### Rivian rolls with Stanton Springs North, officially announces plan to build EV plant

Historic \$5 billion investment to bring 7,500 jobs to Morgan, Newton, Walton

ATLANTA — One of the industrial recruiters who helped lure electric vehicle maker Rivian to the Social Circle area believes the 2,000-acre site's "unique attributes" and "abundant" electric resources helped sell it to the company.

Rivian Inc. announced Thursday it will build its second U.S. production facility and create up to 7,500 jobs in the yet-undeveloped Stanton Springs North business park at the intersection of U.S. Hwy. 278 and I-20.

Serra Hall is one of two chief industrial recruiters for the Joint Development Authority of Jasper, Morgan, Newton and Walton Counties (JDA), which

### City workers travel to Kentucky, provide aid in storm relief effort

COVINGTON, Ga.

- Eight utility workers from the city of Covington hit the road to Kentucky this week to aid in power restoration efforts after violent storms swept across the region.

The Bluegrass State was among many states in the Midwest and South that were ravaged by tornadoes on Friday. As of Wednesday, at least 88 people were reportedly killed in the storms — at least 74 deaths were reported in Kentucky alone. More than 100 individuals were still missing, Kentucky Gov. Andy Beshear said.

To help with recovery efforts and speed up the

## 14-year-old in custody after online threat toward Eastside

COVINGTON, Ga. — A 14-year-old was taken into custody Thursday in connection with terroristic threats made against students and staff at Eastside High School two days earlier, a Newton County Sheriff's Office spokesperson said.

The boy, who an Atlanta TV news station identified as a Newton County student, was charged with one count each of Disrupting Public School and Terroristic Threats and Acts, both felonies, spokesperson Caitlin Jett said.

Local law enforcement agencies increased their presence at the school Wednesday, Dec. 15, in response to the threat, said Newton County School

System spokesperson Sherri Partee.

School administrators were made aware Tuesday, Dec. 14, of the social media post "that was a cause for concern," Partee said.

A reader sent The Covington News an image of a social media post that included a photo of a handgun and a warning not to go to Eastside High School Wednesday.

He said he forwarded the post to Eastside Principal

Jeff Cher and told Cher students were sharing the post on phones throughout the school. Jett said, "Sheriff Ezell

Brown and the Newton County Sheriff's Office take every terroristic threat made against students and staff of the Newton County School System very seriously."

"Unfortunately, this is today's world, and the Sheriff's Office will make every effort to ensure the safety

of all students and staff."

She said Brown "urges all parents to speak to their children about the dangers of making these types of threats before a situation arises."

School officials nationwide have become more attuned to threats in recent years after shootings on school grounds increased as firearms became more prevalent in society.

## Six ruled guilty of crimes during November jury trials

COVINGTON, Ga. — District Attorney Randy McGinley said six defendants either pleaded guilty or juries found them guilty of crimes in Newton County Superior Court in November.

De'andre Smith and Ladonna Bostic both pleaded guilty to Kidnapping, two counts of Armed Robbery, Hijacking a Motor Vehicle and numerous other counts based on an incident in September 2019 at multiple locations including the Wells Fargo bank on Georgia Hwy 142.

Smith received a sentence of 40 years with the first 14 years in prison while Bostic was sen-

#### State Senate panel takes up nonpartisan school board elections

Making school board elections in Georgia nonpartisan would help reduce the divisiveness that has roiled school districts in the pandemic era, a series of speakers primarily from Gwinnett County told state lawmakers Friday.

A Georgia Senate study committee is considering whether to support legislation to require school districts statewide to make school board elections nonpartisan.

More than 100 of Georgia's 180 elected school boards are already nonpartisan, and a bill introduced in the Senate during the recent special session would switch the Gwinnett County Board of Education from a partisan to a nonpartisan board.

The Gwinnett parents who testified at the state Capitol Friday complained that the local board has become more partisan since the last election, when the board shifted from entirely Republican to majority Democrat.

