Morning Hornet takes ownership of second \$42B data center project

Facebook operated under same legal identity in similar 2018 deal at Stanton Springs

STANTON SPRINGS, Ga. — An unnamed industry operating as Morning Hornet LLC has taken ownership of the \$42 billion data center project previously held by another undisclosed industry working as Baymare LLC.

Now, Morning Hornet becomes "owner of both data center projects," said attorney Andrea Gray, who represents the Joint Development Authority (JDA) of Jasper, Morgan, Newton and Walton Counties. Morning

Hornet was the legal identity that Facebook (now Meta) operated under in a similar data center deal in 2018.

Documents obtained by The Covington News through an open records request to the JDA confirmed that Baymare assigned its interest in the data center project to Morning Hornet on Dec. 1.

Why Baymare relinquished ownership to Morning Hornet is unknown. So, too, is the identity of the industry (or industries) represented by Baymare and Morning

SOCIAL CIRCLE, Ga. — Nathalie Dupree remembers the details of her Newton County experience seemingly like it was yesterday — even though it was half a century ago.

The nationally famous cookbook author and originator of the new Southern cooking movement perfected her technique in the Brick Store community where she opened and operated a restaurant inside a business called Mt. Pleasant Village in the early 1970s.

Dupree spoke by phone from Raleigh, North Carolina, where she now lives with husband Jack Bass. She was planning a Christmas Day dinner just for the two of them featuring Manchester Farms quail from South Carolina.

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Newton reports 4th-highest COVID rate in Georgia

COVINGTON, Ga. Newton County reported the fourth highest COVID-19 case rate among the state's 159 counties Wednesday, Dec. 23, as the

COVID-19 Omicron variant's rapid spread spiked cases just before the holidays.

State health records showed Newton recorded 465 cases per 100,000 population in the two-week period since Dec. 8, which was more than triple the number (125) reported in the previous twoweek period Nov. 24 to Dec. 8.

The number placed Newton behind only Chattahoochee, Fulton and Rockdale counties in the case rate within each county's total populations in the past two weeks, according to the Georgia Department of Public Health's latest report Wednesday.

Newton's rate also was well above the statewide average of 276 per 100,000 population for the same time period.

It also was higher than more densely populated counties such as DeKalb, Gwinnett, Cobb and Forsyth.

Chattahoochee County is home to the Fort Benning Army base and historically has shown a higher rate throughout much of the pandemic than the rest of Georgia's counties. It reported 716 cases per

100,000.

Fulton County had 504 cases and Rockdale 492, both per 100,000.

The number showed cases per 100,000 residents in the county during the previous two weeks using latest population counts, the Department of Public Health reported.

The latest Georgia Department of Public Health report also showed:

- Newton County reported a daily count of 17 COVID-19 cases Dec. 3. The daily count doubled to 37 on Dec. 16 and doubled again to 75 on Wednesday, Dec. 22.
- Those living in the 30055 zip code in eastern Newton County had the highest rate of incidence of the disease.
- The seven-county

region of Georgia that includes Newton had 82% of its hospitals' ICU beds in use (1,002) out of a total of 1,220, or 82%; and 90% of all in-patient hospital beds (4,732) out of 5,248 in the region. Dr. Norris Little,

chief medical officer for Piedmont Newton Hospital, stressed the importance of getting vaccinated against the disease.

"While the vaccines can't entirely prevent people from contracting COVID-19, they do an excellent job of preventing hospitalization and death," he wrote in an op-ed distributed to the county's media outlets.

He said preventing hospitalization for COVID-19 was "vitally important."

"According to early reports, the Omicron variant may not cause as severe illness in many, however, it will cause severe illness (including death) in some, especially the unvaccinated.

"It also appears to be the most contagious of all of the variants," Little said. "That means that the number of people expected to be hospitalized could put enormous pressure on our hospital, and the nation's healthcare system, both of which are already stressed.

