MONROE, Ga. — Three Superior Court judges took their oaths of office Wednesday, Dec. 30, at the Walton County Historic Courthouse before beginning new terms on the Alcovy Judicial Circuit bench.

Chief Judge John Ott and Judge Ken Wynne will continue to preside over Superior Court cases in Newton and Walton counties after voters returned them to their judgeships without opposition June 9.

Jeffrey Foster, a veteran Walton County attorney, earned a first term on the Alcovy Superior Court bench after winning an August runoff election.

The Alcovy Judicial Circuit includes Newton and Walton counties.



### COVID-19: Global crisis hits home

Coronavirus. Quarantine. Social distancing.

At the start of 2020, these words were unfamiliar and rarely used, but as we step into 2021, these words have become regularly seen in headlines, articles and everyday use across the world.

The novel coronavirus, more commonly known as COVID-19, is a disease caused by a coronavirus called SARS-CoV-2. Initial reports stated it originated from a market in Wuhan, China, but the more scientists and researchers learn, the more

unclear its origin becomes. What has been made clear is the virus' impact worldwide.

COVID-19 made its arrival to the U.S. in late February, early March. As of Tuesday, Dec. 29, there had been more than 19 million cumulative cases in the U.S. — more than 82 million positive cases and more than 1.7 million deaths recorded around the world.

### Newton County goes blue on Election Day

The 2020 election year is when Newton County turned blue with a vengeance.

Newton County's electorate had hinted at the possibility in the past three presidential elections by giving very narrow majorities to Democrats Barack Obama and Hillary Clinton.

But Newton voters also had chosen to keep their county-level offices

mostly with Republicans with some exceptions, such as sheriff and county chairman, and they voted

in-person on machines. All that changed in 2020 as voters casting their ballots for Democrat Joe Biden appeared to also vote for anyone with a "D" by their name on the same ballots.

They also trended toward voting absentee by mail as the Secretary of State's office encouraged it as a safety precaution as the COVID-19 pandemic raged in April and May in Georgia.

Still, at least two-thirds of Newton County voters chose to cast their ballots

# Should it stay or should it go?

Newton's Confederate monument was center of controversy

The future of a century-old Confederate memorial statue was up in the air at year's end as groups for and against its removal from the Covington Square waited on the Georgia Court of Appeals to take action. It followed the

county governing board's July vote to remove it; two groups asking the courts the same month to halt its removal; a judge's October order that cleared the way for its removal; and appeals of the order to the state court of appeals. The Newton Coun-

ty Commission and community members had debated the proposed removal of the divisive "To the Confederate Dead of Newton County" statue for years be-

fore its 2020 action. After some neigh-

boring counties chose to raze similar Civil War memorials, Newton commissioners on July 7 publicly discussed the issue during a meeting and showed that a majority favored the Covington statue's removal.

Attendees of all ages met July 12 at the foot of the statue to raise funds for a legal challenge and discuss their opposition.

Commissioners voted 3-2 on July 14 to remove it from the county-owned park in the center of downtown Covington where it had stood since 1906.

Opponents met again July 19 and attendees charged that the board would be violating state law by removing the historic memorial.

Their legal challenges came a day before, and a few

days after, the commissioners' vote when a local resident and the Georgia chapter of the Sons of Confederate Veterans asked Newton County Superior Court to issue injunctions to halt the removal until hearings could be held.

A Newton County judge conducted a hearing and finally denied the requests in October. Both parties opposing the removal appealed the order and the cases now await action in the Georgia Court of Appeals.

The same judge also ordered county officials not to take action to remove it after rumors flew that the county government did not want to wait on the courts to act. The order forbade any action until all legal challenges were exhausted.

## Newton man faces child porn charges

Suspect was GSU Newton campus student government leader

COVINGTON, Ga. A Newton County resident facing charges of uploading child pornography had been a student government leader at Georgia State University's Newton campus and a candidate for Student Government Association president for its Atlanta campus before his early December arrest.

The Georgia Bureau of Investigation charged Carlos Porter, 21, with Sexual Exploitation of

Children (Possession of Child Sexual Abuse Material) in violation of

state law Dec. 8, a news release stated.