Quarrels over mask mandates and curriculum have taken attention away from quality education, said Michael Rudnick, a North Gwinnett parent.

"Our school system has been hijacked by politics. It's very divisive," he said. "If we can take partisanship out of it, we could be more focused on success for our children."

Two of those who testified Friday were arrested at a Gwinnett school board meeting last month at a security screening area outside the board chambers.

Brenda Stewart of Suwanee described herself as a fully vaccinated moderate who opposes mask mandates based on her research as a nurse.

"I think the pandemic is part of it," she said. "The partisanship is not helping. ... We are not coming together."

Angela Palm, director of policy and legislative services for the Georgia Schools Boards Association, said her organization has long supported making school board

elections nonpartisan.

"Children are not Democrats or Republicans," she said. "They're children there to get an education."

But Cecily Harsch-Kinnane, policy and outreach director for the group Public **Education Matters and** a former Atlanta Board of Education member, questioned imposing nonpartisan elections statewide. She said local school boards already have the legal right to switch from partisan to nonpartisan if they choose.

The study committee will hold a second meeting next Thursday at Gwinnett Technical College in Lawrencev-

#### **State unemployment** rate hits new low

Georgia's unemployment rate dropped to another record low last month, while the state's all-time high workforce is larger than it was before the coronavirus pandemic.

The state's unemployment rate fell to 2.8% in November, well below the national jobless rate of 4.2%, the Georgia Department of Labor reported Thursday. At the same time, more than 5 million Georgians held jobs.

"We have fully recov ered from this pandemic when it comes to employed Georgians," Georgia Commissioner of Labor Mark Butler said. "The hard work is still in front of us as job creation is outpacing new workers in the

labor force." Jobs in Georgia were up 13,500 over the month and are up 4.4% over the year to more than 4.6 million. During the last six months, the number of jobs has increased by

130,600. "We have regained almost all of the jobs we lost during the pandemic," Butler said. "However, the number of job seekers is still below pre-pandemic numbers.

"Creating more jobs becomes very difficult if we can't fill vacancies in the 300,000 jobs that are currently open. It's a good problem to

have and shows how strong Georgia's recovery has been, especially compared to other states our size."

Job sectors with the most over-the-month job gains included transportation and warehousing, which gained 4,300 jobs; non-durable goods manufacturing, which was up 2,300 jobs; and accommodation and food services, which gained 2,200 jobs in November after being decimated during the pandemic.

First-time unemployment claims declined last month by 10,116 to 17,194, a 37% decrease and the first time since November 2019 that initial claims fell below the 20,000 plateau.

More than 190,000 job openings are posted at EmployGeorgia.com, the labor department's website.

#### **Water Coalition issues** annual Dirty Dozen report

From a proposed titanium mine near the Okefenokee Swamp to carpet mills in Northwest Georgia, the Georgia Water Coalition's annual Dirty Dozen report highlights threats to waterways across the

Rather than identifying the most polluted places in Georgia, the 2021 report released Tuesday points to projects and policies that threaten the future health of Georgia's waters and the Georgians who depend on them

for their wellbeing. Five of this year's Dirty Dozen are making return appearances on the list, including the problem of coal ash disposal.

Georgia Power is in the process of closing all 29 of its ash ponds

at 11 coal-burning power plants across the state. While the Atlanta-based utility will remove the ash from 19 of those ponds, ash is being left in place in the other 10 ponds, prompting complaints from environmental groups.

Alabama-based Twin Pines Mineral is seeking permits to mine titanium dioxide at a site three miles from the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge, the largest black water swamp in North America. Opponents fear the mine could damage adjacent wetlands and permanently affect the hydrology of the entire 438,000-acre swamp.

In Coastal Georgia, the 30-year-old Hercules Landfill Superfund site in Brunswick still leaches toxins into groundwater. The 2019 Golden Ray shipwreck has finally been cleared from St. Simons Sound, but the extent of damage to the coast still must be evaluated.

