### Murder suspects arrested in Newton

Authorities say 2 men wanted for separate incidents in Gwinnett, Mexico

COVINGTON, Ga. — Police say a man being held in the Newton County jail on charges related to a Sept. 19 stabbing incident in Covington is also a fugitive that Mexican authorities are seeking on a murder charge.

Emanuel Juanez, whom jail records say is 29 years old and resides on Collins Street,

is wanted for a murder in the city of Colonia Gonzalez Ortega in Zacatecas state in

central Mexico, said spokesman Capt. Ken Malcom of the Covington Police Depart-The suspect fled from

Mexico to Covington because he had family here, Malcom He said detectives with the

Covington Police received information recently from federal Immigration Customs and Enforcement (ICE) officials about the suspect's status.

Juanez was arrested after allegedly being involved in a fight Sept. 19 at a residence on Settlers Grove Road in Covington.

Officers responded to a report of an assault with a knife and found a man in the living room of the residence with

### Violent weekend Multiple drive-by

shootings reported; guard breaks leg trying to stop fight at hospital

COVINGTON, Ga. — Covington Police reported drive-by shootings and other violent acts at four separate locations in the city over the past weekend that shook up residents and left a hospital security guard injured.

A 26-year-old man was facing assault charges after a security guard reportedly broke his leg trying to subdue the suspect after he became confrontational with hospital staff at Piedmont Newton Hospital early Monday.

The man, identified as Master Perry, was charged with Aggravated Battery and Possession of Marijuana of less than 1 ounce following the incident which occurred Monday at about 1 a.m. at the hos-

pital in Covington. A report stated that hospital officials told the officer Perry came into the hospital Sunday about 11 p.m. and asked for blood to be taken for testing because "he wasn't feeling

After the suspect asked for more blood to be taken for testing, he "became increasingly agitated" and refused to go with a nurse

#### Commission extends ban on new requests for residential construction

COVINGTON, Ga. — County commissioners have voted to extend a ban on new residential rezoning requests and subdivision plans until mid-January while they make changes to what officials say are outdated development rules.

The county Board of Commissioners voted 4-1 to extend the moratorium to Jan. 18, 2022.

**Development Services** Director Judy Johnson told commissioners Sept. 21 the moratorium would "just prohibit new subdivisions being planned" and new requests for rezoning property for residential development.

Those wanting to purchase building permits for new residential construction can do so if the lot was already approved before the moratorium began in January of this year, she said.

"This does not affect current buildable lots," Johnson said. "People can still purchase building permits if the lot is already created."

It also does not affect plans or permits for new commercial or industrial development, she said.

Johnson has said the moratorium was needed for officials to make badly needed development ordinance changes in the wake of heavy demand for new residential construction in unincorporated Newton County.

She said some developers have taken advantage of rules that allow them to build houses on relatively small lots in some areas of a multi-use subdivision while not properly developing areas reserved for recreation in other parts of the same subdivision.

Commissioners also are considering Johnson's Sept. 14 recommendation of a new moratorium on acceptance of new residential building lots of less than two acres each.

Johnson said the planning staff was recommending the action so commissioners could make more sweeping changes to residential development standards before submitting a state-mandated Comprehensive Land Use Plan by 2023.

County planning officials have asked commissioners to consider the changes because of outdated regulations that allow no connectivity between adjacent neighborhoods.

She said lack of connecting roads was not a problem when west Newton County was not as densely populated in the early 1990s.

However, rapid population growth has combined with lack of connecting roads to create heavy traffic volumes on some main roads which generally only contain two lanes, Johnson said.

The land use plan is part of a required overall comprehensive plan that also must include such information as community goals, broadband availability and planned capital improvements.

State law requires local governments statewide to submit the document every five years to maintain qualified local government certification and remain eligible for some state funding and grants.

Also Tuesday, the board approved a variety of changes to the county's development ordinance.

Among the changes were some to effectively stop construction of truck stops in the three overlay zoning districts in unincorporated Newton County.

The Almon, Salem and Brick Store overlay districts add extra requirements for such items as building materials and setbacks from property lines on top of the base zoning requirements for residential, commercial and industrial zones.

