information from the alliance.

The Alliance also includes plasma companies Biotest, BPL, LFB, and Octapharma, along with additional industry members ADMA Biologics, BioPharma Plasma, GC Pharma, Liminal BioSciences, National Bioproducts Institute and Sanquin.

Takeda's Social Circle facility and CSL's Switzerland facility were two sites chosen to manufacture the medicine for the clinical trials that began Oct. 9, the website FiercePharma reported.

The National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), part of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), is sponsoring the trial.

It will evaluate if it is safe, tolerable and effective as a medicine for treating hospitalized adults at risk for serious complications of COVID-19 disease, officials said.

Japan-based Takeda acquired the facility in Stanton Springs as part of its purchase of original owner Shire in early 2019.

Soto said Takeda will continue to produce the hyperimmune globulin medicine so it will be prepared to produce it in large quantities in "weeks or months" if federal officials give their approval.

"We can scale up quickly," he said. "It's more difficult to scale down than to scale up."

The Alliance is asking recovered COVID-19 patients to donate plasma so it has enough quantity to produce the medicine if approved, Soto said.

The donation sites closest to Newton County are BioLife Plasma Services in McDonough on Plaza Parkway, and on Centerville Highway in Snellville. Both are accepting donations from recovered COVID-19 patients, according to the website thefightisinus.org.

Soto said the process the Alliance is using can produce a medicine that differs from the convalescent plasma used in transfusions to individual COVID-19 patients, officials said.

Typically, vaccines try to simulate a disease and prompt the recipient's body to create antibodies to fight it off. This medicine places the antibodies into the patient to fight off the disease.

The process is essentially the same one plasma sites like Takeda in Stanton Springs have used for decades to manufacture antibody therapies to treat people with immune system deficiencies, company spokesman Gabe Khoulis said.

There have been more than 218,000 deaths in the U.S. related to COVID-19 since the pandemic began, according to the CDC. More than 7,650 of those were Georgians.

As of Monday afternoon, there had been 94 deaths in Newton County.

Furniture.

"If you go by the building, you'll see a headstone that says Ginn Motor Company, 1928," Fortson said.

In 1946, Ginn added Oldsmobile to the company, Fortson said.

Fortson became the owner of Ginn Motor Company in 1987, after Ginn died. Fortson said he was able to purchase Ginn's company shares shortly after his death.

In the same year, Fortson said, Chevrolet encouraged him to relocate the dealership and build a new facility at its current location on 8153 Access Road in Covington.

Fortson later purchased the Chrysler franchise from the Harris family in 2007. After the sale was finalized, Fortson said he knew it would not be long before he'd need to relocate the Chrysler dealership, too.

"When I bought this franchise from the Harris family about 13 years ago, the building they were in was built in late '50s, so it had obviously lived its lifespan," he said of the old dealership location neighboring Piedmont Newton Hospital off U.S. Hwy. 278. "It's just not conducive for the marketplace today. I knew when I bought it, I'd have to pretty quickly relocate and get a new building."

But, Fortson's plans were put on the back burner once Chrysler filed for bankruptcy in 2009.

"There was a period of time when, No. 1, business was not good and, No. 2, didn't know if Chrysler was going to survive," he recalled. "But of course they did survive, and since bankruptcy Chrysler has flourished."

Now 11 years later, Fortson's plan to relocate and open a new Chrysler dealership have come to fruition, but it hasn't been smooth sailing.

Fortson said the relocation process first started about four

years ago. He said the location of the Chrysler dealership in Conyers hindered him from moving his Covington dealership west, but when it moved to Stonecrest, Fortson was able to get the wheels rolling on his own relocation.

The new facility on 2251 Access Road in Covington, just a mile or two away from his Chevrolet dealership, wasn't Fortson's first choice for the dealership's location.

"I had a location kind of in the industrial area that I had picked out ... but Chrysler didn't approve that property, so we didn't move there," he said.

Fortson said Chrysler has been in the driver seat for much of the relocation and building process. Other than a few things, such as the express lube and service area, Fortson said Chrysler controls what the facility looks like.

"I had to spend \$30,000 with the company they wanted me to deal with ... for a design intent document, which drove what the outside looked like," Fortson said. "People might ask me, 'What are they paying you to do this?' Nothing. 'Why?' I can't get the product without having what's deemed a compliant facility. That kind of drives the whole deal."