In Middle Georgia, a proposed plastics rendering plant near Macon touted as a solution to plastics pollution is really part of the problem, the report says. Critics say the project would generate more greenhouse gases through the production, transformation and ultimate burning of fos sil-fuel-based plastics.

Along the Chattahoochee River system, West Point Lake and Lake Harding are plagued by algal blooms caused by excessive nutrients.

Jet fuel and sewage spills repeatedly foul the portion of the Upper Flint River that flows beneath Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport, causing fish kills.

#### Georgia Supreme **Court upholds** judicial appointment

The Georgia Supreme Court Tuesday upheld a lower court decision denying a challenge to Gov. Brian Kemp's appointment of former state Sen. Jesse Stone to a judgeship in Au-

Kemp appointed Stone to a Superior Court judgeship in the Augusta Judicial Circuit last February, one year after the resignation of former Judge Michael Annis.

Lawyer Maureen Floyd filed a petition last March in Burke County challenging

the validity of the appointment, and Stone submitted a motion to dismiss it.

The trial court sided with Stone, rejecting Floyd's argument that the appointment was illegal because it was not made "promptly" as required by the Georgia Constitution. The court also noted that Floyd failed to cite any authority supporting her conclusion that removal from office was a proper remedy.

Tuesday's Supreme Court opinion noted that Floyd's contention of a promptness requirement relied on a provision in the constitution that pertains to the executive branch of state government rather than the judicial branch.

The opinion also noted that removing Stone would simply have created another vacancy, further prolonging the length of time the office was vacant.

The decision also noted that Floyd did not contend that Stone was in any way personally ineligible to hold the

# Rivian's potential impact immeasurable

f there was any debate that the place we call home is special, Rivian settled it.

you've likely read, state officials



nia-based electric vehicle startup company would invest \$5 billion in a truck manufacturing plant at Stanton Springs North at a 2,000-acre megasite located just off I-20.

Gov. Brian Kemp called it the largest single economic development project in Georgia history. And it's all happening right here - at home.

The manufacturing plant will bring 7,500 jobs to the area, but think about what type of impact this development will have beyond Rivian. Think about the jobs that will be created to construct the facility. Think about the domino affect in how parts suppliers and manufacturers for these vehicles will likely locate to the surrounding area and create even more jobs. Think about the impact this will have on area utility companies and the revenue that will be generated through this. Think about the opportunities this creates for our area's youth.

## St. Simon's preservation important to all Georgians

Then I go to my Great Reward (hoping it is not before I finish

column). if I don't qualify for the Pearly Gates, I will take St.

Simons Island as my backup choice. It is, after all, heaven on earth. And, thankfully, there are people trying to keep it that way.

Emily Ellison, executive director of the St. Simons Land Trust, tells me her organization is in the middle of a campaign to raise \$5.5 million to preserve the few undeveloped acres still available on the island. Called The Canopy Campaign, the group has a goal of raising \$5.5 million and is off to a good start. A small group of conservation-minded supporters have pledged another \$3 million to jumpstart the effort.

Ellison says, "We are using these gifts and pledges as a challenge. Every contribution made to the campaign will be matched dollar-for-dollar up to the \$3 million.

Contributions can be mailed to PO Box 24615, St. Simons Island, GA 31522, or

made online at sslt.org. If you don't live on St. Simons, why should you care about the campaign? Well, for one thing, every inch of the Great State of Georgia is sacred soil to me and none more so than our coastline. To quote Woody Guthrie, this land is our land and we are blessed that a part of our land is the Golden Isles.

"The Georgia coast has become the most popular vacation destination not only for people living in the state but also in the region," Ellison says. "Surveys show that one of the top reasons people visit St. Simons is because of its natural beauty, the live oaks, the moss-shrouded maritime forests, the marshes, the streams and beaches" Amen to that.

Ellison adds, "The properties that the Land Trust has conserved over the past 20 years, and the ones that we are continuing to acquire, provide the greenspaces, the hiking trails, the environmental features that mean so much to people throughout the state.'