He was the Student Government Association executive vice president of GSU's Newton campus and was a candidate for SGA president for the Atlanta campus, according to a report in the university's student newspaper The Signal. Porter, who was a business major, re-

the newspaper reported. Before returning to GSU in the fall semester. Porter and other SGA officers attended a human trafficking and

Title IX workshop, it reported.

He joined the SGA in 2018 as a senator for Academic Affairs before becoming the speaker of the Newton campus in spring 2019, The Signal reported.

The suspect, whose address is listed as Conyers, was being held in the Newton County Jail without bond on one count of the felony charge in connection with allegedly uploading suspected child pornography, according to information from the GBI and Newton County Sheriff's Office.

The GBI's Child Exploitation and Computer Crimes (CEACC) Unit began an investigation into Porter's online activity after receiving a cybertip from

the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children regarding the upload of suspected child pornography by Porter using a "popular social media application," the release stated.

It stated a search of Porter's home and electronic devices produced evidence that led to his Dec. 8 arrest. Porter was taken into custody and booked into the

"This investigation is part of the ongoing effort by the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force, housed within the GBI's Child Exploitation and Computer Crimes Unit, to identify those involved in the child pornography trade," the release

"The ICAC Program, created by the U.S. Department of Justice, was developed in response to the increasing number of children and teenagers using the Internet, the proliferation of child pornography, and the heightened online activity by predators searching for unsupervised contact with underage victims."

# 4 Violent, unusual deaths top Newton's 2020 crime

Violent and unusual deaths and child trafficking arrests dominated the crime news in Newton County in

 Police in September arrested a woman after a body identified as her father was found in a **Newton County Boy** Scout camp the previous month. Human remains found Aug. 13 in a wooded area in Bert Adams Boy Scout Camp in southern Newton County were identified as Perry Davis, 72, of Kirk Street in Covington.

Covington Police arrested his daughter, Tamela Renee Carter, 48, of Covington, on Sept. 14 after she reportedly told investigators Davis had died in his bed in mid-April at the Kirk Street home they shared. Carter told investigators she had

taken her father to a wooded area off Scout Road in south Newton Count, placed his body there and continued to access Davis' Social Security funds for four months following his death, a spokesman said.

Meanwhile, a judge denied bond in December for a Newton County woman accused of murdering her mother in April 2019.

Carly Walden, 36, is charged with the murder of Andrea Walker, 57, of Covington after sheriff's deputies found her dead of a gunshot wound in a bedroom of the home they shared at 355 Alcovy Way

Walden was arraigned on charges of Malice Murder, Felony Murder, Aggravated Assault and Possession of a Firearm during the Commission of a Felony in August 2019 in Newton County Supe-

## 2020 brings upheaval to Alcovy Judicial Circuit

The Alcovy Circuit had been a model of stability but as with many aspects of life, 2020 changed every-

The year ends with two new judges — both historic choices by the governor — and a third new judge about to take office after a wild election. But jury trials have been suspended and other court functions are being held under strict guidelines

for social distancing. As 2020 dawned, it appeared all five **Superior Court seats** would be on the ballot.

It would be fairly neat. Judge Horace J. Johnson Jr., who in 2002 became the first Black judge in the circuit, said he would run for an open seat on the state Supreme Court. Cheveda McCamy of Covington, the chief assistant district attorney of the

Flint Circuit, planned to run for Johnson's seat.

Judge Samuel D. Ozburn, who like Johnson hailed from Newton County, said he wouldn't seek reelection and would retire at the end of the year. Lined up to seek his seat was District Attorney Layla H. Zon, also

of Covington. Also planning to retire was Judge Eugene M. Benton of Monroe, who has served since

2005. Although Covington attorney Bob Stansfield first said he would run for the Johnson seat, he decided to seek Benton's post, opposing Monroe attorney Jeff Foster.

But in late January, Ozburn said he would retire at the end of April. That meant, instead of an election, Gov. Brian Kemp would appoint Oz-

burn's successor. And later, Justice

Robert Benham also decided to retire early, and the Judicial Nominating Commission omitted Johnson from its list of finalists. So Johnson decided to run for reelection, prompting McCamy to instead oppose Foster and Stansfield for the Benton seat.

That race was to be decided in a May primary, which was delayed to June 9 due to the pandemic.

