For example, mashed potatoes, candied yams and stuffing are Thanksgiving stalwarts. Pumpkin and apple pies help wrap up the festivities.

Thanksgiving hosts and hostesses interested in injecting more variety into their Thanksgiving offerings may want to consider a few unique side dishes to complement their turkey dinners. Sides that borrow from familiar flavors may fit seamlessly into the holiday feast and add spark to the meal.

This recipe for "Gnocchi with Roasted Cauliflower" from "Real Simple Dinner Tonight: Done!" (Time Home Entertainment) from the editors of Real Simple is

rooted in popular ingredients synonymous with Thanksgiving. Gnocchi is a chewy and filling pasta made from potato — a holiday standard, while cauliflower is a mild, versatile vegetable that absorbs the spices and flavors of other ingredients. Putting these two ingredients together allows holiday hosts to provide a new side with some familiar flavors at this year's Thanksgiving dinner.

Gnocchi with Roasted Cauliflower

Serves 4 (as a main course)
 1 small head cauliflower, cut into small florets
 1/4 cup fresh sage leaves
 3 tablespoons olive oil
 Kosher salt and black pepper
 1 pound gnocchi (fresh or frozen)
 1/4 cup grated Parmesan

Heat oven to 400 F. On a rimmed baking sheet, toss the cauliflower and sage with the oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Roast, tossing once, until the cauliflower is golden brown and tender, 25 to 30 minutes.

Fifteen minutes before the cauliflower is finished, cook the gnocchi according to the package directions. Divide the gnocchi among bowls and top with the cauliflower and Parmesan.

Tip: Cauliflower florets are easier to separate if you remove the core first. Place the head stem-side up. Using a paring knife, cut around the core at an angle, creating a cone-shaped piece, then lift it out. If the head is very large, halve it first through the core.

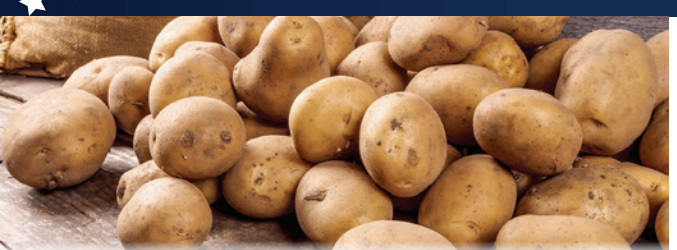

momentum generated by that ruling, Adityanath then stated, according to a Reuters article in late January, that he would “champion the Hindu cause” as to who should own and control the site where a Hindu temple and Muslim mosque stand side-by-side.

Adityanath won the election, but there was no shortage of angst and trepidation about whether or not there would be a repeat in 2022 of the kind of poll violence Uttar Pradesh saw in 2017.

According to reports, the occurrence of violence was drastically down. But it says

something that more people are surprised at the decline of violence than the threat of such.

Just last month, an article from article-14.com detailed how leaders of the Bharatiya Janata Party’s (BJP’s) campaign for the Delhi Assembly election created an atmosphere for widespread election violence back in 2020. A “powder keg” climate is what the article referred to it as.

Back on the Homefront, we’ve seen a litany of examples that remind us how imperfect our nation is, and how we are one bad day away from

looking like an underdeveloped, war-torn third-world nation.

Our political unrest has reminded us that democracy is free but not cheap, and also much more fragile than we may want to believe. But what should marvel us is how it has held up as well as it has for so many hundreds of years.

That freedom of speech thing we regularly fight about? Countless American soldiers put their lives on the line to give us the right to debate among ourselves about it.

Peaceful transitions

of political power — although, regardless of who you want to blame, the fact is we came dangerously close in our last Presidential election to something less than that — are brought to you by a hard-working, self-sacrificing members of the United States military.

If you’re like me, born and raised in the 1980s and 90s or before, you probably saw our greatest threat to our nation and its military was another nation and its military. Those times have changed. We hear more now about quasi-political-religious groups, rag-tag “armies” of terrorists and insurrectionists and even threats of biological and technological warfare.

These things have, indeed, changed our military’s tactics, but it’s done nothing to change the overarching mission of our service men and women — that is to vehemently protect our nation against enemies foreign, domestic and otherwise.

Two years ago, I had the privilege of watching one of my bonus sons become an Air Force man. What an incredible opportunity it was for me to see up close and personal the level of pride those who serve and have served our nation militaristically take in their duties. It almost

made my then-40-year-old self want to enlist.