In 2018, the Land Trust launched Phase I of The Canopy Campaign. With a \$4 million challenge grant from The Anschutz Foundation, more than \$8 million was raised in less than three months. That successful campaign resulted in the protection of nearly 200 acres of environmentally and culturally

mid-island properties. This time, the campaign is focused on three properties on the north end of St.

land and two important

Simons, contiguous with 608-acre Cannon's Point Preserve, creating nearly 730 acres that will be protected in perpetuity. Another nearly 40-acre tract is between Cannon's Point and the 258-acre Guale Preserve that the Land Trust completed purchasing in 2018.

The three parcels closest to Cannon's Point have been in the same family for a number of years and were once part of the Oatland Plantation. Most recently the nearly 120 acres were privately owned. "It is from the heirs that we are buying the properties," Ellison says. "Another nearly 38-acre tract has been owned by a Texas company. Their intent was to sell to a developer. More than 100 homes could have been built on this tract." Just what we need. More traffic.

Ellison says, "One of our goals in this campaign is to provide funds for the long-term management of the more than 1,100 acres in our trust. This is one of our most important

strategic priorities."

As for the future, Ellison says there is still some undeveloped land left on St. Simons Island, "but there isn't much of it." The only other large parcels of undeveloped land on the north end of the island are owned by a family whose members reside on the property. They have a 10-year conservation easement on their land, which provides at least temporary assurance it will

Georgia is one of the fastest-growing states in the country. The current population stands at some 10 million and people keep coming. According to the state's own projections, that number could rise to almost 15 million by the end of this decade. I guess that's because it doesn't snow 10 months a year here and all our buildings aren't

not be developed.

rusted. Whatever the reason, it is important that while we deal with matters of quantity, we not forget the quality of life that makes our state so special. That includes preserving the natural beauty and the fragile ecosystem of St. Simons Island. My thanks to the St. Simons Land Trust for their unstinting efforts to protect and to keep holy my heaven on earth.



In stark irony given her own sense of feeling unloved, Lucy helps him see that his list could be much less ambitious and more reasonable.

Like so many of us as we approach a new year, Charlie Brown wants to know what he should do. Lucy is contemplating this question too when she dreams up her New Year's Eve party. This same question shows up for Christians as we prepare for Christmas.

Christians are currently in the season

of Advent when we wait and prepare for the coming of Christ. One of the prominent figures in Advent scripture texts is John the Baptist who is often mistaken for the messiah. Instead, John was sent to prepare the way and the crowds for Jesus and his ministry.

In the third chapter of the gospel of Luke, crowds were coming to be baptized by John. But he rebuked them and told them they should bear fruit worthy of repentance. To get clarity on this, they asked him, "What should we do?" The crowds, tax collectors, soldiers – all asked him this question, and he told them, respectively:

Share your clothing and food; collect no more than you are authorized; and don't cheat or harass anyone (author's paraphrase).

Tis the season for switching over the calendar to a new year. Many of us will

make resolutions for 2022. At the very least, most of us will spend a moment thinking back to all that was done and left undone in 2021 – and to the promise that 2022 holds. The question before us is: What should we do?

Lucy's obsession with being loved at her party gets in the way with too many rules and guidelines for her guests, and it all falls apart. When Charlie Brown finds out this was all about her feeling unloved, he organizes a post-midnight celebration with her friends who had abandoned the party. She's overwhelmed

by his generosity but

mostly by his friend-

Linus reveals Lucy's feelings to Charlie Brown in a touching scene where he unpacks the old New Year's hymn, "For Auld Lang Syne." He tells Charlie Brown the song has deep meaning, "Should auld acquaintance be forgot and never brought to mind." As one year turns into the next, he says, "Auld Lang Syne" is our reminder that we should never forget our friends. Hopefully they will remember us too.

Linus inspires once again in a Christmas episode, and Charlie Brown responds to the question "What should we do?" by gathering them all together and reminding Lucy that she is enough just as she is. She is loved.