Foster led the field but couldn't avoid a runoff. Stansfield finished third in his home county but got just enough votes in Walton to make the runoff.

Although neither candidate won a precinct in the other candidate's county, Foster did better in Walton than Stansfield did in Newton. Foster got 52% of the overall vote and nearly 73% in Walton to claim the victory.

He was sworn in Wednesday and took office Friday.

Meanwhile, Kemp appointed Zon to the role of judge to succeed Ozburn, and appointed Ozburn as a senior judge. Zon became the first female Superior Court judge in the circuit.

Zon was seated June 2, and on July 1, Johnson died from cardiac arrest after having been diagnosed with COVID-19. Chief Judge John M. Ott also had been diagnosed with the illness.

Kemp chose Mc-Camy to succeed Johnson, making her the first Black woman to serve on the bench locally. She was seated Oct. 26.

Johnson would have been sworn in Wednesday to a fifth full term. He was reelected without opposition in June.

Also reelected without opposition were Ott and Judge Ken Wynne.

Zon's ascension to a judgeship caused a vacancy for district attorney. Her chief deputy, Randy Mc-Ginley, has served as interim district attorney and was elected to the position permanently in

November. He becomes the first Walton resident to serve as district attorney since Ott gave up the role to become a judge in 1990.

Foster is replacing Eugene Benton, who has served as an Alcovy Circuit Superior Court judge since his election in 2004 to replace Judge Marvin

The new judge served as judge of Social Circle Municipal Court and is a former Walton County associate Magistrate judge and Monroe Municipal Court judge.

Foster earned an undergraduate degree in economics from the University of Delaware in 1989, and his law degree from the University of Georgia School of Law in 1993.

He worked as a law clerk for Ott, and as chief assistant district attorney when Wynne served as DA, before opening his own law firm in 2004.

He was a partner in the Foster, Hanks and Ballard firm in Monroe before his election. Ott and Wynne were unop-

posed in the June 9 election. Then-Gov. Joe Frank Harris appointed Ott as a Superior Court judge in August 1990.

He has served as chief judge since 2005.

Ott was appointed after serving as district attorney in the

Alcovy Judicial Circuit from 1984 to 1990. He has served as the Admin-

istrative Judge for the 10th Judicial District and was on the **Executive Council of The** Superior Court Judges and the Judicial Council for the State of Georgia.

Ott also has served as the Superior Court Judge representative on the Interstate Commission for Adult Offender Supervision and the Advisory Committee for the Georgia

Department of Community Supervision.

He earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Georgia and his law degree from the Walter F. George

School of Law at Mercer Uni-Wynne has served as a Superior Court judge since July 1, 2010, after his December 2009

appointment by then-Gov. Sonny Perdue. He also served as district attorney for the Alcovy Circuit from 2001 to 2009 after working as an assistant DA for

Wynne established the Newton County Adult Felony Drug Court in 2013 and has presided over that court since its inception.

He is a former president of the Alcovy Bar Association, a past president of the Covington Kiwanis Club, and a 2003 graduate of Leadership Walton.

He is a past recipient of the State Bar of Georgia Younger Lawyers' Division Commitment to Justice Award. In 1990, the Georgia Department of Human Resources named him Georgia Child Support Attorney of the Year.

Wynne earned an undergraduate degree in political science from the University of Georgia in 1984, and his law degree from the University of Georgia School of Law in 1987.

# Nation's political eyes turn to Georgia

y this point even the most diehard follower of political campaigns has probably become

fed up with the two U.S. Senate runoffs in Georgia. Re-

four candidates along

with enough campaign mailers to create a nice

In reality, the two runoffs are very important in terms of balance of power in our country. With the Democrats regaining the White House, the Republicans hope to maintain conIf Ossoff and Warnock both win then the U.S. Senate count goes to a 50-50 split with a Democratic vice president set to break the tie.

Many Republicans have cried that one party having complete control would be bad for our country. That is a true statement. However, Republicans didn't seem to mind when they had control of the White House and the U.S. Senate the last four years. Surely no one can be surprised by this bit of hypocrisy that often comes from both of the major political parties.

The amount of money poured into these two U.S. Senate races boggles the mind. Millions upon millions have been spent with more monopoly-like cash to be used in the final days and hours before the Jan. 5 vote.