Fortson said that's the main reason why almost half the dealership is designated to Jeep.

"Going forward with Chrysler, or FCA, is they're going to put a lot of emphasis on Jeep," he said. "That's why you see Jeep with its own showroom ... To get Jeep, you have to have a complaint showroom ... if a dealership isn't compliant, they aren't going to get the product. So, that kind of determines the way the product is distributed."

Fortson said the dealership's construction took just over a year to complete. Fortunately, he said, the COVID-19 pandemic didn't cause any major delays.

Entering his 52nd year in the auto industry, Fortson said a lot has changed over the years, but none more than what came with the invention of the internet.

"It made it a whole lot more competitive and expanded the marketplace," he said.

Fortson said thanks to the internet, he's sold vehicles from California to New York and many other places between. But the key to the dealership's success is the support of Covington and all of Newton County.

"(The community), that's our backbone and always has been," Fortson said. "Without them, I wouldn't be here. That's kind of the essence of who we are."

baby was "a punishment to her," according to testimony at the hearing.

The child's biological father indicated he wanted to help raise the child but he told investigators White did not want him to do so, the prosecutor said.

However, there was no evidence White suffered from mental health issues, including post-partum depression, according to testimony.

Investigators believe she had tried to tamper with evidence because she hid a cell phone from them and asked her father to hold on to it, Dally said.

The prosecutor said White was a danger to the community because

of the nature of the crime she is accused of committing, and was a flight risk because the charge of felony murder had a minimum sentence of 30 years in prison.

White's attorney, Brian Steel, said her parents, Covington residents Ronnie White and Princess Williams, both said they were willing to guarantee a bond by putting up the value of their homes as collateral.

Steel said both parents would make sure White abided by the terms of the bond because of their financial exposure.

"They understand the gravity of the situation," he said.

Steel told Zon that White could have fled but did not do so during the period she was being investigated after the baby's death.

Ronnie White also testified he believed the phone the suspect asked him to hold contained information which could be used to pay her bills. He said he never turned on the phone's power before giving it to investigators.

The judge said she would wait on a letter from Steel detailing how either parent would enforce the conditions before she would rule if bond should be granted.

Zon said the bond would include a series

of conditions that she said would lead to an arrest warrant if violated by the suspect.

"I just want her under constant supervision," Zon said.

She said White would not be allowed access to any children under age 18, or adult men. She would not be allowed to have access to vehicles or any digital devices that connect to the internet or social media, Zon said.

"You can't pick up your dad's phone and you can't pick up your mom's phone," Zon said.

The parent living with White also would need to remove any firearms from the house, the judge said.

Kemp rolls out health insurance reforms — Washington approved

ATLANTA — Gov. Brian Kemp unveiled a “Georgia-centric” health-care reform plan Thursday based on newly won federal approval of two waivers to expand health-insurance coverage outside the provisions of the Affordable Care Act (ACA). Kemp joined Seema Verma, administrator of the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, in signing a waiver allowing Georgia to expand Medicaid coverage to adults with incomes up to 100 percent of the federal poverty level. Current law limits Medicaid eligibility in Georgia to low-income mothers and children, and to the aged, blind and disabled.

The other waiver, aimed at serving uninsured Georgians who make too much to qualify for Medicaid but too little to receive insurance premium subsidies through the ACA, is to be signed in the coming days.

Stating the problem, Kemp said Georgia suffers from one of the nation’s highest rates of uninsured, while insurance premiums are too high and there’s a lack of competition in the private health-insurance market. “This status quo is simply

unacceptable,” the governor said in announcing the plan at the Georgia Capitol. “It threatens our families and our state’s future.”

The General Assembly passed legislation last year authorizing Kemp to pursue the two waivers. The state hired Deloitte Consulting to help develop the waiver applications, which were submitted to CMS late last year.

The Medicaid waiver will make Georgians earning up to \$12,000 a year eligible to enroll in Medicaid or employer-sponsored health insurance if they spend at least 80 hours per month engaged in a “qualifying activity” Those include employment, on-the-job training, participating in job-readiness activities, vocational training, higher education or community service.

“We’re making health insurance accessible for those who need it most,” Kemp said.

The second waiver will replace the ACA’s healthcare.gov insurance enrollment website and let Georgians enroll directly with insurance carriers, local brokers or private sector web-broker sites.