Say what you want about the warts of our nation — and there are many. Just think how many more there would be if not for the men and women who have served us so well to protect our liberties and give us the privilege — yes, privilege to be able to have dissension about important matters without being a cause for automatic civil war.

That said, we’d better not take for granted where we are as a free nation and how we got here. Because it could quickly change if we start acting like these freedoms are just owed to us, and that they’ll just automatically always be there.

That’s why I say, what better time than Election Week to honor our veterans? To honor their sacrifices? To honor the fruit of their labor which is our continuous freedom?

In our Veterans Day special section, there’s an article that provides three ways we can pay homage and respect to veterans. But I think I’ve got an even bigger way — one that transcends most of the others.

The best way we can say “thank you” to a veteran is by living lives that show appreciation for what they fought for. It’s us not taking for granted the

things we enjoy in this nation.

It’s showing appreciation for what has been won to us through literal blood, sweat, tears and sacrifice on our world’s numerous battlefields by not shedding innocent blood — actual and proverbial — in our own streets and with our own countrymen over frivolous disagreements and disputes that could be more constructively solved through a change in how we communicate with each other.

Even now, I realize I couldn’t write what I’m writing — I couldn’t utilize that platform of a free press without the purchase of it through elite sacrifice. It’s elite because so few of us are willing to pay that cost.

So I salute you, veterans. I thank you, veterans, even on this election week. Especially on this election week. We are reminded, this week, that what we are able to do, from politics to religion and everything in between, is because of you. I pray, now, that we as a community and as a nation can do a greater job of appreciating your service through our actions with each other.

Veterans Day begins with Armistice Day

Veterans Day is a byproduct of the end of World War I, when Germany and the Allied Nations signed the Treaty of Versailles, formally ceasing fighting and establishing terms of peace.

On Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the signing of the treaty,

the first Armistice Day events were held.

Armistice Day was initially a legal holiday to honor the end of World War I only, states History.com. The U.S. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an annual observance, and November 11 became a national holiday starting in 1938. However, in 1954, after the country had been embroiled

in both World War II and the Korean War, Congress amended the Act of 1938 by renaming the commemoration "Veterans Day" to honor veterans of all wars.

Veterans Day in October?

According to Military.com, for a short time, thanks to the Uniform Holiday Bill, which in 1968 established three-day weekends for

federal employees by celebrating national holidays on Mondays, Veterans Day was moved to the fourth Monday of October — the first being Oct. 25, 1971.

However, many people did not agree with this decision, continuing to honor the holiday on the original date. In 1975, President Gerald Ford signed a new law that returned Veterans Day

to November 11 beginning in 1978. Since then, parades, memorial events, volunteer efforts, and other celebrations revolving around veterans have been held on Nov. 11.

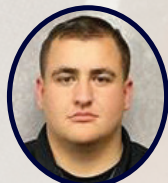

Combat veterans and the threat posed by PTSD

Every day men and women in the military put themselves in harm's way to protect the lives and freedoms of their fellow countrymen. These brave men and women pay a steep price for their service, spending time away from their loved ones and putting themselves at risk of long-term physical and mental injuries.

Many men and women, even those who never served in the military, are aware of post-traumatic stress disorder, or PTSD, a mental health problem that some people develop after experiencing or witnessing a life-threatening event. Combat veterans are vulnerable to PTSD, and the percentage of veterans who deal with it each day is alarming.

According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, as many as 20 percent of veterans who served during Operations Iraqi Freedom or Enduring Freedom have PTSD. In addition, the USDVA notes that estimates now suggest as many as 30 percent of Vietnam veterans have had PTSD in their lifetime.

Though it's not exclusive to men and women who have served in the military, PTSD has long been linked to combat veterans. In fact, the American Psychiatric Association notes that PTSD has been referred



to as "shell shock" and "combat fatigue" in the past.

While the APA notes that a diagnosis of PTSD requires exposure to an upsetting traumatic event, that exposure can be indirect rather than firsthand. Because some people may assume that only firsthand exposure

to trauma can lead to PTSD, many may be suffering in silence.

That makes it all the more important that people learn to recognize the symptoms of PTSD. According to the APA, symptoms of PTSD, which can vary in severity, fall into four categories.