One long-time political observer in Georgia recently said, "Are these four the best we have to choose from? If so, help us all."

These are definitely

the four we have left. Even with 18 other candidates running against Loeffler and Warnock in a special "jungle primary," these were the two who floated to the top. Loeffler, it has to be pointed out, has done nothing since being appointed to the position by Gov. Brian Kemp.

Loeffler's biggest achievement seemingly has been to support everything President Trump does or says. It's not unexpected that a U.S. Senator would support the president from their own party, but to give blanket approval shows a lack of ability to think for one's self and a blind loyalty that is unwise and not needed.

If Loeffler defeats Warnock what will her legacy be moving forward? Will it be that she opposed everything President Biden does or says?

Recent polls actually show the two Democratic challengers leading but these races are going to be razor close.

Don't be surprised if the dreaded word "recount" comes into play once we wake up the morning of Jan. 6.

Perdue and Loeffler both have shown questionable behavior in using insider information for profit when it comes to the COVID-19 virus. While perhaps not technically illegal, it shows what they are willing to do for additional profit and that they have their own financial interests above those who are supposedly representing.

Warnock was the choice of state Democratic Party insiders. They wanted him as the nominee and went as far as to encourage other Democrats in the jungle primary to exit the race. None did but Warnock did emerge as the overall top vote getter last November among 20 names representing all political leanings.

Republicans seem to enjoy painting Ossoff with a very negative brush, even going as far to question the legitimacy of his marriage. You can't make this stuff up folks.

Ossoff has run a solid campaign but whether it will be enough to defeat Perdue remains to be seen.

The question about the Jan. 5 runoff is who will show up to vote. Many supporters of President Trump are still furious over the outcome of that election going as far to throw Georgia's Republican governor, lieutenant governor and secretary of state under the bus.

Some Trump backers in Georgia say the Jan. 5 runoff will be rigged, so why even bother voting? That mindset is absurd. If you don't want a particular candidate to win then not voting does nothing to help that goal.

Overlooked in Jan. 5 runoff is a very important contest for a spot on the Georgia Public Service Commission. The PSC is a group which most people couldn't tell you what it does and certainly couldn't

Yet the PSC has as much impact on our wallet as any elected office. Your power bill and your phone bill are just two of the ways. Yet often current members or challengers accept contributions from those working for or closely tied to utility companies. Ironically. while not illegal, it certainly should raise concerns about whose best interest someone on the PSC would have when they accept these contributions.

And as we (hopefully) close the book on the 2020 election next week, it should be noted that presidential hopefuls for 2024 are already starting to emerge. Here we go again.

# It's time we take a long look at the legal system

The law is a maw with abuse in its claws: ... Arthur C. Clarke once described us as "a nation

that beset our society. Indeed, jurisprudence

spawned by the Constitution fills thousands of volumes, presented in esoteric terms harking back to ancient Greek and Roman and English common law. The layman ensnared in its clutches is usually helpless.

So professional interpreters trained in its arcana unravel the mystery for the rest of

We depend on the

They would have it no other way.

Unfortunately this dependence has been exploited to the extreme, and in many places is a drag on everyday life and commerce.

Yet we need laws. "Laws are there to keep the good guys honest," an architect once told me. Arguably the rule of law enshrining freedom of expression is what has drawn millions of immigrants and refugees to our shores.

Of course, some would say it's the Benjamins — the prospect of acquiring and keeping more of those magic papers, enjoying property protections by law unknown in much of the world, where despots may take them

on a whim. Some truth in all of

Yet there are also existential truths evolving

these attractive features into a monster not easily tamed. Here are a few along with a short summary

of their abuses: There is real estate law: A monstrously complex vehicle for changing real property ownership. Lawyers preside over a transfer ceremony called a "closing," with a raft of documents of mysterious provenance — a process so recondite that exhaustion is a

completion. In fact, dependence on lawyers in such

common feeling upon

events is almost total. And there is patent/ copyright law: Designed to protect inventors and artists from exploitation — process evolved and refined

by very high-priced lawyers.