Kemp said enrollment through the healthcare.gov portal has

declined by 22% since 2016. He blamed the site’s cumbersome nature for the decrease.

“Healthcare.gov has fundamentally failed Georgians,” Kemp said. “The enrollment process has been nothing short of disappointing.”

The second waiver will cover Georgians earning between \$12,000 and \$51,000 annually.

Many Democrats voted against the Medicaid waivers legislation last year, arguing Georgia should join the majority of states that have expanded Medicaid coverage under the ACA to those making up to 138% of the federal poverty level.

But Kemp said Thursday that would be too expensive. He said the \$218 million annual price tag of his Medicaid expansion plan is less than half what the state would pay under the Democrats’ proposal.

Verma praised Georgia for becoming the first state to take advantage of the unprecedented flexibility the Trump administration is offering through the health-insurance waiver process.

“We have delivered by getting Washington, D.C., out of your health care,” she said. “We have worked to empower states.”

District 5 commission candidates see need for in-house legal department, county unity

COVINGTON, Ga. — *The Covington News* asked the candidates for the District 5 seat on the Newton County Board of Commissioners the same three questions about issues they will face if elected in the Nov. 3 General Election.

The candidates include incumbent Commissioner Ronnie Cowan, a Republican, and Democratic challenger Dorothy Piedrahita.

District 5 includes northeastern and central Newton County, including part of the city of Covington.

COVINGTON NEWS: What do you believe will be the top county government issue that will most affect the majority of District 5 residents in 2021 and what is your stand on it?

DOROTHY PIEDRAHITA: The seminal government issue which will affect most District 5 residents in 2021 is COVID-19. The residents must have confidence in my leadership abilities. I have models which will speak to those abilities, and I’ve managed thousands of people in my lifetime.

In order to help tackle our local health crisis, together we must establish efficient strategies which will benefit those of us who call District 5 home. My stance is to follow the science and medical professionals in America and around the world.

My past, private, and professional life is a testament to how I manage issues from the smallest to the largest. I am strengthened and enthusiastic about becoming District 5 commissioner.

RONNIE COWAN:

The (Board of Commissioners) has had to deal with a number of critical government issues in the past four years. We have been successful in:

1. Getting the landfill in compliance with State (Environmental Protection Division) requirements;
2. Ending decades long litigation and eliminating additional expansion of the the landfill into the Spring Hill community;
3. Encouraging private trash pickup through contractors while keeping many convenience centers operational;
4. Securing the land purchased for the Bear Creek Reservoir by addressing repurchasing agreements in deeds and creating a wildlife management area on the site;
5. Eliminating ambulance subsidy to the hospital and increasing the number of new fire stations with EMS personnel;
6. Financed improvements at the water treatment facility;
7. Utilized citizen involvement in the development and implementation of a strategic plan for the County;
8. County code of ordinances is available online and in book format;
9. Economic growth with expansion of industry in Stanton Springs Industrial Park, including Takeda and Facebook.

These are just some of the accomplishments of the BOC in the past four years. However, we have asked our citizens to

contribute more in taxes. This was done though growth in the tax digest without increasing the millage rate. This has allowed Newton County to establish cash reserves and adequate fund balances to offset and loss of value in the digest.

We have also incurred additional debt through bonds. Accordingly, it is my opinion that the top government issue is that the county should focus attention on lowering its debt and not allow it to get out of hand. Just like your household, we should start making additional payments to get the county debt paid down. We are not over-extended, but we need to keep our debt low. As we keep our debt low, we can reduce interest payments and put that money back into operations and hopefully lower the taxes necessary to provide adequate government services.

COVINGTON NEWS: What do you believe will be the top short-term challenge the Board of Commissioners will face in the next six to 12 months and how do you feel it should be addressed at this point?

RONNIE COWAN: It’s time to create an in-house legal department and lower our legal bills. The BOC can do this for approximately \$500,000, which includes a county attorney, a (Solid Waste Authority) attorney, a paralegal and have effective legal representation for the BOC and the Solid Waste Authority.

Other constitutional offices can utilize the in-house legal departments. Appropriate cases can be turned over to liability insurance carriers under the “duty to defend” clause in our insurance contracts.

DOROTHY PIEDRAHITA: The short-term challenge should be to bring unity to a diverse county. Our county matters. I will stand for all citizens in Newton County.