1. Intrusive thoughts:

Flashbacks, distressing dreams and repeated, involuntary memories are examples of intrusive thoughts symptomatic of PTSD. The APA notes that some people with PTSD experience flashbacks so vivid that they feel they are reliving the traumatic experience or that it is unfolding before their eyes.

2. Avoiding reminders: Some people with PTSD may avoid people, places, activities, objects, or situations they feel will trigger distressing memories. Soldiers, for example, may avoid interacting

with fellow combat veterans. Avoiding discussions about a traumatic event and how they feel about it is another symptom of PTSD.

3. Negative thoughts and feelings: The APA says that negative thoughts and feelings may include ongoing and distorted beliefs about oneself or others; ongoing fear, horror, anger, guilt, or shame; considerably diminished interest in activities previously enjoyed; and a sense of estrangement and detachment from others.

4. Arousal and reactive symptoms:

These symptoms may include irritability and angry outbursts; reckless or self-destructive behavior; being easily startled; or have difficulty concentrating or sleeping.

PTSD poses a significant threat to the men and women who serve in the military. Additional resources about PTSD is available at www.ptsd.va.gov and www.psychiatry.org. And for local help in Georgia and metro Atlanta, check out Emory Healthcare's Veterans Care Program.

ica's closest neighbor to the north, Canada, commemorates veterans on Remembrance Day (also Nov. 11), as does the United Kingdom. Britain also has Remembrance Sunday, which is the second Sunday of November. Remembrance Day also is called Poppy Day, when people of the Commonwealth member states wear a red

poppy flower in honor of military members who have died in the line of duty.

There are various ways to honor veterans on Veterans Day and Remembrance Day. Federal government closings, educational efforts in schools, parades, and visits to military hospitals or cemeteries may take

place. In Europe, it is common to observe two minutes of silence at 11 a.m. every Nov. 11.

Veterans Day and its sister holidays mark the honoring of veterans of all wars, with a particular focus on living veterans. It is a day to celebrate the dedication and selflessness of hardworking military men and women.

Veterans Day commemorates the hardworking men and women who sacrifice their time and put themselves in harm's way to defend the country's core values of freedom and opportunity.

But while Veterans Day certainly is a chance to honor those who have donned the uniform during wars and military installations, it also can be a chance to recognize the unsung heroes of wartime — those who step into roles so that soldiers and strategists can focus their attention elsewhere.

Take Naomi Parker Fraley. In 1942, Fraley was a machine shop worker at the Naval Air Station in Alameda, California. She was one of scores of women who worked in factories and shipyards during World War II, helping produce munitions and war supplies. Parker was 20 years old in 1942 and served as the inspiration for what would become one of the most indelible images of the era, known as "Ros-

ie the Riveter." Parker unknowingly inspired the iconic image after she was photographed at work bent over an industrial machine in a jumpsuit with her hair tied back in a polka-dot bandana. In 2018, Naomi Parker Fraley died at the age of 96, not nearly the household name she perhaps should have been.

Rosie the Riveter helped to tout the contributions of female war employees who were defending America by working on the homefront. Rosie was a successful morale-booster, and some may be surprised to learn that Rosie has various incarnations.

Norman Rockwell's depiction of a female riveter, which appeared on the cover of the Saturday Evening Post on May 29, 1943, became an iconic staple of that time. Muscular, with a rivet gun on her lap, a sandwich in hand and a boot stomping on a copy of "Mein Kampf" — and timed perfectly to coincide with the release of a song called "Rosie the Riveter" by Redd Evans and John Jacob Loeb — Rosie became a household

name. But another Rosie image actually predates Rockwell's Post cover.

Fraley was reportedly the inspiration for an ad created by a lesser known artist named J. Howard Miller. Miller produced a "We Can Do It!" poster for Westinghouse Electric in 1942 aimed at boosting spirits among the company's workers. The poster helped to recruit new female personnel, according to scholar James J. Kimble. This Rosie was portrayed in a red bandana with her bent arm flexed, rolling up her shirtsleeve.

Both Miller's and Rockwell's depictions of female war workers became ingrained in popular culture. Rockwell's cover art was eventually loaned to the U.S. Department of the Treasury for use in war bond drives for the duration of the war. Miller's version has been emulated for generations and still epitomizes a strong female presence in the workforce.