And there is criminal law: Thousands of prosecutors, defense attorneys and judges have dockets so clogged that plea bargaining is the norm. To proclaim innocence is frowned upon — they've got these dockets, you see — and thousands are given a Hobson's Choice: Accept a guilty plea, a fine and often only weeks in jail. Or go to trial and face years plus time in jail awaiting trial if bail money is not available. And law-

And there is tort law: Civil lawsuits, monetary penalties but no jail time. In our system, one may

yers' fees.

sue another for any reason. If spurious enough (a comment overheard disparaging one's attire, or suing an election board for fraud without corresponding evidence) the courts may reject them.

But the judge, and the plaintiffs and defense attorneys will be paid.

And the tort system is just as abusive in the other direction: Author John Grisham's excellent book,"The King of Torts" describes a subculture of class action legal firms that feed on slip-ups by large companies and pursue jury selection and attack ads in the most venal way. It's a work of fiction, but truth resonates on

its pages. And there is treaty law: Used to displace and disinherit Native Americans from the lands of their ancestors. A massive scale of ethnic cleansing. In every case the tribes were promised the law would protect them.

It didn't, and carpetbagging lawyers made killings throwing them off their land.

And there is the law of eminent domain: Created for states to seize land (with compensation) for roads, railroads, airports and other public interest works.

This system is also subject to abuse, with small businesses and landowners displaced in favor of malls, big box stores, and stadium parking lots.

increase in the tax base. Resistance manifests in civic meetings and

in the courts. It's often futile. Expensive legal talent can overwhelm it in mass filings and technicalities.

Of course, not all aspects of legal systems are bad. Most were created for more efficient functioning of society.

And it has its admirable proponents. My personal lawyer is a delightful guy, devoted family man and apparently resistant to the venality infesting his profession. He has given good advice on matters of will and property since we landed in Covington.

Is he an anomaly? Not sure. I have known lawyers of a different ilk whose meter always seemed to be running.

It's past time for us to address the legal system as a whole and consider remedies. America is a hodge-

podge of states, cities and counties with different takes on this issue.

Which is good. Different approaches can be tried, evaluated and distilled into useful, user-friendly systems.

And we can learn

from successful nations overseas. The Swiss canton system manages three very different cultures — French, German and Italian — under one orderly banner. The Swiss have lawyers, but their duties are subdued and inte-

grated. Norway has "a very successful criminal justice system with low prison rates and low recidivism" — per The

most citizen/lawyer

National Law Review. Local systems, where interface occurs, are as varied as the weather and often as dependable. By nature they are subordinate to state governments, so any attempt at reform must

originate there. Currently no classification system evaluates worldwide local governance using the same metrics. There are some obvious appeals: Town meetings, New England style, give anyone interested a chance to participate but don't work well for larger cities. Government by referendum has been extant in California for decades with mixed results.

Australia and Africa are as varied as the cultures therein. All have optimistic goals. Most — like those in the U.S — suffer from funding deficits relative to the services they are tasked with. If a local tax base cannot afford it, then infrastructure (roads, hospitals, schools, etc.) must come from the state, with equitable statewide distribution of funding.



Several states were forced to shut down,

some longer than others, and many remain under a shutdown and/or various restrictions today. Georgia Gov. Brian Kemp was among several states' leaders to institute COVID-19 guidelines and restrictions that included limiting restaurants and non-essential businesses and organizations to either close their doors altogether or adapt to COVID by limiting services.

Churches, civic groups and other organizations were forced to cancel in-person services and activities but then resorted to streaming meetings online. There was a brief shortage of food in

parts of the country, and there continues to be a shortage of cleaning supplies nationwide, which has led to reports of attempted price gouging.

Hospitals and health care workers were and are still being stretched thin in many parts of the the world. Many facilities were caught off guard as the number of cases soared over the early spring period, reaching their respective bed capacities and running out of PPE and ventilators, among other resources.

Millions of people were losing their jobs. Stocks were plummeting. Thousands of people were dying. And there was no cure. On March 27, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, which was a \$2.2 trillion economic stimulus bill, was signed into law by President Donald Trump in response to the economic fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic. This included specific aid for schools, businesses and families nationwide.

Later in May, the federal government-initiated Operation Warp Speed, a "public-private" partnership to facilitate and accelerate the "development, manufacturing, and distribution of COVID-19 vaccines, therapeutics, and diagnostics."

Despite struggles, Newton County residents and businesses remained resilient by finding ways to help support each other. For example, the city of Covington jumpstarted a grant program to aid small businesses.