"We need to keep hospitals beds open and staff available for non-COVID urgent and emergent medical needs, as well as some much-needed elective procedures," he wrote.



'Georgia giant' Isakson dies at 76 Former U.S. Sen. Johnny Isakson died Sunday, Dec. 19, at the age of 76, his family and the foundation he started to raise money for Parkinson's disease announced.

The Republican from Cobb County retired from the Senate at end of 2019 due to Parkinson's and other health issues, the only Georgian to have served in both chambers of Congress and the General Assembly.

"We are grateful for everyone's prayers as we mourn the loss of our father," said Isakson's oldest son, John Isakson.

Isakson was elected to the Senate in 2004 after serving five years in the U.S. House, where he succeeded former House Speaker Newt Gingrich.

Before that, he was chairman of the Georgia Board of Education, appointed by then-Gov. Roy Barnes,

The owner of a real estate business, Isakson was elected to the Georgia House of Representatives in 1976, where he served as minority leader, and was instrumental in building the state's Republican

Isakson went on to serve in the Georgia Senate after an unsuc cessful bid for governor in 1990. He made another run at the Governor's Mansion in 1996 but came up short in the Republican primary.

In an era of increasing partisanship in Washington, Isakson was known for reaching across the aisle to work with Democrats. He played a leading role in the No Child Left Behind education reform legislation in 2001 while a member of the House and improved the law during his time

in the Senate. Also in the Senate, Isakson as chairman of the Veterans Affairs Committee worked to better the lot of the nation's veterans, championing legislation to improve health care and other benefits for

vant leader dedicated to making his state and country better than he found it," Gov. Brian Kemp said Sunday.

Georgia schools adding EV career pathway after Rivian

announcement The state Department of Education is responding to last week's announcement that a major electric vehicle manufacturing plant will be built in Georgia by creating an EV career pathway.

The department's Career, Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) staff will work

with industry representatives and educators to develop courses to prepare students for careers in the electric vehicle industry.

The curriculum will include EV-specific coursework along with instruction in engineering, manufacturing, drafting/design, and automotive technology.

"As educators, it is our responsibility to prepare students for successful futures, so it's essential that we mount a rapid response to emerging workforce needs within the state of Georgia," State School Superintendent Richard Woods said.

"The development of a new Electric Vehicle Career Pathway will continue to expand the career pipeline."

Gov. Brian Kemp announced last week that EV startup Rivian will invest \$5 billion in a manufacturing plant off Interstate 20 east of Atlanta that will create 7,500 jobs. He called it the largest economic development project in Georgia history.

CTAE Director Barbara Wall said in addition to creating the EV career pathway in Georgia high schools, the department is considering ways to provide early exposure to the careers Rivian offers to elementary and middle school students.

The new career pathway is expected to pay dividends particularly in the school systems closest to the planned Rivian plant: Jasper, Morgan, Newton and Walton counties and the Social Circle City School District.

Georgia growth outstrips most states in slow-growing nation

While only four states have grown more than Georgia since the release of the 2020 U.S. Census, the Peach State's population increase came as the nation's population grew at the slowest rate since its founding.

Georgia gained 73,766 residents between July 2020 and July of this year to just less than 10.8 million, the U.S. Census Bureau reported Tuesday. Only four states saw larger population increases: Texas, Florida, Arizona and North Carolina.

Nationally, the population rose only 0.1% during that period to nearly 331.9 million.

Census Bureau officials attribute the slow rate of growth to decreased net international migration, lower fertility and higher

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mortality due in part to the coronavirus pandemic.

"Population growth has been slowing for years because of lower birth rates and decreasing net international migration, all while mortality rates are rising due to the aging of the nation's population," said Kristie Wilder, a demographer in the Population Division at the Census Bureau. "Now, with the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, this combination has resulted in an historically slow pace of growth.'