Veterans Day is a prime time to delve into American wartime history, and pay homage to all of our nation's heroes.

retary of Defense indicates that there were roughly 1.3 million active-duty military personnel in 2018. Many of those service members serve overseas for months at a time. Their families back home can use a helping hand even in the best of times, but they might be especially needy while confronting the pandemic. Though vaccination projections suggest hundreds of millions of Americans will be fully vaccinated by mid-summer, in the meantime neighbors can help local military families handle life at home. Invite a local military family over for a weekly meal, offer to take kids to a sports practice if it's safe to do so or help out with chores like mowing the lawn or washing the car.

- Donate to charities that serve the military. Adults who have not been vaccinated and are hesitant to be around others can still show their appreciation

for military service members. Various organizations help both active-duty military and veterans, and donating to such charities can be a great way to help an excellent cause. If you're unsure about

which organization to support, visit Charity Navigator at charitynavigator.org. Charity Navigator evaluates hundreds of thousands of charitable organizations and can be an invaluable resource for

prospective donors.

Veterans and active military personnel deserve support. There are various ways for people to express that support, even as the world continues to confront the pandemic.

According to the Council on Foreign Relations, the draft for military service was ended in 1973, a point in time when 2.2 million men and women made up the country's active military personnel.

By 2018, the number had dipped below 1.3 million. Military service in Canada is also somewhat uncommon, as the Department of National Defence reports that active military personnel totaled just 68,000 as of 2018.

Covington veteran, 97, remembers entry into Army

COVINGTON, Ga. — When you ask Hugh Steele about the current climate of our nation, he can't help but get emotional.

It's because Steele, 97, and a veteran of the Army, remembers a time when the mood in our country was the exact, polar opposite.

When World War II began in 1939, Steele's draft classification was listed as a deferred. That changed on Sunday Dec. 7, 1941 when Japanese forces unleashed a surprise attack on Pearl Harbor naval base near Honolulu, Hawaii, just before 8 a.m. that day.

On that fateful morning, hundreds of fighter planes from Japan destroyed close to 20 American naval vessels, eight battleships and more

than 300 airplanes. According to History.com, more than 2,400 Americans died in the attack, including civilians. One thousand more were injured.

Less than 24 hours after the assault, President Franklin D. Roosevelt declared war on Japan.

And for Steele, that declaration shifted everything in his life.

"Back in World War II, there was a tremendous amount of patriotism, such that I've never seen anything like it since that time," Steele said. "The Japanese had just attacked us, and though you'll always

have a few dissidents, mostly everybody just felt a great sense of patriotic duty. I felt a real need to be a part of (the war). It was the biggest event of the century, and I didn't want to be left on the sideline."

It still was a tough decision for him to make as his two brothers were also in the military — one in the Army and another in the Navy. Still, it didn't take long for that patriotic duty to become contagious.

"I wanted to go, so I called the chairman of the draft board and had my status changed from

deferred to 1A," he said.

From there, Steele went on to basic training in Florida. He gained M1 expertise with the rifle and received his badge after basic training was over. But as much as Steele felt a duty to defend his country, he acknowledges that he was glad that he was able to come return home to his family unscathed by battle.

"On my way overseas, we dropped the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and that essentially ended the war," Steele said. "So in that way, I was fortunate that I never had to serve in combat. For every guy who was fixin' to go into combat, it was a tremendous relief. We knew it was going to be a tough battle because those guys in Japan would be defending their country, so yes,

it was a relief that it ended the way it did."

Steele still served for a time in Okinawa and South Korea before returning to his native Covington to join the National Guard for a total of 21 years.

"I was among the first 15 or so guys from Covington, Georgia to join," he said.

Steele said he intended to go to law school under the GI Bill, but something special changed his mind.

"I met and started going with a young lady that I had known before," he said. "So my plans changed quickly from college to marriage."

The youngest of 12 children, Steele went on to a prosperous 40-year career in the insurance agency and was also one of the founders of then-First National Bank of Newton County. He

enjoys retirement, but he said he absolutely laments the current condition of the nation.

"This country is so divided now, and it bothers me," Steele said while fighting back tears. "I love my country, and I just hate to see it so divided."

Steele said it's going to take leaders who want to accentuate the goodness of this nation to bring it back to a more civil place.

"We need some leaders who will actually commit to not fighting each other, and will talk about this goodness of this country and not just about the badness of this country," he said. "I don't think there's enough emphasis in public life and in schools about how good this country has been and is. I want to see that happen again."