In late August, early September, Newton County saw a surge of COVID-19 cases, which led to mask mandates and more event cancellations, including the city of Covington's annual Fourth of July fireworks celebration and annual holiday events in Porterdale and Oxford.

Newton County's high school football was even temporarily suspended due to an outbreak and games did not begin until early September.

Newton County Schools started the 2020-2021 school year virtually, which proved to be difficult. Thanks to diligence of the district's leaders and decrease in the virus' spread, schools were able to fully reopen for in-person instruction in October under specific COVID-19 guidelines. Sizable crowds were no longer allowed

thanks to COVID-19, meaning the Class of 2020's senior year was not only cut short, but graduation ceremonies were also scaled down. Funeral homes were sadly forced to abbreviate services and limit visitations.

After months of hard work by the world's top leading scientists, vaccines produced by Pfizer and Moderna were approved by the FDA in December and immediately distributed to be administered around the world.

Though the virus dominated the headlines in 2020, the story of COVID-19 isn't over yet as its impact will continue to be felt for months, and likely years, from

And a judge ordered that a Covington woman should be denied bond in October as the suspect awaited trial on charges she murdered her 5-month-old daughter.

Lakristy Jdeon White had requested that a bond be set to allow for her release from Newton County Jail where she had been held since Sept. 21 on charges of Felony Murder and Cruelty to Children following the death of Aryan White Sept. 13.

A medical examiner stated there was evidence of blunt force trauma to the child's head and torso, as well as other injuries that had healed, according to testimony at an Oct. 15 hearing.

• The Georgia State Patrol was investigating after three people were killed in September when their vehicle crashed and caught fire as they attempted to flee from pursuing Newton County sheriff's deputies.

The incident Sept. 7, at the intersection of Jack Neely and Fairview roads west of Covington began when sheriff's deputies responded to a call about two people attempting to enter automobiles in a neighborhood off Fairview Road, a spokeswoman said.

As the suspects' 2010 Toyota Tacoma was traveling north on Fairview Road, and being pursued by a marked sheriff's office patrol car with its siren and emergency lights activated, it attempted to negotiate a curve to the left and crashed, caught fire and trapped the three inside, a Georgia State Patrol spokesperson said.

• Two people were charged in Newton

County in August following a two-week operation in Atlanta and Macon to rescue endangered missing children.

Kirk Waters of Covington was arrested on a charge of Felon in Possession of a Firearm; and Trevonte Shareef was charged with Obstruction and Interference with Custody.

Waters and Shareef were arrested after a teen, who had been reported missing, was found hiding in a Rockdale County garage. U.S. Marshals told WSB-TV the girl had been trafficked for sex since she was 12 years old and she only knew the two suspects as her traffickers.

in-person despite the sudden popularity of the mail-in option.

Obama and Clinton had outpolled their Republican opponents by a few hundred votes in each of the 2008, 2012 and 2016 elections in Newton County.

This year, Newton voters gave the Democratic presidential candidate a 6,000-vote edge over the Republican.

It was the largest margin of victory for a presidential candidate in Newton County since Republican George W. Bush defeated Democrat John Kerry by 7,000 votes in 2004 — the last time county voters gave a majority to a GOP presidential candidate.

In the four years since the 2016 presidential election, Newton County added about 20,000 registered voters to its rolls — equating to a 35% increase — and a majority apparently were Democrats. In the 2016 primaries, about 9%

more Newton County voters participated in the Republican Primary than in the Democratic Primary. In 2020, roughly 50% more Newton voters participated in the Democratic Primary than in the GOP Primary.

As a result, any Democratic candidate in a contested race elected countywide in Newton County outpolled their Republican opponent. Democratic challenger Dorothea

Bailey-Butts defeated Republican incumbent Tommy Davis for the coroner position, and Democratic challenger Marcus Jordan ousted Republican incumbent Dana Darby from the tax commissioner position. **Incumbent Democratic Sheriff** 

Ezell Brown easily won re-election despite being outspent almost three to one by Republican challenger Ken Malcom.

Democrat Destiny Bryant won by a wide margin over Republican Randy McGinley in the district attorney's race, if only Newton County votes were counted.