Johnson said the change would not affect construction of "travel centers" such as Buc-ee's or the recently approved JP Center.

Such centers are designed for interstate highway travelers and families and do not have fueling facilities or overnight parking for commercial tractor-trailer drivers. Johnson said.

Commissioners voted for the change after recently approving a negotiated settlement of a lawsuit a developer filed after being denied a rezoning for a truck stop at I-20 and Georgia Hwy. 11 in east Newton.

to another room for the blood to be drawn.

After becoming confrontational with nurses, a security guard "physically escorted" the suspect, the report

"Mr. Perry struck the (guard) and placed him in a headlock. A second security guard ... tried to help his coworker and both guards struggled to detain Mr. Perry," the report stated.

One of the guards then tripped during the fight and broke his leg, after which Perry "realized what he had done" and "calmed down and took a seat."

After the officer arrived at the hospital, Perry "continuously talked around my questions" about what happened, he reported.

The officer then reportedly placed Perry in handcuffs "for the safety of everyone in the room" and the suspect "continued to deny his actions" before being placed in a patrol car for transport to the county jail.

Perry was being held in the Newton County **Detention Center after** being charged with Aggravated Battery and Possession of Marijuana of less than 1 ounce.

In a separate incident, officers responded to a report of a drive-by shooting at a residence in the area of Allen Drive and Morris Drive Sunday, Sept. 26, at 9:50 p.m.

"Several callers" contacted 911 operators about gunshots being fired from a vehicle which sped away from the area, a report stated.

A victim told officers he was working on a bicycle with his son in the driveway of his Allen Drive residence when a white Toyota Corolla with tinted windows drove by.

He said a man wearing a white hooded jacket and mask was in the front seat and began shooting at him and his son, the man told officers. Bullets struck a vehicle and the residence and the vehicle left towards Morris

Drive. No injuries were reported.

The same suspect may have been involved with other drive-by shootings in the area, the report stated.

Officers collected a total of 14 shell casings from a 9mm handgun from the roadway in front of the residence.

In another driveby shooting incident, Covington officers responded to a call about gunfire in the area of Puckett Street and Chaney Drive Saturday, Sept. 25, and found a residence had been struck but no one injured.

Officers responded to the call about 1:25 p.m.

and reported finding 9mm and 40-caliber shell casings in front of a residence on Puckett Street. However, there were no eyewitnesses, the report stated.

And in a separate incident involving a handgun, a Covington man was facing Aggravated Assault and weapons and drug charges after demanding money while waving a handgun around inside a residence on Haynes Court Friday, Sept. 24.

Victims and witnesses told police the suspect, identified as John Ward, waved the handgun in the air and demanded money before pointing it at one of the victims.

After officers searched the suspect and found a needle in his pocket, the suspect said he was a diabetic and used the needle for insulin. The officers then searched the suspect's vehicle and found suspected methamphetamine and other items designed to prepare the drug for use.

Ward was charged with Aggravated Assault, Possession of a Firearm by a convicted felon and during commission of a crime; and other crimes.

Officers collected evidence at the scene including a Glock .357-caliber magazine and 10 .357-caliber bullets.

several stab wounds to his side. The victim and his brother had been at the home and drinking when Juanez and another man arrived, a report stated.

Juanez and the victim "have had issues in the past" and started fighting in an outside area between two parked vehicles. The victim then noticed he had been stabbed, the report stated.

Juanez also was injured in the incident and both were transported to area hospitals, Malcom said.

The suspect was treated at an area hospital and released and taken to the Newton County jail Sept. 20,

while the victim was released recently from an area hospital.

Covington officers later learned Juanez was wanted in connection with the murder in Zacatecas, which has been the scene of numerous murders this year, according to news reports.

However, no details were given about the murder for which the suspect is charged.

Jail records stated Juanez was being held for federal Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) authorities. Officials with ICE did not immediately return an email for comment Monday.

# A day in the life of James Madison

was at a reception on a riverside screened-in patio somewhere in South Georgia,

a convivial,
countrified
place
that was
bedealed

decked with old pressed-metal advertising signs. Right next to a Coke-bottleshaped thermometer (in mint condition), I spied one of those old-timey, rusty-on-purpose-nailup-on-the-wall sayings that read:

What Part Of
"SHALL NOT BE
INFRINGED" Do You
Not Understand?