After a rousing rendition of "Auld Lang Syne," the episode ends with Lucy shoving a piece of paper and pencil in front of Charlie Brown. "Here, write this down - 'Be a good friend'." Charlie Brown writes it down and Lucy demands he then cross it off. So, he

Newton County was formed on Dec. 24, 1821, from parts of Henry, Jasper and Walton counties. It was named for Revolutionary War hero Sgt. John Newton.

Event organizers said the birthday bash was open to the public with no cost of admission.

Among the festivities, county government officials will present the 2021 Bicentennial Awards. The awards were designed to "commemorate and recognize the work and legacy of local residents and Newton County businesses who reflect a high level of integrity, character, ethics, longevity in service and community commitment," a news release stated. 

# Legacy of Newton's 'Jump Shot' Jaynes lives on

life, which lasted for 68 years from Sept. 1, 1945- Feb. 10, 2014, Jaynes took on a lot of roles to help make a difference not just in Newton County, but around the world.

The biggest impact, one could say, remains within Jaynes' family.

Her great niece, Grace Folds is a multisport athlete at Walnut Grove High School. Recently, she wrote a letter, as part of a class assignment, to Representative Jody Hice. The issue dealt with in Folds' letter was "blurring the lines between genders."

In the letter, Folds specifically mentioned her "Aunt B" as an advocate for Title IX to provide equal opportunities for both genders.

For Folds, her aunt was the main source of motivation to write the letter when given the assignment.

"She was a dynamic woman that did so much to support and promote female athletes," Folds said.

Jaynes' roots ran deep in Newton County.

Being a Covington native, Jaynes attended Newton County High School in the early 1960s. Lettering all four years, she was a member of the girls basketball team where she was the Lady Rams' primary and

leading rebounder.

During her playing career, she was named to the girls All-Tournament team in 1962 and 1963 for the Newton County Invitational. She also received back-to-back All-State honors the same two seasons.

Her efforts contributed to Newton County qualifying for the Class AA State Title game in her senior season when the Lady Rams finished

Jaynes' skill set on the court led her to adopt the nickname "Jump Shot."

After graduating high school, Jaynes went on to attend and graduate from Georgia College in 1967 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. A year later, in 1968, "Jump Shot" earned her Masters of Science degree also in physical education from the Uni-

versity of North Carolina-Greensboro.

From there, Jaynes entered the coaching circuit going to Madison College (now known as James Madison) in 1968 and, later, became the head coach of Duke's women's basketball team where she served from 1970-1982.

In addition to her coaching career, Jaynes participated in extracurricular activities to help advance women's sports. She chaired the U.S.

Girls' and Women's Basketball Rules Committee from 1979-1981. She was the tournament director for the first-ever championship game sellout in the modern era of women's college basketball - the 1975 AIAW Large College National Basketball Championships.

A year prior to exiting the coaching world,

Jaynes began another journey she considered of more importance. She was named the Women's Basketball Coaches Association first ever executive director in 1981. In 1996, Jaynes became the CEO of the association.

By the time Jaynes retired in Nov. 2001, membership stood at over 3,000 members compared to 212 members in its year of inception.

Jaynes' nephew, Jack Moss highlighted his aunt's main source of motivation for putting forth so much effort and energy into her

"She wanted to help people,"Moss said. "If she wasn't able to help you, then she would find someone who could. That was just the type of person she was.'

### Newton County home world's first rural telephone system mong Newton

County's many "firsts" is the rural telephone line, run in 1897, which so far as is known, preceded any other rural telephone service, private or otherwise.

The line was constructed in the fall of 1897 by G. Claude and H. B. Adams, between their homes, a distance of 300 yards, in Brickstore Community and gave perfect service.

Soon, the line was extended from H.B. Adams' home to that of their mother, Mrs. William Adams, some 11 miles distant; and served (11) other Adams families along the

In 1898, the line was extended to the home of Dr. R. L. Hollis, at Hayston, who was the family physician of those on the "line."

This immediate connection with a doctor was a splendid advantage in time of sickness, not only to those on the line, but throughout the Brickstore and Hayston communities; for it was freely shared with all the neighbors.