Georgia remains the nation's eighth most populous state, just behind Ohio's 11.8 million residents. California's population of 39.2 million makes it by far the most populous, well ahead of the 29.5 million Texans. Florida is third with 21.8 million residents.

Texas, however, was the fastest growing state as of last July, adding 310,288 residents since July of last year. New York saw the largest numeric decline in population, losing 319,020 residents. The

Empire State also was the top state in rate of decline, losing 1.6% of its total population in just one year.

Kemp takes aim at another federal vaccine mandate

Gov. Brian Kemp and Georgia Attorney General Chris Carr are challenging a fourth Biden administration mandate related to the coronavirus pandemic.

A lawsuit filed Tuesday challenges an executive order issued late last month by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services requiring all staff associated with any programs funded through Head Start as well as certain of the program's contractors and volunteers to wear masks and get vaccinated.

The mandate includes some programs administered by the Georgia Department of Early Care and Learning.

"This is just the latest and most egregious in a growing list of overreaches by this president," Kemp said.

Nativity story yields year-round lessons

[Editor's Note: This column by owner Patrick Graham first ran in The Walton Tribune on Christmas Day

've really never studied much about the Nativity until this year, and I've found the differences in

the Gospels about the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, fascinating. For ex-

ample, did you know Mark and John don't even touch on the birth of Jesus? Instead, their Gospels essentially begin with Jesus as an adult being baptized in the Jordan by John the Baptist — almost as though they were more interested in starting out with his spiritual birth rather than his physical birth.

The story of Jesus' birth can, however, be found in Matthew and Luke. Even then, the narratives in the two versions are very different from each other.

For example, Matthew is very straight-to-the-point about Jesus' birth, spending little time on it, and then he goes into great detail about the visit by the wise men and Herod's attempt to find and kill Jesus by misleading them. Interestingly enough, there is no mention of Jesus being born in a manger in Matthew's Gospel, instead indicating the wise men

came to a "house" to see Jesus and pay homage. Luke, on the other hand,

spends a lot more time on the birth of Jesus. He goes into great detail about Mary and Joseph traveling to Bethlehem because of the census. There was no room in the inn where they stayed, so Jesus was born in a manger instead. Rather than a visit from wise men, it was shepherds who came to see Jesus at the behest of a host of angels.

To be honest, in my mind I had always combined these two versions of the birth of Jesus into one story, not really understanding they were two separate accounts.

What a truly miraculous story it is, however, no matter from which perspective you take it.

I'd like to share two good points about the Nativity I learned last week.

One comes from a brief sermon I heard on the radio with the pastor talking about how the "no room in the inn" for Jesus line in the Nativity story was an appropriate metaphor for how we often don't make room for Jesus in our lives, even at Christmas time, and instead we need to make sure we do — not just at Christmas, but year-round. What a terrific and timely reminder.

The other was from my good friend Bruce Williamson, who sent me a column from an economist he follows. The economist made the argument that although the innkeeper is often portrayed as evil because all he provided

Doctor urges residents to get vaccine, booster ospitals across the coun-

try are often full at this Ltime of year because of seasonal illnesses, like the flu. This year, how-

ever, we are also still contending with COVID-19. In addition to the Delta variant, which caused the largest and worse surge of the

pandemic, thus far, the Omicron variant is now the predominant variant and spreading rapidly.

According to early reports, the Omicron variant may not cause as severe illness in many, however, it will cause severe illness (including death) in some, especially the unvaccinated. It also appears to be the most contagious of all of the variants. That means that the number of people expected to be hospitalized could put enormous pressure on our hospital, and the nation's healthcare system, both of which are already stressed.

Speaking on behalf of all of the physicians, nurses, and staff members of our hospital, I am urging every member of the community to get vaccinated against COVID-19, if they haven't already done so. If you have already received the COVID-19 vaccine, be sure to get your booster shot as well.