Good roads are needed for successful economic development. If passed by voters, the proposed TSPLOST could generate up to \$56 million for transportation projects, including road expansion, in Newton County.

TSPLOST needs voters' attention

One item on the Nov. 3 ballot will do more than get someone voted into office for four years — it will benefit generations to come.



The county's Nov. 3 General and Special Election ballot includes a special election for a 1% sales tax reserved for transportation projects in Newton County and its six cities, and an \$18.9 million bond issue that will be used to start work on the projects.

Proceeds of the Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax for transportation projects, or T-SPLOST, could reach \$56 million over five years and will be shared between the county and six cities.

The special election is at the end of the ballot, below two proposed state constitutional amendments and a statewide referendum.

A good road system is needed for successful economic development in an area — or simply for not wasting half a day stuck in traffic backups while

traveling on overburdened thoroughfares.

The Covington-Newton County Chamber of Commerce has shown its support on its Facebook page and its website gocovington.com. A Facebook page maintained by a pro-2017 SPLOST group also has been a visible show of support.

State law prohibits government agencies from spending public money to support any political effort like a T-SPLOST referendum.

Newton County, like many others in 2012, overwhelmingly rejected plans for regional transportation projects in Georgia despite overwhelming evidence work was needed to improve our multi-county infrastructure.

Voters in 2012 seemed to say they wanted to concentrate on projects inside their own counties rather than other counties.

Eight years later, Newton County has this opportunity to raise \$56.1 million for transportation projects solely within Newton County.

A city-county sharing agreement for the money is based roughly on the population of each

entity.

The county government's share for projects in unincorporated Newton is projected to be about \$41.6 million and Covington will receive about \$10.3 million.

Covington's share will be allotted to general safety improvements, intersection improvements and paving.

A total of \$1.5 million would go to bridge construction and maintenance, including plans for a new pedestrian bridge on Emory Street over I-20; \$1 million would be set aside for implementation of the city's Airport Master Plan; \$1 million to public parking and infrastructure projects; and \$750,000 for sidewalks and paved trails.

Oxford will get \$1.6 million, Porterdale \$1.1 million, Mansfield \$800,000 and Newborn \$465,000 in funding for everything from sidewalks and bridge replacements to paving and safety improvements for pedestrians.

The county's share will be dominated by road expansions totaling \$17 million in unincorporated Newton — followed by intersection improvements, bridge replacement and repair, paving and resurfacing, transit and safety improvements.

Commissioners chose to leave the categories in general terms rather than naming specific projects which might be eligible for funding from other sources — a move some city leaders criticized because voters might prefer specifics.

However, the county's 2017 SPLOST committee also recommended commissioners use the money to pay for specific projects, like improvement of the dangerous and unsignalized inter-

section of Ga. Hwy. 36 and County Road 213, and a long-sought widening of Brown Bridge Road which will require more than a third of the county's share.

County Chairman Marcello Banes said this vote also would show the board of commissioners about the appetite for a limited intra-county transit system.

The system is envisioned to give those without vehicles easier access to shopping and services and their jobs within Newton County. A study of a transit system and its inclusion in an overall transportation plan was included in the county's Strategic Plan in 2018.

"What other way is there to see if the citizens want this?" Banes asked in a recent interview with The Covington News.

I've seen opposition coming from some anti-tax circles on social media. It's a fact this county already pays 7% in sales tax, though 4% of it goes to the state.

County residents, most recently, approved a 1% Education SPLOST in 2018 and renewed a 1% SPLOST in 2017.

There also is a 1% Local Option Sales Tax, which is used to give property tax relief.

Some planned improvements are badly needed to upgrade dangerous intersections not much improved since Newton was just another rural county on the road between Atlanta and Augusta.

When one fender bender during morning rush hour on I-20 can cause delays for thousands of Newton County commuters, one would think there'd be a huge appetite for any road improvements.

Repeat after me

I've been trying hard not to write about politics. We're two weeks from the presidential election, and it's almost impossible to escape. The birds outside my window are unusually chirpy, and I'm sure they're going at it over Trump's taxes or Biden's Supreme Court plans.



Eventually, one of those guys will lose. This will not go down easily. As Trump often reminds us, he never loses at anything, and is 1 for 1 in politics.

Biden has been running for something since 1970, and has won a Delaware county council race, seven US Senate elections, and two terms as Vice President. Neither Trump nor Biden has ever delivered a concession speech.