Iraq War veteran finds place at Perimeter in Newton

COVINGTON, Ga.—Chris Colmenero fought in Fallujah, Iraq, as a U.S. Marine. He’s raced motorcycles in the desert and has run an 18-person motorcycle repair business in Anchorage, Alaska.

But his most daunting challenge? Going to college at age 35.

“It was nerve-racking—I hadn’t been in school for so long,” the Perimeter College student said.

Colmenero is a first-generation college student and hopes one day to become a mechanical engineer.

He’s one of more than 2,730 veterans and military-affiliated students at Georgia State who are served through the university’s six Military Outreach Centers.

There was no one in his family who went to college, so he didn’t quite know what to expect, Colmenero said.

“I grew up outside of the tiny town of Tulelake, Calif., population 300; it’s the horse-radish capital of the world,” he said, laughing. “There’s a huge sense of patriotism in our town, and so when 9/11 happened, a lot of us joined the military.”

Colmenero noted that out of 50 students in his high school graduating class, 10 enlisted in the armed forces. He was one of them, joining the Marines

in 2005. He followed in the footsteps of his brother, who joined in 2004.

Colmenero served as a U.S. Marine in Karmah and Fallujah, Iraq, fighting during U.S. troop surge in 2007, and meritoriously rising to the rank of corporal before he turned 21 years old.

After being honorably discharged in 2009, he operated a motorcycle repair business in Anchorage.

Although he was a

successful and accomplished mechanic, he knew there was more he could do.

“One of my customers pushed me to go to college to become a mechanical engineer,” Colmenero said.

He decided to follow that advice.

In 2021, Colmenero moved with his wife to Covington to be closer to her sister’s family after the couple had their first child. He then started looking for colleges nearby and

discovered Perimeter’s Newton Campus.

After was accepted, he contacted John Douglas, the military outreach advocate at the Newton Campus. The office provides assistance to all military and military-affiliated students on the campuses.

“John was always there to answer my emails and questions about the school, as well as help me with my VA benefits,” Colmenero said.

Starting college later in life has been busy, but the adjustments have not been as hard as he anticipated, Colmenero said. He is currently carrying 16 credit hours, with one class on the Dunwoody Campus.

“It’s easy to get around, and I like the mixture of people here—everybody is pretty friendly,” he said.

Colmenero notes that as the first in his family to go to college, he has

high aspirations.

“My parents did not graduate from high school, and I’m the first kid to graduate from high school in my family. (His brother received a GED.)

“I want to set the bar high for my daughter.”

Colmenero was recently named Student of the Month for November and will receive a \$1,000 scholarship from the veterans’ organization, VetBuds.

U.S. sent soldiers into battle in Vietnam decade after conflict began

The Vietnam War is among the most complex conflicts in world history. The war ended in 1975 when South Vietnam surrendered to North Vietnam, but the effects of the conflict continue to reverberate today, nearly half a century later.

In March 1965, American President Lyndon Johnson made the decision to send U.S. combat forces into battle in Vietnam. Ultimately more than 2.5 million American troops would serve in South Vietnam alone. Since President Barack Obama signed a proclamation in 2012, Americans have commemorated the sacrifices its military personnel made during the war by celebrating Vietnam Veterans Day on March 29 (the holiday would be signed into law in 2017). One way to let Vietnam veterans know those sacrifices have not been forgotten is to

learn about the war. Such knowledge can inspire a greater appreciation of the cost of the war on the service members who fought it.

• Though President Johnson ordered combat troops into Vietnam in 1965, the conflict between North and South Vietnam began much earlier than that. North Vietnamese fighters began helping South Vietnamese rebels in 1954, marking a start to the conflict.

• American involvement in combat began even before President Johnson sent troops to Vietnam in 1965. According to the U.S. Department of Defense, U.S. combat involvement is now recognized to have begun on January 12, 1962, which marks the launch of Operation Chopper. That operation required U.S. Army pilots to airlift more than 1,000 South Vietnamese soldiers to an area west of Saigon to capture a territory that was being held by

communist fighters.

• More than 58,000 American military personnel lost their lives as a result of the Vietnam War.

• Data from the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency indicates that, as of April 2021, 1,584 Americans lost in the Vietnam War remain unaccounted for. The vast majority of unaccounted military personnel were lost in Vietnam, though hundreds were lost while serving in Laos, Cambodia and China.