Initial data from Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, suggests that two doses of the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines provide just 33% effectiveness in preventing severe illness/hospitalization against Omicron. However, third doses show high levels of protection against Omicron, about 70%. Early data also indicates that the antibodies resulting from people who have survived COVID-19 infections (sometimes referred to as "natural immunity") does not provide the same amount of protection

against this variant. While the vaccines can't entirely prevent people from contracting COVID-19, they do an excellent job of preventing

hospitalization and death. Preventing hospitalization for COVID-19 is vitally important. We need to keep hospitals beds open and staff available for non-COVID urgent and emergent medical needs, as well as some much-needed elective proce-

dures. The greatest gift you can give your friends, family, and community is the assurance that you are doing all you can to stop the spread of COVID-19. While that means getting vaccinated and boosted, that also means continuing to practice the three W's: Wearing a mask, Washing your hands, and Watching your distance. We also recommend that when possible, people use the at-home tests, available at local pharmacies and retailers, before attending a large gather-

ing with vulnerable populations. December marks the one-year anniversary of the COVID-19 vaccine being available. Over 200 million Americans are now considered to be fully vaccinated. That is an enormous help, but as a nation we can, and must, do better. If we ever hope to put COVID-19 firmly behind us, we need everyone to remain vigilant in doing all the right things.

funding. The Federal Communications Commission recently approved Piedmont Healthcare, the parent company of Piedmont Newton Hospital, among 68 applications for funding commitments totaling \$42.7 million as part of the FCC's COVID-19 Telehealth Program.

And the Judicial Council of Georgia Ad Hoc Committee on American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funding has awarded grants totaling \$24.8 million to 26 judicial circuits, including the Alcovy circuit which includes Newton County.

Piedmont Healthcare, a system of hospitals that includes Piedmont Newton Hospital, was awarded \$197,789 for the purchase of remote monitoring kits including Bluetooth-enabled pulse oximeters, blood pressure devices, and scales, to provide improved remote care throughout the hospital system.

The FCC's COVID-19 Telehealth Program supports the efforts of health care providers to continue serving their patients by providing reimbursement for telecommunications services, information services, and connected devices necessary to enable telehealth during the

COVID-19 pandemic. This round of funding is a \$249.95 million federal initiative that builds on the \$200 million program established as part of the CARES Act.

"As the impact of new variants continue to challenge our healthcare system, the FCC has worked diligently to review and approve funding commitments as part of our COVID-19 Telehealth Program," said Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel. "As we head into 2022, the ability to treat patients and loved ones from the safety of their home is of vital importance."

On Nov. 9, the FCC's Wireline Competition Bureau issued a Public Notice announcing an opportunity for all remaining applicants to supplement their applications, as required by Congress. Remaining applicants had 10 days to supplement their applications which were then evaluated.

Meanwhile, judicial circuits which operate the court systems statewide submitted applications for ARPA funds allocated to the judicial branch.

The Committee accepted applications from Nov.10 through Nov. 30 for the award period beginning Jan. 1, 2022.

In October, Supreme Court of Georgia Chief Justice David E. Nahmias, also chair of the Judicial Council, announced the allocation of up to \$110 million of ARPA funds by Gov. Brian P. Kemp to address backlogs of court cases, particularly cases involving serious violent felonies.

The Judicial Council is administering up to \$96 million of that total for eligible courts, prosecutors, and related agencies. The remaining \$14 million in ARPA funds is allocated to the Georgia Public Defender Council for grants to public defenders.

Requests from judicial circuits included funding for temporary personnel to respond to the case backlog, including senior judges and judges to serve by

COVID funding going to hospital system, judicial circuit designation, assistant district attorneys, security personnel, victim support, and court reporters, funding for rental costs for temporary space to hold court, supplies and materials, and administrative staff to support grant administration.

Georgia's judiciary operated under a Statewide Judicial Emergency Order from March 2020 through June 2021. The order placed necessary limitations on court operations to protect the health of those working in and coming to courthouses during this time but also resulted in a backlog of criminal and civil cases, particularly those requiring jury trials to resolve.