These phones had no room for batteries within the unit; so they were installed on the back of the wall to which phones were attached.

With the added phones, service some-

times was spasmodic, especially in bad weather, to which these early instruments were highly allergic. In fact, owners are said to have predicted the weather a day or so ahead by the sound of the elements on the wire.

They were especially sensitive to lightening; and each phone had a built in receptacle in which to insert a lightning plug before each thunderstorm. Negligence in taking this precaution resulted in three homes begin struck by lightning and subsequent fires. Fortunately, no serious damage was sustained.

An interesting fact re-

called was the suspicion surrounding this wire, suspended through the trees, and how much of their conversation might be carried to

listening ears. [Black people] were especially wary of this strange innovation and changed their footpath from anywhere near its route, for fear someone might hear their conversations.

The line when completed ran through more than 10 homes, specifically between the Adams and Lunsford families. It was used until 1906, when several of the users moved away.

It was necessary to keep a close vigil on the line, for necessary repairs, including replacement of broken bottle necks, which were used as insulators: and the clearing of any limbs or brush touching the wire, as this usually disrupted service.

As WBCA executive director, she volunteered her time to serve on various national boards such as the Center for the Study of Sport in Society National Advisory Committee; the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame Board of Directors, Board of Trustees, Executive Committee and Women's Screening Committee; the USA Basketball Board of Directors; the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame Board of Directors; and the Women's Sports Foundation Board of Trustees.

basketball warranted several awards and recognitions. To name a few,

Jaynes received the 1991 National Association for Girls and Women in Sport Award, the 1995 National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Honors Award, the 1997 Women's Sports Foundation President's Award and the 2012 **National Association** of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators Lifetime Achievement Award.

Jaynes was inducted into a few Hall of Fames during her life, too.

In 2000, she was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame. Six years later, she became a member of the NACDA Hall of Fame. Also in 2006, the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame awarded Jaynes with the highest honor it can present to an individual without inducting them.

A year later in 2007, the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame inducted Jaynes. Virginia followed in 2008 inducting Jaynes.

Most of Jaynes' impact was during a time when women weren't respected and didn't

have much of a voice. But that didn't deter her from speaking up.

Now, 58 years later, her presence is still felt among all who knew her, but especially her niece.

Folds still adheres to a lot of advice Jaynes gave her as a child. And that is how Jaynes' legacy continues on for the next generation of women athletes.

"I deeply wished for the opportunity to talk to my Aunt B," Folds said. "She instilled in me that it is my job to stand up and speak for those that can't speak."

tenced to 30 years with 10 in prison. These were the last two defendants in what was a five-defendant case. The case was prosecuted by Deputy Chief Assistant District Attorney Jillian Hall.

The Sept. 23, 2019, incident occurred after a male victim met with a female that he had spoken with on a dating app.

When the victim arrived at the location to meet the female, "several males came from behind the residence and got into his car with a gun," according to the report. The males demanded money from the victim, but he told them he would have to get money from an ATM.

"The males forced the victim into the back of his own car, and they drove him to Wells Fargo in Covington," according to a release from Covington Police Department. "One of the males took the victim's debit card from him and withdrew money from his account."

The victim attempted to take the gun from one of the males and, during the attempt, a shot was fired, accord-

ing to a news release. In a separate case the week of Nov. 15, a jury was selected in the case of Charles Thomas Williams but, before opening statements, Williams pleaded guilty to two counts of Robbery by Force connected to an incident at a Dollar General store on U.S. Hwy. 278 in December 2018.

He was sentenced to 15 years with the first 10 years in prison as a recidivist, meaning because of his criminal history he will not be eligible for parole, McGinley said.

The case was prosecuted by Senior Assistant District Attorney Robby King, Assistant District Attorney Eliazette Johnson, Investigator Joshua Duke, Victim Services Director Leslie Smith, and Legal Assistant Desiree Kozikowski. The arrest and investigation was handled by the Covington Police Department.