• The number of U.S. troops in Vietnam peaked in April 1969. By that point, the U.S. government had deployed 543,000 troops to Vietnam.

• The last American ground troops left Vietnam on March 29, 1973. Fighting between the North and South Vietnamese would continue for two more years, but the United States would not return to Vietnam.

Prime Video's 'The English' a parable on race, power and love in the Old West

A woman's quest to avenge her son's death launches her into an epic adventure across a violent 1890s landscape in a Western series coming to Prime Video.

In "The English," a six episode series premiering Friday, Nov. 11, Emily Blunt ("A Quiet Place") stars as Lady Cornelia Locke, a British aristocrat who arrives in a lawless Kansas town and crosses paths with Eli Whipp (Chaske Spencer, "The Twilight Saga" film series), a Pawnee ex-Cavalry scout about to be killed by a gang of local thugs. She bargains for his life and is almost killed but through a series of events both are freed.

He has a mission of his own – to claim land as a military veteran under Abraham Lincoln's Homestead Act but soon discovers that that doesn't mean much for Native Americans. So the pair head off for Hoxem, Wyo., on a quest to find the killer of Cornelia's son but encounter much more than they anticipated.

Filmed on location in Spain, the series from writer/director Hugo Blick ("The Honourable Woman," "Black Earth Rising") features lush photography and a solid cast that also includes Stephen Rea, Valerie Pachner, Rafe Spall and Thomas Trafford.

"I think revenge and identity are, at its core, the main themes," explains Blunt, who is also an executive producer. "You've got Cornelia's character, who is seeking a

blood revenge, and if she's able to carry that out then she sees a reclaiming of who she is. And you've got Eli Whipp, who's just seeking a land claim. It sounds simple, but that is his way of reclaiming his identity after leaving the U.S. Army and all the atonement of guilt he has to go through.

"But tonally, the story is told in this very intimate way that's funny, violent, but also epic. We haven't seen that for a while, something so epic and so beautiful with something that has modern intimacy to it."

Indeed, there is an intimate power in the performances of both lead actors, particularly Spencer, who brings a stillness to the role of Eli.

"It's a beast of a role," he says. "To me, I saw him as a modern-day biker, an ex-veteran. Someone who has seen war and been through tragedy. If Eli were alive today, he would be riding a Harley Davidson with a big beard and tattoos, and he probably would have met Cornelia at a truck stop.

"When I was reading through this, my imagination was going with that," he continues, "and I hope I can represent that in him, because I do see him as an ex-vet. He suffers from PTSD and loneliness, and throughout the story you see those walls start coming down – with both characters, Cornelia and Eli. That's what I wanted to bring to Eli, to make him as human as possible."

Angela Lansbury's long series run was 'Murder'

Q: I was deeply sorry to learn of the passing of Angela Lansbury. How long was "Murder, She Wrote" on? – Jean Clark, via email

A: The veteran actress, who came to series television after successes in movies and on Broadway, had a 12-year weekly run as mystery novelist Jessica Fletcher on CBS. She earned an Emmy nomination for each season of the show, which she followed with four TV-movie sequels.

As strongly identified with "Murder, She Wrote" as Lansbury became, it's interesting to note that it originally wasn't developed for her. It was intended for Jean Stapleton, who previously was "All in the Family's" Edith Bunker and ultimately decided not to play Jessica. An offer then was made to Lansbury, who had portrayed Agatha Christie's Miss Jane Marple in a movie a few years earlier ... and the rest is TV history. Several episodes of "Murder, She Wrote" are shown weekdays on Hallmark Movies & Mysteries.

Q: It seems like Joy Behar has been gone from "The View" quite a bit lately. Is she leaving the show? – Pamela Cramer, Kansas City, Mo.

A: In a word, no. In fact, she signed a new contract over the summer that will keep her on the program until at least 2025. As well as being a panelist on the show, Behar steps into the role of moderator whenever Whoopi Goldberg is off (which includes, usually, every Friday).

Behar took a little over a week off in October for an overseas vacation that coincided with her birthday, which "The View" celebrated when she returned – in part via recorded messages from such well-wishers as President and Jill Biden, and Bette Midler (whom Behar jokingly griped that she's frequently mistaken for when she's out and about).