That in itself is a fine art. The best concession speeches are done with grace, humility, and respect.

Many years ago, in a small Southern town, a longtime mayor was upset in his bid for re-election. The mayor apparently believed he was destined to serve for life. When the results were announced, the winning candidate said all the right things. He thanked the outgoing mayor for his decades of service, and asked for unity.

Unfortunately, the loser was not so gracious. I was stunned when I read his brief "concession speech" in the newspaper. "Lord, please forgive the voters, for they know not what they do," he whined. The voters took note, and he never won another election.

I recall another election in which an incumbent county commissioner was facing opposition from a lesser-known "good ol' boy" who was well liked, but not well educated. Throughout the campaign, the incumbent would loudly criticize his opponent. "He can't even read," he told voters. "Why would anyone vote for a guy who can't read?" Apparently, that rubbed some folks the wrong way, and you guessed it, he lost. I'm not saying the newly elected commissioner was a poor winner, but he put this sign on his pickup truck: "READ THIS: YOU LOST!"

So what can we expect when the results are official (whatever that means) in 2020? Will we get a unifying victory speech and a gracious concession speech? Is it even possible to get both? Is that too much to ask?

I think back to some hard-fought presidential elections. Carter vs. Reagan in 1980.

Bush 41 vs. Clinton in 1992. Bush 43 vs. Gore in 2000. There were landslide wins, incumbents voted out, and one race that was so close, Congress and the Supreme Court had to sort it out over a number of weeks. But when it was time to declare a winner, we celebrated (or sulked) for a day or two, and we went back to watching football, raking leaves, and our other daily activities.

What's different this year? Everything. Let's start with social media. In 1980, and in 2000, I didn't know if my neighbor was a "lib" or a "rightie." That guy I used to work with when I was in my 20s? I didn't know who he voted for, or if he even voted. Furthermore, I didn't care. But now, we're Facebook "friends" and I can't avoid the political stench. What was once a fun website to see your out-of-town cousin's new baby, cute pets, or colorful garden is now as classy as a cockfighting ring.

Despite the fact that absolutely no one changes their mind after reading Aunt Esmerelda's political rants, that doesn't stop her. And we can't unfriend her. How will we know when her parakeet has a cold?

But since we cannot count on the candidates to be civil, we have to do it ourselves. If you would like to be among those who are part of the solution, not the problem, please take The Post-Election Pledge. Hats off, hand over your heart, repeat after me:

I will do so because if the president succeeds, we all succeed. I will ignore the angry voices who thrive on spreading fear and hatred. I will ask forgiveness, and I will forgive. I will lift up America, and I will encourage my family and friends to do the same."

Clip or print that paragraph, say it out loud to a witness, sign it and save it. Share it with others. Frame it, hang it on the wall. If we can't make this commitment, the noise and the division will only get worse.

Will most people take the pledge? Maybe not. But if you and I agree to make our world a better place, that's a start.

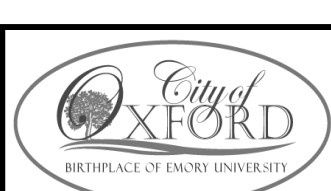

() NO
SHALL THE Constitution of Georgia be amended so as to authorize the General Assembly to dedicate revenues derived from fees or taxes to the public purpose for which such fees or taxes were intended?"

SUMMARY

THIS PROPOSAL authorizes the Georgia General Assembly by general law to require that fees or taxes collected for some specific intended public purpose be used as so intended. It requires any such general law to identify the specific public purpose, name the state agency to administer the funds, require the agency to make annual reports of revenues and expenses, and automatically end the fee or tax within ten years. It prohibits the General Assembly from designating funds when total revenues so dedicated equal or exceed one percent of the total state revenues based on the previous fiscal year's appropriated state revenues. It exempts such general laws from certain state constitutional restrictions. This PROPOSAL waives state and local sovereign immunity so as to allow citizens to sue the State of Georgia, its departments and other agencies, and its local governments in superior courts and authorizes superior courts to order state and local officers and employees to cease violations of the Georgia Constitution, the laws of the State of Georgia, or the United States Constitution, beginning with violations occurring on or after January 1, 2021. It requires that such suits be brought only against the State or Georgia, or in the case of a local government, against the specific local government. It requires superior courts to dismiss any such lawsuit that names any individual state or local public officer or employee as a defendant. It maintains the ability of superior courts to dismiss such suits based on other appropriate legal or equitable grounds or limitation on review in superior court. It prohibits any type of monetary award, including attorney's fees or costs of litigation, unless authorized by an Act of the Georgia General Assembly. It does not prohibit the General Assembly from further