During the week of Nov. 8, a jury found Doylmarrian Hardeman guilty of Possession of Cocaine with Intent to Distribute, Possession of Marijuana with Intent to Distribute, two counts of Possession of a Firearm During Commission of a Felony, felony Fleeing a Police Officer, Driving on a Suspended License, Obstruction of an Officer, and Possession of a Firearm by a Convicted Felon.

Hardeman was sentenced the following week to a total sentence of 40 years with the first 15 years in prison.

"This sentence took into account both the facts and circumstances of the trial case but also Hardeman's criminal history," McGinley said.

The case was prosecuted by Assistant District Attorney Hunter McCreight, Investigator Colin Cunningham, and the teamwork of Legal Assistants Cindi Hendrix, Sheila Cornelius and Danielle Miller.

The Georgia State Patrol and the Covington Police Department handled the arrest, McGinley said.

Numerous other cases were resolved prior to those November trials "due to the hard work of the office," McGinley said.

He said just a few of note included:

• After filing a demand for a speedy jury trial, Dorian Moragne pleaded guilty to Aggravated Assault based on an unprovoked, blindside punch of the victim at Susie's Wings on Salem Road in June 2020.

He was sentenced to 15 years with three to serve in prison. The case was prosecuted by Senior Assistant District Attorney Alex

 Kevin Brown pleaded guilty to Aggravated Battery, Family Violence. He was sentenced to 15 years with the first three in prison. The case was prosecuted by Senior Assistant **District Attorney Bailey** Wilkinson.

manages Rivian's future site. She said Stanton Springs 'just had unique attributes, and I think, one, [is] geographically being close to Atlanta is a huge driver."

"The ability to have the workforce that's right here in Atlanta and the university systems is really a key driver," she said.

"Not only that, but Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport is very close," she said. "The one thing, though, is that we're not as close to the ports, but at the same time, we have an amazing rail system of CSX that really brings that in.

"So, I think that we're vastly different. I think we're unique, and that site is a phenomenal site for a unique user, just like Rivian is unique to us."

During a ceremony Thursday at the State Capitol in Atlanta, Gov. Brian Kemp said Rivian will invest \$5 billion in the facility — making it the single-largest economic development project in state history.

"This single investment

the largest in state history

— represents the future of automotive manufacturing and establishes the leading role the Peach State will play in this booming industry for generations to come," Kemp said.

JDA Chairman Jerry Silvio, a Newton County resident, told the crowd at Thursday's ceremony it was "the project of the century."

"Stanton Springs and the great state of Georgia are the perfect place for this adventure to begin," Silvio said. He thanked Rivian Chief

People Officer Helen Russell for "another opportunity" — in reference to companies that located in Stanton Springs South in recent years. **Stanton Springs South** 

includes original tenant Takeda, a pharmaceutical production and research company; Facebook, which will operate data centers there; and an as-yet unnamed company designated with the name Baymare.

Silvio said the JDA began in 1999 "with the goal of

creating high-tech, regional-focused jobs for generations to come," he said.

JDA's "dynamic duo" economic development directors, Hall and Shane Short of Walton County, and Authority attorney Andrea Gray had a "dedication and steadfast focus" that ensured "this vision is met and exceeded," Silvio said.

Russell said the company wants the facility be environmentally friendly.

She also said the company was looking for the "best possible talent." Open job postings in Georgia will be immediately available at www.rivian.com/careers, she Construction is expected to

begin in summer 2022 and the start of production is slated for 2024, a news release stated.

Once manufacturing operations are fully ramped up, the Georgia facility will be capable of producing up to 400,000 vehicles per year, officials said.

#### REACTION Newton County Chairman

Marcello Banes said Thursday's announcement was "an amazing day" for Newton County and the four-county region.

"This is going to have such an impact, from jobs to when they get ramped up," said Banes, who is a member of the JDA.

"Not only that but even the process of building this it's going to be amazing," he said. "The infrastructure it's going to bring, it's going to change Stanton Springs forever.