It looked to be the kind of souvenir you'd find at a roadside fireworks store.

I had been gazing at that wall-mounted *objet d'art* for a bit too long. My host sidled up to me and inquired, "So, what do you think of that?" He was asking it in a slightly baiting yet cheerful way.


Now, remember, he asked for my opinion. I said, "Well, that's the last four words of a twenty-seven-word sentence." (Uh-huh, nerdy that I know that.) He looked puzzled. I continued, "The whole thing is just one sentence. A confusing one, at that. That's one

of the reasons it gets debated so much. But if you hack off the first twenty-three words, you end up with a pretty compelling bumper sticker argument." I could tell I was messing with my host's patriotic dogma.

He said, "I just want my God-given right to my guns." Then he made an assumption. "You don't own a gun, do you?"

I told him that nobody is suggesting that he give up his guns. Then, I answered his question by telling him that my only firearm is a .410 shotgun that I use during mistletoe season. (All my hunting is vegetarian and ornamental.) My last rifle was a .22-long semi-automatic that I traded with my brother-in-law for a 1940s galvanized steel Coca-Cola ice chest – red with embossed white lettering, complete with a bottle opener on the end. I said, "It's a cooler that would fit handsomely on this very patio." I was attempting to change the subject; mayhap I could find détente through our shared appreciation of barbecue-joint decor and *The Pause that* Refreshes.®

As I lightly debated with my host – again, at his continued invitation – I had the maturity

to avoid the question: "What part of 'a well regulated militia' do you not understand?" (Georgia's current governor, in his 2018 political TV ads, took a literal chainsaw to regulations.) Indeed, it seems that the first four words of the Second Amendment can conflict with the last four.

James Madison, who in his own lifetime was known as the "Father of the Constitution," is credited with composing the *Bill of Rights*. He was a prolific political intellect and statesman who wrote and wrote and wrote. That's why it is curious that the Second Amendment is so short, clipped, and grammatically confusing, with a hazy if not completely unclear antecedent. (C'mon, English teachers; chime

Maybe on the day he wrote it, James Madison got in a hurry because he was hungry and having a sugar crash; he was often distracted by the aroma of his wife Dollie's baking. (Mrs. Madison, of course, went on to become a successful merchant of those delicious little pre-packaged cakes.) Maybe Mr. Madison, who was famously bashful, had been visited that day by his more bothersome colleagues, Anti-Federalists George Mason and Patrick Henry, who had arrived to pester and look over Madison's shoulder as he worked. Both men had refused to sign the Constitution of the United States because of its lack of freedoms granted to individuals over the power of the Federal Government. Indeed, much of what was included in the Bill of Rights came from George Mason's own drafting of the Virginia Constitution. Mr. Henry was in concurrence with Mr. Mason, but the hot-headed gentleman was particularly loud in the home of the shy Mr. Madison. It is fair to say that Patrick Henry did not possess what we would now call an "indoor voice."

The Republic, of course, was still in the throes of just being born and the Revolutionary War was fresh in the memory of its citizens. Local militias had contributed to fighting the British, and there were still Tories about, loyal to the British Crown.

It is important to note that early on, James Madison was against a standing army in times of peace.

This brings my thinking to our current age. I would wager that the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. Mark Milley, is familiar with the writings of this forward-thinking Founding Father. The General might have been thinking of James Madison as he found

himself taken down a garden path – as it were – crossing Lafayette Square on the way to St. John's Church with the President on June 1,

2020.
Gen. Milley might have been thinking of Madison's words when he made that phone call to China on Jan. 8, 2021, words that James Madison said at the Federal Convention in Philadelphia in 1787:

"A standing military force, with an overgrown Executive will not long be safe companions to liberty. The means of defense against foreign danger, have been always the instruments of tyranny at home."

And abroad.

### Ignore the calls from numbers you don't recognize

ince our last visit, I have been busier than usual. Life's parade includes events of joy, like a son's

wedding (exhilarating, but tiring). Life also throws

throws
you a
curve
ball, such as the funeral
for a beloved brotherin-law (COVID-19
strikes again). Mix in a
full-time job, a couple
of side gigs, and a rainy

of side gigs, and a rainy September encouraging lush green grass to grow, and I'm that dog chasing his tail, nonstop.