Since the order expired on June 30, 2021, courts have increased efforts to resolve cases, but the ongoing pandemic continues to limit the pace and scale of court operations as public health measures remain in place.

The committee. chaired by Presiding Justice Michael P. Boggs, is overseeing the application process for the grants and the Judicial Council's

acre. The bond documents were strikingly similar to ones approved in 2018 for the Meta Newton Data Center. Both bond issues approved by the JDA were for \$42 billion. Both bond issues were to fund "a data center and economic development project." Baymare and Morning Hornet were also both listed

as Delaware limited

liability companies.



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As Morning Hornet takes ownership of the second \$42 billion data center deal, bond documents and the project's details become virtually identical.

Does this point to another major data center deal with Meta?

Serra Hall, who is executive director of Newton County Industrial Development Authority and chief recruiter for the JDA, would neither confirm nor deny that the data center would be for Meta. "We've been very

fortunate to have Meta and Newton Data Center out at Stanton Springs for many years now," she told The Covington News on Wednesday. "We're now thrilled to welcome Morning Hornet to Stanton Springs." Meta officials could

not be reached for comment prior to this publication.

Exactly when the

identity of the incoming industry might be revealed remains unclear. However, Hall said the project was "moving ahead nicely."

Construction of the data center, which will total approximately 2 million square feet located at Stanton Springs South, will be completed in phases, bond documents state.

Phase 1, which is estimated to cost \$750 million, is expected to be finished by Dec. 31, 2026. With 900,000 square-feet of interior space, the Phase 1 facility's completion will add approximately 50 new jobs. Phases 2, 3 and 4 facilities are estimated to cost \$550 million each for 400,000 square-feet of interior space per facility, and each phase will have completion dates in 2028, 2030 and 2032, respectively.

The listed dollar amounts and facility dimensions were identical to those found within bond documents for the 2018 deal.

As approved by all four counties, Morning Hornet will make payments in lieu of taxes, or PILOTs, starting in April 2027 at \$2 million and increase by \$1 million every two years until April 2033, totaling \$5 million per year. The payments will be due even if the phases are not completed on time.

Newton and Walton counties will receive 37.5% of the revenue, Morgan County will receive 15% and Jasper County 10%.

The PILOT payments will compensate the four counties for lost tax revenue due to the tax exempt status of the property. The bonds will be

issued as what are commonly called "phantom bonds," where the JDA issues the bonds and then Morning Hornet purchases them. The

JDA will take title to the project and then lease it to Morning Hornet for a period of time so the bonds can

remain tax exempt. Though Morning Hornet will appear to make rent payments to cover debt services on the bonds, no money will change hands since the company will have bought the bonds.

School and county property taxes will be abated during construc-

As part of the deal, Morning Hornet will also provide up to \$3 million to fund construction of a two-lane frontage road that runs parallel to the project and a spur to improve traffic flow, which will begin as soon as the deal is completed.

Morning Hornet will also pay the JDA a bond issuance fee of \$1.5 million.

House Agriculture Committee Chairman asks USDA for aid to cotton merchandisers

Citing what he termed "unparalleled costs and losses impacting merchandisers of U.S. cotton," House Agriculture Committee Chairman David Scott (D-Georgia) wrote to Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack on Dec. 10 requesting financial relief.

Scott asked Vilsack to direct some of the funding to cotton merchandisers businesses that market ginned cotton to textile manufacturers. Scott noted that cotton-related professions provide 53,000 jobs in Georgia. Cotton's overall economic impact on the state surpasses \$3 billion. Georgia ranks third among U.S. states in cotton production.

"Our nation's cotton



industry is experiencing unprecedented supply chain disruptions," Rep. Scott wrote. "Our nation's cotton merchandisers are being significantly impacted by COVID-related demand erosion and by supply-chain

The U.S. cotton industry has faced numerous challenges with international trade, much of it related to shutdowns from the COVID-19 pandemic.