"This is amazing. You got this to go along with Facebook ... we're blessed in our community, so we're just thankful to Rivian for choosing our community."

He added the county and development authority were "looking forward to a couple more announcements" in the future

"So, we're just excited," Banes said.

Much of the site is within the city of Social Circle, and Mayor David Keener said he was "excited about it."

"I'm glad today has

come," Keener said. "We've kind of been living under the rumor mill for a while now. People don't understand that a big property like this, you can't just discuss it. Most of the elected officials involved were under non-disclosure

agreements. "There have been suspicions for a long time. But I'm glad it's official today. We can move forward and talk about the good things.'

Keener said he anticipated the new plant's workers would bring more students to the city's school district – which already had planned to build a new facility.

"I think they're prepared ... for the growth," he said. "There are good days ahead of us."

District 112 State Rep. Dave Belton, a Morgan County resident whose district includes the Rivian site, said he had "hoped to bring jobs to Morgan and Newton counties" when he was elected in 2014.

"We're doing that," he

excited about this."

She said she was "ecstatic" about Rivian choosing the Stanton Springs North site.

"This is a company that I'm thrilled with and I know for generations to come will be amazing for our community and the state of Georgia — I can't say enough," she said.

"It really adds to the ecosystem of amazing, stellar companies coming to Georgia. We're really proud of this and I think it fits in nicely with our other (companies) here in Stanton Springs," Hall said. "It really is incredible."

Hall said she was contacted earlier this year about the company possibly locating in the Stanton Springs area. She admitted officials

did not know the magnitude of the project when first contacted.

"We did not have an understanding of the project," Hall said.

She said the site was well-planned with utilities already available, which helped sell Rivian on the location.

"We can't say enough about Mike Hopkins and the Newton County Water & Sewerage Authority team because they really have made a lot of things happen and made it unique for any kind of prospect."

However, she said nothing has been finalized about which utility providers would serve

the Rivian facility. The JDA is still working to secure agreements with providers for the site "but we hope for the same structure that is within Stanton Springs South,"

Keener said he hoped Social Circle would be chosen for some or all of the services needed for the facility, including fire, police and

utilities. Hall said officials have not determined if Rivian will take all available land in the

park. "At this time, we're still working on site

layout," she said. She said there was a possibility ancillary businesses, such as parts suppliers, could

Hall said she anticipates "some community town halls coming soon in the new year" about the facility. "I think we'll see

a lot of community activism already come out, so we're excited to announce this today to get that ball rolling," she said.

"And that's one of the reasons why we felt it was such a strong company to come into the

community," she said. "It was their focus on our local communities and what they've been able to do in the past, and so that's critical and I think it's going to be really good, and a lot of stuff will come into the new year, and so we're excited to see that."

Belton said he was glad the facility will "be very environmentally friendly."

"They're going to do things the right way and we're going to be very proud of this facility,"

Belton said.


He said Takeda Pharmaceuticals has operated in Stanton Springs South for years and created 2,500 jobs without "a huge disruption to life around Morgan and Newton counties."

"So, it's really up to the local leaders to make sure that we do the zoning correctly and build the way we want our community to look, and as long as they do that we'll be fine," Belton said.

"This is good growth," he said. "And these people [Rivian] they want good growth, too ... I guarantee they want it to be a good partnership as much as

we do." Georgia Quick Start will build and operate a state-of-the-art manufacturing training center that will provide Rivian with a fully customized training program that meets the company's start-up needs, state

officials said. "This will also build capacity and curricula within the Technical College System of Georgia to maintain a long-term pipeline of highly skilled employees who are trained specifically in these operations," they said.

But it didn't stop there for Williams.


In addition to her performance on the mound, Williams had a .432 batting average, .500 on base percentage, one home run, 20 RBI and tallied 14 runs.

the field and line on his way to a 12-point fourth quarter to ice the game and keep the Redskins undefeated.


Even so, Redskins head coach Taylor Jackson believes the best is yet to come for this year's team.