McGinley, however, ultimately won the district attorney race because the winner must receive a majority of the votes cast in the two-county Alcovy Judicial Circuit, which includes Newton County and heavily Republican

Walton County. Clerk of Courts Linda Hays and Probate Judge Melanie Bell, both Republican incumbents, were unopposed by Democrats in their

countywide races. Republican incumbent county commissioners Stan Edwards in District 1 and Ronnie Cowan in District 5 won re-election over Democratic challengers but neither were seeking countywide offices.

Voters in northwest and west Newton also apparently wanted change and chose challenger Alana Sanders over three-term incumbent Nancy Schulz to fill the District 3 seat on the Newton County Board of Commissioners.





## Academic studies differ on impact of Trump tax cuts

ATLANTA — The tax cuts President Donald Trump steered through Congress in 2017 will save the average Georgia household more than \$39,000 over their lifetime, a new study has

But according to another broader study of tax cuts in multiple countries going back to 1965, tax cuts provide a huge windfall to big corporations and wealthy individuals without producing long-term economic growth or sustained business investment.

A study released this month by Boston University professor Laurence Kotlikoff to coincide with the third anniversary of the Trump tax cuts comes on the heels of an earlier study by the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta that estimated the gain for Georgia families at \$22,676 on average because of the impact of personal income tax reductions.

The new study, funded by the Goodman Institute for Public Policy Research, a free market think tank, includes the effect of reducing corporate taxes.

Lower corporate tax rates attract capital from abroad, raise wages and create greater economic expansion in Georgia and in other states, said John Goodman, the institute's president.

"We used to have one

of the highest corporate tax rates in the world," Goodman said. "High corporate taxes drive capital offshore and that's bad for American workers. With the lower rates we have now, we are more competitive."

The Goodman Institute study comes as President-elect Joe Biden prepares to roll back the Trump tax cuts benefitting the wealthiest Americans and businesses. However, the Democrat has vowed not to raise taxes on Americans earning less than \$400,000 a

Tax policy also has been issue during Georgia's two U.S. Senate runoff races, with Democratic challengers Jon Ossoff and Raphael Warnock opposing the Trump tax cuts and incumbent Republican Sens. David Perdue and Kelly Loeffler pledging to preserve them.

The Goodman Institute study shows that many Georgians would be better off in the short run if Biden's economic plan is adopted in full. That's because of Biden's proposal for a more generous child tax credit and more generous benefits for low-income seniors.

But Goodman said the Biden plan comes with long-term costs.

"When today's children become adults, their wages will be lower and the economy will be less prosperous because of

the way these benefits are funded," Goodman said.

The broader study, conducted by the London School of Economics, concluded tax cuts lead to greater income inequality but have no meaningful impact on unemployment or economic growth.

The study examined five decades of tax cuts in 18 wealthy nations from 1965 to 2015, including two Reagan-era tax cuts in 1981 and 1986, which dramatically reduced the top income-tax rate from 70% to 28%.

The study found that tax cuts promote income inequality. The share of national income flowing to the top 1% increased

by about 0.8%. While employment and economic growth fluctuated slightly following major tax cuts, the report found the impact statistically indistinguishable

from zero. The study's authors, David Hope and Julian Limberg, concluded that the momentum behind enacting tax cuts comes from the power of wealthy corporations and individuals to set public policy agendas.

"There is a large political science literature on the power of rich voters and organized business interests to shape public policies in their favor," Hope and Limberg wrote.

• Work in public service. A Public Service Loan Forgiveness program, or PLSF, enables student loan forgiveness in exchange for working for a nonprofit or working in government.

 Refinance the loans. Graduates may not be aware that they can refinance their student loans at a lower rate or choose new loan terms, including variable or fixed rates. Maturity dates can even be renegotiated in certain instances. It's possible to save thousands of dollars in interest by refinancing, particularly if borrowers have a

credit score of at least 650. • Make more than the minimum payment. Financial advisor Dave Ramsey says making the minimum payments on student loans will not get them paid off fast, and the interest could pile up as well. By paying more than the minimum payments, you can pay down the principal more quickly. Designate tax refunds and salary increases to pay down student loan debt.

 Ask for help. Speak with your boss about whether he or she can help pay off student loans. Some employers offer conditional student loan repayment to employees.