U.S. cotton producers and

According to economic analysis from the National Cotton Council (NCC),

shutdowns around the globe resulted in sharp decline in consumer demand. In response, the international shipping industry reduced capacity.

As demand and economies have recovered, an extensive list of factors – from shippers declining to refill empty containers being returned overseas to labor shortages – have compounded financial hardships for U.S. cotton merchandisers.

Shipping cost rates have increased for both rail and ocean freight, and merchandisers, as well as grower-owned cooperatives have incurred additional costs to store more cotton for longer than anticipated.

The NCC estimates that U.S. cotton merchandisers have sustained additional direct costs for shipping and storage have surpassed \$780 million, which does not include financial losses due to contract defaults and sales cancellations.

The USDA has allocated \$500 million for relief from agricultural market disrup-

The market disruption aid funding was announced in September as a part of a \$3 billion package to address challenges facing U.S. agricultural producers.

The market disruption aid is targeted for increased transportation challenges, availability and cost of certain materials and other obstacles related to marketing and distribution of agricultural commodities.

Georgia Foundation for Agriculture-backed mental health pilot study results released

The Georgia Foundation for Agriculture partnered with the Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center at Mercer University to study the mental well-being, stressors, and coping mechanisms for Georgians in farm occupations. The results from the organizations' pilot survey, conducted in May and June, were released in November. A broader statewide survey is planned for January 2022.

The foundation and rural health innovation center received responses from more than 500 farm owners, farm workers, farm managers, and their spouses about mental well-being topics, including negative emotions, perceived stress, time spent worrying, conditions that cause stress and coping mecha-

"This preliminary research is an important first step in laying the groundwork for our

foundation's response to this growing challenge for Georgia farmers," GFA Executive Director Lily Baucom said. "The statewide survey will help inform our strategy on this important issue longterm."

The study found that that although half of the farmers are happy with their occupation, they do experience a lot of stress from a variety of sources. Most farmers worry at least one to three hours per day, and about half felt loneliness, sadness, or depression, with a third feeling hopeless. Almost one-third (31%) had suicidal thoughts at least once in the past year. Less than a quarter of participants indicated they had access to a psychologist. About 12% said they would like to visit a mental health professional but have not done so yet. The effects of

COVID-19 were among the top stressors for both farm owners and farm workers. Farm

workers were predominantly worried about retirement savings, while farm owners were focused on the effect of the weather on their income. Almost half of survey participants said they worried about succession planning.

Farmers who do not have access to emergency medical care, in-office routine medical care, telephone access for routine medical care, or telephone access to a psychologist had significantly higher perceived stress. Farmers who experienced the highest perceived stress were also more likely to use unhealthy coping mechanisms, such as hitting or injuring themselves, hitting or kicking things, or using over-the-counter and illicit drugs.

Two-thirds of survey participants indicated they did not have access to recreational activities generally considered to be healthy coping mechanisms.

"He always left me feeling better when he left my office," she said.

in the early 1970s. The couple purchased an old warehouse and office trailer along with 15 acres of land at the corner of U.S. Hwy. 278 and Georgia Hwy. 11 that they converted into an antique shop and restaurant in 1971. The office trailer was converted into a living space, she said.

Dupree also recalled living and working next door to The Hub drivein movie theater and across Hwy. 11 from the Tri-County Cattle

"We could watch the movies from our window," she said.

She said she met David Dupree when she worked an office job in New York City. David worked in the corporate world in New York after growing up in Atlanta and Social Circle.

His stepmother, Celeste Sigman Dupree, was an Atlanta banker who later became a famed historic home preservationist and restored about 15 properties in Social Circle.

Nathalie and David moved to London, England, where she graduated from Le Cordon

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Bleu cooking school. She then worked at a restaurant in Majorca, Spain, and the couple toured part of Europe with his parents before they moved back to the

"We always wanted to come back home," she said.