In the midst of it all,

I needed a long nap.
I left my cellphone in another room, safely out of earshot. My aching bones were quietly rejuvenating, and I was deep into dream land. Then it happened. The obnoxious ringing sound of my landline

Yes, I have yet to cut the cord on the old-timey telephone. My wife and I use our reliable cellphones 99% of the time. We have kept our landline phone for two reasons: first, because it is included in our "bundle" of cable TV and internet service;

and second, because our elderly relatives had memorized that phone number, and they preferred to contact us on a "real telephone."

Those loved ones have since passed on, yet ye olde landline phone still gathers dust on a corner table, like a long-neglected museum exhibit. Anyone under 25 would be flummoxed by the device, searching in vain for the camera button. Most of the time, it sits untouched, a relic of another era.

When we switched cable/telephone providers a few years ago, a new phone number was an unexpected benefit. We shared it only with our sons and a couple of close friends. We soon noticed that annoying robocalls had suddenly disappeared. Our new phone number had not yet reached the scammers, and the landline phone sat silently. But eventually, the crooks found us, and during my aforementioned nap, there was an unwelcome interruption.

I know what you're saying: "Ignore those calls, and they will go away!" That statement is accurate, and I have often given that advice myself. However, in the

midst of a deep sleep, I rushed to answer the phone.

It was some nice lady with "great news" about a free hotel stay. Why me? Why now? Didn't I just read a few days ago, that robocalls had been eradicated?

I sure did, and you may have too. Most states began enforcing "Anti-Robocall Principles" in 2019. Since then, they say 52 billion spam calls have been blocked. That is impressive, but they have a few billion left to go. And it's the next part of the report that has me scratching my head.

scratching my head.
So far this year,
almost 400,000 Americans have filed telemarketer complaints,
reporting a total of
\$356 million in losses.
"These numbers underscore the need to
continue to fight back
against the scourge of
robocalls," according
to Michigan Attorney
General Dana Nessel.

In that one sentence, we have learned why scammers are still in business: we send them our money. On "Green Acres," the lovable con man Mr. Haney would put a boat motor in a barrel and call it a washing machine, and sell it to a gullible law-

yer-turned-farmer.

Fifty years later, the Mr. Haneys are far more sophisticated, and even more successful. No matter how many times the Better Business Bureau warns us about holding our Social Security numbers close to our vest, and our credit card numbers closer, many of us hand over the contents of our wallet to a long distance bandit.

The con artists are taking advantage of today's technology. The calls are inexpensive, and easily programmed. They can contact millions of consumers daily. If only a handful of folks take the bait, the thieves cash in.

the thieves cash in.

A typical opening line is, "Don't hang up! Your chronic back pain could be a thing of the past!" My first impulse is to yell back, "Nope, I've got pain all right, but it's a few inches below my back, and you're causing it!"

While that rant should give me immediate relief, it actually causes more grief. The robocallers WANT me to respond. Whether I "press one to speak to a representative," or "press two to be

removed from our list," I have let them know my phone is being answered by a real person. That means the next time I'm watching the big game, my phone will likely ring again.

Blocking the num-

bers once seemed like a sure cure, but that doesn't seem to help. There's no surefire way to stop the calls, but the less human contact you have with these "bots," the better. If you're afraid you may be missing an important

call, consider this. People who really know you, or really need you, will leave a message. Otherwise, ignore the calls from numbers you don't recognize. Tell your family, friends, and neighbors: Don't answer. Don't feed the beast.

### Studies show turning grilled meats more than once a good idea

Many people are familiar with the conventional grilling wisdom that, when cooking meats, it's best to "only flip once." This has led backyard grillers to resist the urge to flip their foods in the name of flavor. But that conventional wisdom may not actually

According to J. Kenji Lopez-Alt, a Serious Eats blogger who has taken it upon himself to test the theory on both burgers and steaks, flipping the meat multiple times produced food that was more evenly cooked (40% less overcooked meat in a burger flipped every 15 seconds versus one flipped once). The meat browned just as well, and the food cooked in about twothirds of the time.