THIS PROPOSAL waives state and local sovereign immunity so as to allow citizens to sue the State of Georgia, its departments and other agencies, and its local governments in superior courts and authorizes superior courts to order state and local officers and employees to cease violations of the Georgia Constitution, the laws of the State of Georgia, or the United States Constitution, beginning with violations occurring on or after January 1, 2021. It requires that such suits be brought only against the State or Georgia, or in the case of a local government, against the specific local government. It requires superior courts to dismiss any such lawsuit that names any individual state or local public officer or employee as a defendant. It maintains the ability of superior courts to dismiss such suits based on other appropriate legal or equitable grounds or limitation on review in superior court. It prohibits any type of monetary award, including attorney's fees or costs of litigation, unless authorized by an Act of the Georgia General Assembly. It does not prohibit the General Assembly from further

waiving certain other immunities provided for under Georgia's Constitution, though it does not waive any immunity provided for by the United States Constitution. It amends Article I, Section II, Paragraph V of the Georgia Constitution by rendering the current text subparagraph (a) and adding a new subparagraph (b).

PROPOSAL authorizes a new exemption from ad valorem taxes for all real property owned by a purely public charity, if such charity is exempt from federal taxation and such property is used only for building or repairing single-family homes to be financed by such charity to individuals using zero interest loans. It amends Code Section 48-5-41 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated by deleting "and" at the end of paragraph (14), by replacing the period with "; and" at the end of paragraph (15), and by adding a new paragraph.

APPROVED by a majority of the voters, the Act becomes effective on January 1, 2021, and applies to all tax years beginning on or after that date.

Eagles aim to torch Red Devils in bounce-back game

COVINGTON, Ga. — The new kids on the block almost took down the defending champions. Playing in their third Region 8-AAAAAA game, Eastside came just shy of knocking off Clarke Central on the road last Friday night. The Eagles showed no signs of being intimidated by the moment early on and carried a 24-14 lead over the Gladiators the reigning region title holders — into the locker room. But Clarke Central stormed back. The Gladiators pounded the rock on the ground, and completed a few timely pass plays over the top, to squeak out a 35-34 victory on homecoming night. The win allowed the Athens squad to retain its place as the top team in league standings.

“I’m proud of our kids for giving us a shot to win. Clarke Central just made a few more plays than we did,” Eastside head coach Troy Hoff said after the loss.

Hoff and his staff understand one of the essential keys to success is having a short memory. Consequently, after watching film and addressing areas in which they need to improve, the Eagles put the loss to bed and turned their attention to Week 8.

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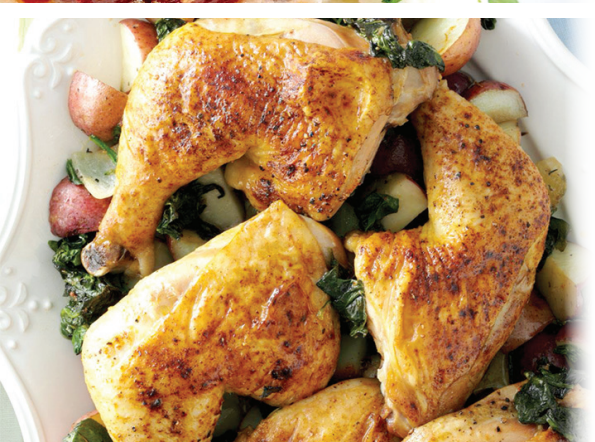
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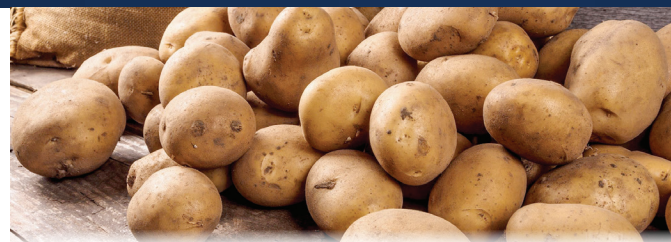