The couple used a \$5,000 loan based on the value of their antiques to convert the warehouse space. However, the loan could not be used to build her restaurant because "restaurants were notorious for failing," she said.

"So I ran the largest paper route in Covington, Georgia, to start the restaurant," Nathalie said. "I threw the papers every morning with our German shepherd dog — earned a pretty good income.

"My brother and my husband ... built the (restaurant) cabinets and everything. They laid railroad ties at the front of the building and made it look very charming.

"We painted it blue

and, at first, we called it Mt. Pleasant Village," she said.

Oby and Ann Brewer lived at historic Mt. Pleasant Plantation nearby, she said.

Ann Brewer later became a fund-raiser for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and helped encourage the farm to table food movement in Georgia. Oby Brewer was a real estate agent and David Dupree was able to earn his real estate license because of him, Nathalie said.

The business featured Nathalie's homemade dishes on one side and antiques and such items as fresh flowers and plants from her fatherin-law's greenhouse on the other side, she recalled.

"We had these lovely geraniums that I kept there," she said. "It was a family affair.'

They later moved their home to Monticello Street in Covington but continued to oper ate the restaurant at The

"We made everything from scratch," she said. "I certainly got a lot of complaints that the beans were not cooked enough.

"Zucchini was a new vegetable," she said. "It was still the yellow squash era." The restaurant, Nath-

alie's, drew customers from as far away as Atlanta. Kate Almon and Grace Reeves assisted her in the kitchen. "We worked in the

cool of the morning. There was a little air conditioner in the kitchen and a little air conditioner in the dining room."

She said her in-laws encouraged her to offer her style of cooking in early 1970s rural Georgia because "I didn't think it was foreign."

"I knew it wasn't going to be a meat and three but I didn't have the capacity to offer a lot of choice, but it didn't occur to me that people wouldn't like good food if they ate good food - and we could create a nice environment."

She said she used a French cooking technique with southern U.S. ingredients in her dishes.

"That became the new Southern cooking movement," she said. "I realized how similar they were, but different."

She was referring to a cooking style she is credited with starting — and that many restaurants use today. Her first TV cooking show was titled "New Southern Cooking with Nathalie Dupree."

In 1975, one of her regular customers enjoyed her style of cooking enough that a business offer was

"A customer at the restaurant was an executive with Rich's (Department Store) and introduced me to the powers that be," she said.

The offer was for Dupree to operate a new cooking school at Rich's Department Store's downtown Atlanta location.

She said she took the offer, split from her husband and moved to Atlanta to open the school, which ended up educating more than 10,000 students before its closing around 1984.

She went on to author or co-author 13 books. Her first TV show sponsored by White Lily Flour in 1986 led to nine TV cooking show series on PBS and cable channels TLC

and The Food Network. Dupree also has fond memories of living on Hightower Trail in Social Circle in the mid-1990s.

"My mother lived in Social Circle as well," she said.

Her former motherin-law bought the Orr N Stanton-Studdard house for Nathalie and her current husband an author and historian — on Hightower Trail in Social Circle "a couple houses down from the fire station."

There, she filmed three series.

"We loved it," she recalled. "It was a big house and had a little cubby out of the back and my husband was able to write a couple books there."

They later moved to Charleston, South Carolina, in the late 1990s where she wrote a regular column for the Charleston Post and Courier newspaper.



COVINGTON, Ga. Family members, coaches and teammates of MJ Stroud gathered in Alcovy's auditorium on Wednesday, Dec. 15, as he signed a national letter of intent to play college football at Georgia Southern University next year.

A few of the coaches in attendance, school administrators and Stroud's mother all spoke about Stroud during Wednesday's ceremony. Adjectives such as "humble" and "unselfish" were used to describe Stroud.

While each person spoke, Stroud was focused on one thing: "Don't cry."

Admittedly, Stroud said afterward that he was close to shedding a tear or two, but he expressed his happiness at putting pen to paper.