Serious Eats, which is dedicated to teaching proper food techniques and recipes to food

enthusiasts, indicates that some people claim that by flipping a steak or other grilled meats repeatedly, one ends up reducing the amount of browning that occurs, thus reducing flavor. This can be true in some instances, but it's normally due to moisture on thin, wet steaks rather than constant flipping. To avoid the scenario, choose thicker cuts (at least an inch thick), and be sure the surface of the meat has been dried sufficiently. You can dry steaks by wrapping them in paper towels and giving them a few hard presses; salting them 40 minutes in advance of cooking; or salting and letting them air-dry overnight in the refriger-

The theory is that with repeated flips, each surface of the meat is exposed to heat relatively evenly, with very little time for it to cool down as it faces upwards. The faster the flip, the closer one comes to imitating a cooking device that would sear the meat from both sides simultaneously.

For those grillers who are concerned about hash marks on their steaks, burgers and more, careful flipping in the same direction can help retain those marks. However, most foodies would say that evenly cooked, moist food is much more important than a cut of meat that looks pretty.

Those who flip their grilled foods often can rest assured that they are probably doing little damage to the taste of the meat and may actually be improving cooking times and doneness.

### Dazzle overnight guests at the breakfast table

Welcoming guests for overnight stays is a great way to make loved ones feel welcome. Overnight guests also get time to reconnect with their hosts, making such situations a win-win for all involved.

When hosting overnight guests, hosts can start their mornings off on the right foot by whipping up a special breakfast. Relaxing at the breakfast table over a homecooked meal can be a welcome departure from the sometimes hectic nature of weekday mornings, when families have to hurry off to school and work. The following recipe for "Poached Eggs, Asparagus and Chorizo" from Betty Rosbottom's "Sunday Brunch" (Chronicle Books) is a simple yet impressive morning entrée that's sure to please hosts and their overnight guests.

#### Poached Eggs, Asparagus and Chorizo

Serves 4 Ingredients: 1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil 1/2 cup coarse fresh

bread crumbs (see cooking tip) 4 ounces Spanish

chorizo, cut into 1/2inch cubes (use the Spanish-style chorizo in casing, not loose Mexican-style chorizo)

1 1/4 pound medium asparagus

Kosher salt 1 tablespoon unsalted butter, diced

2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice

2 to 3 tablespoons white or cider vinegar 4 eggs

Freshly ground black pepper Directions:

1. Heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil until hot in a medium, heavy frying pan set over medium heat. Add the bread crumbs and cook, tossing constantly, until golden and crisp, 3 to 4 minutes. Re-

move the crumbs to a plate. (Crumbs can be prepared 1 hour ahead; cover and leave at room temperature.)

2. Heat the remaining 1/2 tablespoon oil in the same frying pan set over medium heat. When hot, add the chorizo and stir until lightly browned, 3 minutes. Remove and set aside. (Chorizo can be prepared 1 hour ahead; leave at room temperature.)

3. Trim and discard 2 to 3 inches of the tough bases of the asparagus spears. Add the asparagus and 1 teaspoon salt to a large frying pan filled halfway with simmering water. Cook until the spears are just tender, 4 minutes. Drain and toss the asparagus in a large bowl with the butter and lemon juice. Season with salt and

cover with foil.

4. Bring a large frying pan filled halfway with water to a boil. Add the vinegar and gently break each egg into a saucer and slide it into the water. Swirl the water with a wooden spoon while the eggs are cooking. Cook until the eggs are just set but the yolks are still soft, 3 minutes Remove with a slotted spoon and drain well. (If you have an egg poacher, cook according to the manufacturer's directions until the eggs are set.)

5. Mound some asparagus spears on each of four dinner plates. Top each serving with a poached egg and sprinkle with the chorizo and bread crumbs. Season the eggs with several grinds of pepper and a pinch of salt and serve.

Cooking tip: To make bread crumbs, use a 1- to 2-day-old, good-quality peasant or country bread with crusts removed. Process large chunks of it in a food processor to make coarse crumbs. Sourdough bread works particularly well.




